From the desk of Father Rudolph

The Word or just words?

A huge turning point in my life came when I realized that the author of the Bible is God. That made a huge difference in how I read it. Instead of adopting what I liked in Sacred Scripture and rejecting or ignoring the rest, I started taking it as God's description of reality and his instructions for how we are to live and who we are to become with his help.

It happened when I was staying with some friends in Montreal. I had hitch-hiked there from Minnesota in May of 1979. Just about every night they had friends over to their apartment for dinner, praise and worship music (one of my friends played the guitar), and Bible study. I didn't understand much of the French that was sung and spoken, but no translation was needed for the joy and peace in their faces.

I had felt drawn to learn more about Christianity for several years, but it hadn't yet influenced how I was living. The words of Sacred Scripture were like bottles of medicine that I put in a cabinet and never used. Seeing my friends in Montreal made me want to open it up and use it.

I was still a little skeptical. I knew some people who claimed to be Christians who rejected parts of the Bible. So, one day when my friends were out grocery shopping, I got down on my knees and started talking to God. I said something like this: "Jesus Christ, I believe that you are the Son of God, and God, and that you died for my sins. Please forgive all my sins and come into my heart and be my Lord and Savior." After saying a few more things, I asked, "Is everything in the Bible true?" I then heard a voice in my head that had more love, power, and peace than any merely human voice I had heard before, which said, "Every word is true." I responded, "Then Lord, please make me into the man you want me to be." Right away, some big changes happened in my soul, which made me eager to change some of my behavior. Other changes have happened more gradually. Either way, it seems to me that God confirmed his word to me with signs accompanying it, as we read happened when the apostles preached after Christ's Ascension (Mark 16:20).

Since that event in Montreal, I've gained many other reasons to believe that the Bible is all inspired by God. For example, there's its wisdom and power, the authority of the Catholic Church, its universal acceptance by the saints, and all the lives it's changed for the better.

The fact that the Bible is authored by God doesn't mean it's all easy to understand. Good homilies, podcasts, Scripture commentaries, Study Bibles and Bible studies can all help. So can keeping in mind that not everything in the Bible is meant to be taken literally. One of the most obvious examples of this is when Jesus said that if your right hand causes you to sin, you should cut it off and throw it away (Matthew 5:30). He was exaggerating to make a point about the importance of ridding your life of near occasions of sin. For example, for some people, smart phones are a source of temptation to look at impure images, so they've traded them in for "dumb phones" without internet access.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus makes three exaggerations to make a point. He says to call no man rabbi, father, or master. To take this literally would make it

difficult for Jews to talk about their religious leaders, children to talk about their male parents, and slaves to talk about the people who keep them enslaved. What Jesus is getting at, as he himself indicates, is that the authority of God as Teacher, Father, and Master outweighs any merely human authority.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the word was God" (John 1:1). What the Word reveals to us sure beats any merely human words.



Saint of the Day – Blessed Marguerite of Lorraine (died 1521) Marguerite came from a noble French family and when she was twenty-five married René, the duke of Alençon. Four years later René died, leaving her with three very young children and the care of the family estates. She also had to fight to keep the guardianship of her children, which the King of France wanted to take away from her. Having achieved success in this, she settled down in the family castle at Mauves, where she brought up her kids. She also was a good administrator of the family property, and when her son Charles got married, his inheritance was in a better condition than that in which his father had left it. Marguerite came under the good influence of Saint Paula of Nola and ever since her husband's death had been living a simple, ascetic life. When her responsibility for her children came to an end, she moved to the town of Mortagne, where there was a convent. She joined the nuns there in caring for the poor and sick. After a while she invited some of the nuns of this convent to join her in a new religious community in Argentan, under the rule of the Poor Clares, founded by Saint Clare, the friend of Saint Francis of Assisi. (If any of you girls or young women want to follow her example, there is a convent of Poor Clare sisters in Sauk Rapids, Minnesota). Blessed Marguerite of Lorraine, pray for us! 

Our Parish School News

Dear Parishioners,

I have been reading a book (recommended to me by my daughter) entitled Our Lady of Gaudalupe: Mother of our Civilization of Love by Carl Anderson and Eduardo Chavez. The book is s powerful testimony on virtually every aspect of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Anderson is best known as the longtime Supreme leader of the Knights of Columbus. The book is also an eye-opener for insight on our current times' difficulties by elucidating the role of Our Lady of Guadalupe in the evangelization of the New World (really in the entire providential plan God had for His Church). The seed for the book was planted when Anderson and Chavez attended the 2002 canonization of Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoarzin in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. Saint John Paul II historically has been the driving force behind understanding a more profound significance of the role of Our Lady of Guadalupe and these two understood that. You'd have to read the whole book to totally appreciate and understand this but then you'd know where to find hope for some sort of carryover to the predicament we now find ourselves in our Church and the world.

As always, Saint JP II had some great insights on Our Lady and on the role of the Church and the domestic church. It is no wonder that you encounter so many JP II-influenced priests, sisters, and lay people all throughout the Church today. One representative insight (out of many) which struck me while reading the book was Saint JP II's observation that the family is the "first school of love". As a principal at Catholic schools going on my 32nd year, I couldn't agree more with this simple truth. And I have always seen the fruits of the Catholic school parents' love toward their children spilled over into their extended families and reflected in the Catholic culture prevalent at the schools. This is the glue that holds us together in good times and challenging times. These graces are freely given and available in infinite ways to our families. I have seen so many beautiful transformations take place for those who immersed themselves in the opportunities to school their children in love. As a part of our desire to immerse ourselves in the liturgical life of the Church, we'll be celebrating The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (December 12th) at our all-school Mass that week here at the school, even though it does not fall on a Wednesday. Please pray that our families can continue to hold the power to influence their children's lives and that we will find the wisdom to do everything in our power to ensure that these Truths are handed down. A strong and holy Catholic school can be the difference maker in helping parents as the primary educators of their children.
