Spiritual Notes:

We return to the Book of Daniel this week as we celebrate Christ as our king. Our reading today is an excerpt from a vision the prophet had "during the night," perhaps in a dream. In the first part of the vision the prophet sees "four immense beasts," representing the nations that oppressed Israel over the centuries. The fifth creature Daniel sees is unlike the others "one like the Son of man" in other words, a person, not a beast. Unlike the beasts that came from "the great sea," this one comes "on the clouds of heaven" and receives "dominion, glory, and kingship" over his reign "in an everlasting dominion." This figure is one of hope, promising that God will defeat the earthly powers and rule over all people forever. For the Christian, obviously, this promised figure is Jesus, our king. In the Book of Revelation, John envisions Jesus as "the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead and the ruler of the kings of the earth." The imagery in Daniel is again evident here when John says that Jesus "is coming and amid the clouds." For John too this imagery serves as a promise of the future glory and victory. His writing, addressed to communities facing persecution, provides hope that God will indeed redeem us. The notion of a king who suffers is a hard concept to grasp for Jesus' contemporaries. Standing before Pilate, Jesus testifies to his kingship which "does not belong to this world." As king, Jesus "came into the world, to testify to the truth." The scene before Pilate presents a contrast between earthly power and heavenly power. Pilate's question, "Are you the King of the Jews?" finds an answer not so much in Jesus' words as in his acceptance of death on our behalf.

For reflection: What areas in our world need to be transformed to welcome the reign of God? How do I understand Christ's kingship? Is it one of service or power?

Make care kits with soap, toothbrushes, shampoo, etc. for the homeless or for military personnel.

Find a Military pen pal for your family and send him or her letters and care packages. Go to www.penpalsforsoldiers.org for a list of addresses and instructions about what to send and how to send it.

Visit a Nursing Home—your kids can play games with, read books to, or just talk with the elderly. Your youthful, cheerful kids will be sure to brighten their day, and your kids will learn a lot by talking with the elderly about the past.

Make holiday celebration baskets filled with festive goodies for nursing homes, homebound neighbors or homeless shelters. Let your kids fill and decorate them.

Make blankets or scarves for the homeless or for a women's shelter—ideal for children 10 and up, and also a great way for them to learn a new skill!

During the holidays, trim a Christmas tree with mittens, scarves, and hats and donate it to a local homeless shelter.

Notas Espirituales:

Volvemos al libro de Daniel esta semana al celebrar a Cristo como nuestro Rey. Nuestra lectura de hoy es conocida como una visión del profeta que tenía tal vez un sueño, "durante la noche." En la primera parte de la visión del profeta ve a "cuatro inmensos latidos," que representan a las naciones que oprimían a Israel durante siglos. La quinta criatura que Daniel ve es diferente a los demás: "uno semejante al Hijo del hombre," en otras palabras, una persona, no una bestia. A diferencia de las bestias que vinieron de "el gran mar," éste viene "sobre las nubes del cielo" y recibe "dominio, gloria y su reinado" es un dominio eterno. Esta cifra es de esperanza, con la promesa de que Dios derrota a los poderes de la tierra y gobierna a todas las personas para siempre. Para el cristiano, obviamente, esta cifra prometida es Jesús, nuestro Rey. En el Libro de Apocalipsis, Juan contempla a Jesús como "el testigo fiel, el primogénito de los muertos y el soberano de los reyes de la tierra." Las imágenes de Daniel son más evidente aquí cuando Juan dice que Jesús "se acerca en medio de las nubes. Para Juan también estas imágenes sirve como una promesa de la gloria y la victoria futura. Su escritura, dirigida a comunidades que enfrentan la persecución, ofrece la esperanza que Dios en verdad nos rescata. La noción de un rey que sufre es un concepto difícil de entender para los compañeros de Jesús. De pie ante Pilato, Jesús da testimonio de su reinado, que "no es de este mundo." Como rey, Jesús "vino al mundo, para dar testimonio de la verdad." La escena ante Pilato presenta un contraste entre el poder terrenal y el poder celestial. La pregunta de Pilato: "¿Eres tú el Rey de los Judíos?" Encuentra una respuesta, no tanto en las palabras de Jesús como en su aceptación de la muerte en nuestro nombre.

Para reflexionar: ¿Qué áreas en nuestro mundo necesita ser transformado para dar la bienvenida de Dios? ¿Cómo entiendo la realeza de Cristo? Es uno de los servicios o el poder?
