Dear St. Nicholas Family,

There are plenty of surprising joys in this time, like rediscovering an old bread recipe or video calling friends. There are interesting new challenges, such as unexpected homeschooling or learning how to work from home. But, when it happens day after day, in the same space, many of us can feel like the days blend together.



It can start to feel like we're stuck in a holding pattern, waiting for the return of "real" life. A tiredness creeps in. We slowly start to slip away from normal habits. However, as unreal as the current reality feels, we need to remember that this is real life, and each moment has meaning.

For over 1500 years, in monasteries around the world, monks and nuns have taken vows to essentially live their whole lives in quarantine. They live, work, eat, pray, and sleep within the same walls their whole life. How do they stay sane? They follow a routine of prayer, work, and communal time that serves as the backbone of their life. They strive to stay present with God in the moment, offering up even the smallest tasks and frustrations to God out of love.

As we continue the long vigil, waiting for the day we can celebrate together again as a community, we should each ask ourselves: what is a simple sacred ritual I can take up every day and offer to God out of love? What can we do to stay awake and remain present with Him in the moment without worry about the future?

Keep it simple, remain faithful, and stay awake.

Live in the Light

Bring awareness into your routine by fostering your own way of praying. Set-aside times of personal prayer lift our eyes to God, give us knowledge of Jesus' will for our lives, and help us notice the Spirit moving throughout the rest of our day — even when we're not actively praying.



The beautiful thing about prayer is that there are as many ways to pray as there are people. With 2000 years of practice under our belts, we have no shortage of options for different ways to pray and sanctify our days.

Start small, with short time periods. And don't punish yourself if you forget or don't want to pray. Whatever you choose to do, it should be a simple way of bringing light into your daily life.



Action Items for the Week

Habitual Ritual. Rituals are more than just habits. They are actions that help keep us anchored and turn the ordinary into the extraordinary, even in the midst of hardship or upheaval. Like the professed religious who pray or chant at different times throughout the day, we too can develop a habit of ritual that keeps us centered on God, even in the midst of darkness.

Think of an action you do every day around the same time. It could be making coffee in the morning, taking the dog for a walk, or powering down your computer at 5 pm after work. More often than not, we don't give these actions a second thought. This week, I encourage you to transform one of these daily actions into a sacred ritual.

Your ritual can be as simple as praying an Our Father before your first sip of coffee, saying a rosary as you walk the dog, or taking a moment to repeat the Jesus Prayer (*Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God have mercy on me, a sinner.*) whenever you finish or just need a break from work. Simple prayers attached to simple daily actions can help us remain present to God in the moment, even in the midst of darkness.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

What does it take for our eyes to be opened? Every day, a man laboriously walks down Main Street of town. With great difficulty but graceful determination, he places one foot in front of the other, uses a crudely made staff for support, and walks. His pace is slow, but he walks. What does he hope to see? Where does he want to go? What does he find? We all walk through life. The type of “walking” life requires is not always physical but is most assuredly emotional and spiritual. We walk, we look, we encounter, and we seek. How we do these things and what we actually find is determined by what we carry and what we allow ourselves to discover along the way.


If walking is too challenging for us, we may choose to isolate and stay alone. If we are afraid to walk, we may become overly dependent on others providing for us and abandon the journey. We can walk and pay attention only to what is in front of our feet and never notice the immensity of what is happening around us. The road is never the same twice. The journey is always different.

What kinds of things do you notice as you walk through life? It seems that the disciples of the Road to Emmaus missed a lot at first. We do as well.

We are called to walk with purpose, to listen, and to notice things that may not at first be apparent. We have to allow the One who has a special claim on our soul to enlighten, instruct, and inspire us. The incarnate mystery of God is pulsating in and through all of creation, where the presence of the



Word who became flesh can be discovered. He has been with us all along. How could we have missed Him? Our journey brings us back to the breaking of the bread, and something begins to stir within us. We begin to understand, and things look differently. Bread, body, wine, and blood bring us to see that everyone and everything is a “Eucharistic” encounter. We become what we eat and we see what we eat. We continue to walk. Our eyes are now opened, and we recognize Him. Our hearts burn. Stay with us. Please stay with us.



Missouri is known as the "Show Me" state. We would be prudent to adopt such a disposition ourselves. To be this way is not really like St. Thomas in the Gospel when he doubts what he clearly sees right in front of him. Responsibility of a Godparent

Question:

As the godfather for my niece, what must I do as she grows up? Are there specific responsibilities I have?

Answer:

The biggest responsibility you have as a godparent is to set a good example of practicing faith. Receiving the sacraments and taking an active part in your parish teaches by deed and shows your godchild how to live a life of faith. Next to the child's parents, your role can be one of great influence in her religious formation and education.

What else can you do? A special remembrance on the day the child was baptized can highlight its importance. As the child grows older, discussions about God, Jesus, matters of faith, and the parish provide opportunities to share your own beliefs and practices. Celebrate first Penance, first Communion, and Confirmation as key moments in your godchild's faith journey. Parents and godparents share in this responsibility in a unique and special way. Your obligations do not end with the ceremony of Baptism, but are just the beginning.

First Reading


In his first speech in Acts, Peter focuses on God's work in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. What do you think the resurrection of Jesus says about God?
