From the desk of Father Rudolph

Father Jonah...

The previous two weeks in this column, I passed on some thoughts from Bishop Robert Baron about the priestly role of Adam, the first man; Noah, who built the ark that saved humanity and the animals from the great flood; and Jacob, who wrestled with God. I wrote them down when I was at a talk he gave some priests recently. Today I'd like to share with you some of Bishop Baron's observations about the priestly character of Jonah. I'm hoping they will help you out in some way, because all of God's people are called to participate in the priesthood of Jesus Christ, each in his or her own way.

Jonah has a whole book of the Old Testament to himself. He has a lot to teach us! As you may remember, God told Jonah to go to Nineveh, which was the capital city of the Assyrian Empire, an enemy of Israel. He told Jonah to rebuke the people of that city for their wickedness, and to warn them that their city would be destroyed in forty days. But instead of accepting that mission, Jonah tried to get away from the presence of the Lord by getting on a ship going to Tarshish, which was in the opposite direction from Nineveh. He ended up in the sea, then in the belly of a big fish that after three days vomited him out onto dry land. After God repeated his orders to Jonah, he finally went to Nineveh and carried out his mission. The people there repented, and God didn't destroy them after all. Jonah was unhappy about that, which led to God rebuking him for not caring about the people there.

One lesson from Jonah is that if we resist God's will, trouble will come. Sometimes—as with Jonah—that trouble is arranged by God to restrict our resistance to him, so to speak. Our options to rebel become more limited, and the path of cooperation with God becomes easier to see. Once Jonah was in the belly of the fish, he could only go where God told the fish to take him. Other times the trouble isn't in the form of circumstances arranged by God but happens because of inner conflict. Especially if we believe in God, if we consciously disobey him in an ongoing way, like Jonah did, we are more likely to fall into disorders like depression, anxiety, and addictions to try to self-medicate. Jonah got angry and expressed a desire to die. But whatever our reaction to God's call, he doesn't call us to do something unless he knows that—with his help—we are up to the task. It just might take us a while to realize that and want to do it.

Applying these lessons to our own lives, we might want to start by asking what mission God is giving us today. Where is our Nineveh? Then we would do well to ask if there is a Tarshish in our life—in other words, something or someone we turn to in an attempt to get out of God's mission for us. Then, we can ask if there is a "big fish" in our life that has swallowed us—some difficult and limiting experience. To sum up—What is our mission? Are we doing things to try to avoid carrying out that mission? What is God doing to motivate us to carry it out, and help us to do so? Jonah was called to carry out the priestly role of being a sacrificial mediator on behalf of the people of Nineveh. He eventually succeeded, after some bumps in the road. But he himself wasn't transformed. His was seemingly a grudging obedience. He witnessed God's mercy on the people of Nineveh, but didn't come to share it.

We have the advantage of knowing God's mercy in Jesus Christ, and the gift of sacramental union with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. How are we doing in our priestly role of being a sacrificial mediator on behalf of others, in union with Christ? With God's help, may we carry out the mission of bringing his sacrificial love in Jesus Christ to all people--including our perceived enemies—even when it's difficult.

MISSION APPEAL WEEKEND JULY 15 & 16

The Congregation of the Sisters of St. Therese is a Diocesan Congregation of religious women, in Cameroon, Africa, founded on the 25th of June 1963 to serve the needs of the church and to raise the dignity of women. The Sisters are involved in education, health care, and socio-pastoral activities, as well as engaged in social justice and work with marginalized persons in prisons, street children, battered women, and internally displaced persons.

Following a 7-year ongoing political upheaval in the country, whole villages have been razed to dust, many people killed, hundreds of thousands have been displaced and schools have been shut down in the affected areas. Many girls, women, and children are stranded in the streets and forced into prostitution. In response to this new reality, the sisters have opened a shelter in a nearby city that is safe, where they provide a haven for some of the victims (women and children). We provide rehabilitation, safety, security, mental health care, education, and skills training. We house the girls in a rented apartment which is now very small. We have bought land to construct a bigger shelter and staff house, where we would carry out poultry, and fish farming, agriculture, and soap making to support and provide sustainable skills for the displaced women and children. We need your support to continue these programs and continue to support the girls, women, and children. With \$266 one child returns to school and is taken care of for a whole year. The cost of the construction of a shelter is \$155,348.

Saints of the Day - The Martyrs of Orange

At the time of the French Revolution, there were two convents in the small French town of Bollène, one of Ursulines and the other of the Perpetual Adorers of the Blessed Sacrament, also known as the Sacramentines. When, in 1794, the nuns were asked to take an anti-Catholic oath, they refused. Subsequently they were arrested and imprisoned in the town of Orange. There they did what they could to organize a communal religious life for themselves and other nuns who were in the same jail.

The first of the prisoners to be condemned to death for attempting "to destroy the republic by fanaticism and superstition" was Mary Rose Deloye, a Benedictine nun, executed on July 6th. On the next day Iphigenia de Gaillard de Lavaldène, a Sacramentine, was executed, and on July 9th, two of the Ursulines met the same fate, Melania de Guilhermier and Angela de Rocher. There were executions on most days to the end of July, and in all thirty-two nuns were guillotined. Witnesses told how the dwindling group in prison said prayers for the dying and sang the traditional hymn of praise "Te Deum" (You are God) every day, and the prison guards commented on how the nuns died so joyfully—one of them, Pelagia Bès, even shared out a box of sweets to celebrate her "wedding." Martyrs of Orange, pray for us! SYNOD IMPLEMENTATION: YEAR 1 BEGINS

The Archdiocesan Synod was a three-year process of listening, prayer and engagement in our archdiocese that took place from fall 2019-summer 2022. As we begin Year 1 of Synod implementation (as of July 1, 2023), here's a look back at what happened over those three years:

- The Synod process began with Prayer and Listening Events, all attended by Archbishop Hebda, that drew more than 8,000 participants and 35,000 comments on the local Catholic Church.
- \cdot That feedback led Archbishop Hebda to discern three focus areas for our local church:
 - · Forming parishes that are in the service of evangelization
 - \cdot Forming missionary disciples that know Jesus' love and respond to His call
 - \cdot Forming youth and young adults in and for a church that is always young
- \cdot Then after the pandemic inspired a year of online formation and prayer opportunities, to prepare hearts for discernment, Catholics gathered again this time in small groups at their parishes.
- · The fall 2021 small groups which included study, prayer, discussion and feedback for the Archbishop generated about 68,000 feedback forms, including 47,000 where a participant provided his or her own "My Best Idea."
- · Synod leaders synthesized that feedback and crafted a set of propositions, or action items, related to each focus area.
- Those propositions were refined by participants in a daylong Parish Leadership Team Consultation in February and March 2022, resulting in 40 propositions that were discussed, discerned and voted on at the Synod Assembly in June 2022.
- · Following that three-year process, Archbishop Hebda released a pastoral letter, "You Will Be My Witnesses: Gathered and Sent From the Upper Room" in November 2022. In it he outlines three Synod Priorities for the next three years:
 - · Year 1 (July 2023 June 2024): Small Groups
 - · Year 2 (July 2024 June 2025): The Mass
 - · Year 3 (July 2025 June 2026): Parents as Primary Educators
- The Archdiocese has now begun Synod implementation, with 2023-2024 focused on the Year 1 Priority: Small Groups.




