Just a reminder...First Holy Communion for our Second Grade students will be on Saturday, May 2nd. If this is the Mass you normally attend, you may want to arrive early due to parking.

Spiritual Notes:

Like Jesus did, His disciples faced rejection and persecution for their beliefs. But also like Jesus, Luke tells us that they were "filled with the Holy Spirit," who assisted them in their trials. Standing before the religious authorities of Jerusalem, they are challenged for their behavior. In their defense, Peter replies that the good works they perform are done "in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead." The apostles' example is offered to encourage Luke's community and us, as well. We are called to stand firm in our faith even in the face of opposition. In First John, we are reminded of our identity as "the children of God." Because of the incarnation, we share in God's life. But, we are told, this is just the beginning: "what we shall be has not yet been revealed;" created in the image of God and called to share in divine life, we will one day "be like Him." In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us, "I am the good shepherd." Most of us in the United States today have never encountered a shepherd, but the image was common enough to Jesus's audience. He draws a distinction between a shepherd who owns the sheep and a "hired man, whose sheep are not his own;" the man who "works for pay...has no concern for the sheep" when his own safety is at stake. Jesus goes on to speak of "other sheep that do not belong to this fold," who must also be cared for and "will hear my voice." The good shepherd cares for his sheep and ultimately will bring them all together, so that "there will be one flock, one shepherd." God's desire is to gather us all together. We are called to love all "the sheep," even those of another flock, for God already loves them.

For reflection: Do I consciously perform good deeds with an awareness that I am doing them through the grace of God? Am I comfortable with the idea of "other sheep" also belonging to God's flock?



FAQs: Religious Liberty and Marriage



Marriage & religious liberty stand - or fall - together

What is religious liberty?

Religious liberty is "the right to live in the truth of one's faith and in conformity with one's transcendent dignity as a person" (*Centesimus Annus*, no. 47). "Nobody may be forced to act against his convictions, nor is anyone to be restrained from acting in accordance with his conscience in religious matters in private or in public, alone or in association with others, within due limits" (*Catechism*, no. 2106, quoting *Dignitatis Humanae*, no. 2). Religious liberty is so important that John Paul II called it the "source and synthesis" of rights considered basic to every human person (*Centesimus Annus*, no. 47).

How are marriage and religious liberty connected?

Marriage (the union of one man and one woman as husband and wife) and religious liberty are two distinct goods that are also related to each other. The protection of each good follows from the duty to protect the inviolable dignity of the human person. But even more directly, the legal protection of marriage as the union of one man and one woman also protects the religious freedom of those who adhere to that vision of marriage.

How could changing the legal definition of marriage have any effect on religious liberty?

Changing the legal term "marriage" is not one change in the law, but rather amounts to thousands of changes at once. The term "marriage" can be found in family law, employment law, trusts and estates, healthcare law, tax law, property law, and many others. These laws affect and pervasively regulate religious institutions, such as churches, religiously-affiliated schools, hospitals, and families. When Church and State agree on what the legal term "marriage" means (the union of one man and one woman), there is harmony between the law and religious institutions. When Church and State disagree on what the term "marriage" means (e.g., if the State redefines marriage in order to recognize so-called same-sex "marriage"), conflict results on a massive scale between the law and religious institutions and families, as the State will apply various sanctions against the Church for its refusal to comply with the State's definition. Religious liberty is then threatened.

But would ministers really be forced to officiate at the "wedding" of two persons of the same-sex?

This question is a red herring. In other words, it is a false caricature of the real concerns about religious liberty, and is actually used to distract from the real concerns. It is unlikely in the extreme that the State will force ministers and churches to officiate same-sex "marriage" ceremonies, although it is easily foreseeable that many church ministers and communities could be sued in court over this question. There are, however, other more probable and pervasive concerns.

FAQs: Religious Liberty and Marriage

What's the real threat to religious liberty posed by same-sex "marriage"?

The legal redefinition of marriage can threaten the religious liberty of religious institutions and individuals in potentially numerous ways, involving various forms of government sanction, ranging from court orders compelling action against conscience, to awards of money damages and other financial penalties, to marginalization in public life:

- ⇒ **Compelled Association:** the government forces religious institutions to retain as leaders, employees, or members those who obtain legalized samesex "marriage"; or obligates wedding-related businesses to provide services for same-sex "couples."
- ⇒ Compelled Provision of Special Benefits: the government forces religious institutions to extend any special benefit they afford to actual marriage to same-sex "marriage" as well.
- ⇒ **Punishment for Speech:** preaching, political action, or conversation reflecting moral opposition to same-sex "marriage" represents actionable "harassment" or "discrimination," or forbidden "hate speech."
- ⇒ Exclusion from Accreditation and Licensure: those who adhere to the definition of marriage are excluded from participation in highly regulated professions and quasi-governmental functions, as licenses are revoked and religious institutions lose accredited status.
- ⇒ Exclusion from Government Funding, Religious Accommodations, and Other Benefits: those who adhere to the definition of marriage are excluded from receiving government grants and contracts to provide secular social services, and from various tax exemptions.

Have any of these threats come to pass?

Yes. Examples include, but are not limited to, the following: the extension of married student housing to same-sex "married" couples (a Catholic college in MA); the extension of spousal employment benefits to same -sex "domestic partners" (Catholic Charities in Portland, ME); the loss of funding and licenses to provide adoptions for refusal to place with same-sex couples (Catholic Charities in Massachusetts, DC, and Illinois); the imposition of tax penalties for preaching about marriage amendments (Montana); and the loss of state tax exempt status for a religiously-affiliated camp (New Jersey). These threats have been manifest in other countries as well, often to an even more persistent and invasive extent.

Doesn't a religious exemption protect institutions and individuals if they believe that marriage can only be between a man and a woman?

Sometimes. A religious exemption may provide protections, but so far those protections have been drawn very narrowly and fail to cover known risks. More broadly, because "marriage" so pervades the law, it is difficult to foresee all circumstances where religious freedom conflicts may arise. But even further, no religious exemption—no matter how broadly worded can justify a supportive or neutral position on the redefinition of marriage (see Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, "Some Considerations Concerning the Response to Legislative Proposals on the Non-Discrimination of Homosexual Persons," 1992, no. 16). Such "redefinition" is always fundamentally unjust, and indeed, religious exemptions may even facilitate the passage of such unjust laws. Protecting marriage protects religious liberty; the two are inseparable.

Notas Espirituales:

Al igual que hizo Jesús, sus discípulos enfrentaron al rechazo y persecución por sus creencias. Pero también como Jesús, Lucas nos dice que estaban "llenos del Espíritu Santo," que les han ayudado en sus pruebas, de pie ante las autoridades religiosas de Jerusalén, que se enfrentan al reto de su comportamiento. En su defensa Pedro responde que las buenas obras que realizan se hacen "en el nombre de Jesucristo el Nazareno a quien ustedes crucificaron, a quien nosotros crucificamos ya quien Dios resucitó de entre los muertos." El ejemplo de los apóstoles se ofrece para fomentar la comunidad de San Lucas y nosotros también. Estamos llamados a permanecer firmes en nuestra fe, incluso en frente a la oposición. En Primera de Juan nos recuerda nuestra identidad como "los hijos de Dios." Debido a la encarnación, que compartimos en la vida de Dios. Pero, se nos dice, esto es sólo el principio: "lo que seremos aún no ha sido revelado;" creado en la imagen de Dios y llamados a compartir la vida divina, que algún día "seremos semejantes a él."

En el evangelio de hoy, Jesús nos dice: "Yo soy el buen pastor. La mayoría de nosotros en los Estados Unidos hoy en día nunca se han encontrado con un pastor, pero la imagen era bastante común para el pueblo de Jesús. Él hace una distinción entre un pastor que pertenecen a las ovejas y un "jornalero, ... cuyas ovejas que no son las suyas;" el hombre que "trabaja para la paga ... no se preocupa por las ovejas," cuando su propia seguridad está en juego Jesús habla de "otra oveja que no pertenezca a este redil," que también hay que cuidar "oirán mi voz." El buen pastor cuida de todas sus ovejas y finalmente traerá a todos juntos para que "habrá un solo rebaño, un solo pastor."

El deseo de Dios es reunir a todos nosotros. Estamos llamados a amar a todas "las ovejas," incluso los de otro rebaño, porque Dios ya les ama.
