From the desk of Father Rudolph

Hating or Loving the Light...

Somehow or other I started receiving "The Bible Timeline Show" from Ascension Press in my email inbox every Sunday. It features Catholic Bible scholar and evangelist Jeff Cavins interviewing various guests. Last Sunday it was Fr. Robert Spitzer, S.J., who spoke about the topic "Can Catholics Believe in Evolution?" Today it was Dr. Margaret Turek, a professor of theology at Saint Patrick's Seminary in Menlo Park, California, on the topic "Abraham and Isaac: Love, Sacrifice, and Trust." Both were outstanding.

In their remarks, Jeff, Fr. Spitzer, and Dr. Turek show how Jesus Christ came to satisfy both the longing of our hearts for happiness and the hunger of our minds for truth. Especially the truth that God the Father is sacrificial love, who sent Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit so we could see him, know him, and become like him.

You'd think this would draw everyone to God's plan, but sadly, the devil has another plan, which has stayed constant in some ways since our first parents walked the earth. That's to mistrust God, to think he doesn't have our best interest at heart. So people substitute lesser goods or even sins for the Supreme Good, digging for themselves broken cisterns that can't hold water, to quote the Prophet Jeremiah (2:13).

This tragic dynamic is described by Saint John in this Sunday's Gospel: **"And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hated the light and does not come to the light, so that his works might not be exposed"** (John 3:19-20). In other words, people who are attached to sin tend to distance themselves from God because he reminds them that what they are doing is sinful, and they want to think it's OK. Just being in God's presence can torment their conscience. Take for example a Catholic college student who gets involved in the world of hook-ups (sexual encounters with people he hardly knows) or drunken parties. He is unlikely to want to go to Mass Sunday morning because it would remind him of his guilt. He is more likely to try to numb his conscience by sinning even more. Or, if he is an intellectual, he might try to rationalize his sinning, trying to convince himself that no matter what Sacred Scripture and the Church say, what he's doing is OK. The same could easily happen to a young woman who decides to move in with her boyfriend. Most of her friends are telling her there's nothing wrong with it. If she's cohabiting and fornicating, she's unlikely to spend time at Mass, or in the Adoration Chapel, or praying the Rosary. The Holy Spirit would use the opportunity to let her know something is wrong with behaviors that she mistakenly thinks will bring her happiness. So she hides.

But praise God, there's always hope! No matter how far we go from God, he never gives up on us. Maybe our minds are closed to the truth, or just plain ignorant of it, but deep down we want to live a good life. Who doesn't? That can open the door to God, because, as Saint John went on to write, **"Whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God"** (John 3:21).

Jesus Christ came to show us the truth, and so set us free to become who we were created to be, a son or daughter of the Light, an image of our invisible heavenly Father, Love that is pure giving and totally self-sacrificing. May all people be open to that Truth, that Light, and that Love.

Saint of the Day – Blessed Marie-Eugénie Milleret

Anne-Eugénie Milleret was born on August 26, 1817 in Metz, France. Her parents didn't practice the Catholic faith, but when she made her First Holy Communion for social reasons at the age of twelve, it was a moment of grace and the beginning of a lifelong devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. The next three years were tough. Anne-Eugénie was laid up for a while with typhoid, then her parents separated. Two years later her mother died of cholera. Her father arranged for her to stay with some wealthy relatives in Paris. It wasn't easy. They loved parties; she longed for someone with whom she could share her questions about the meaning of life, the existence of God, and how to have a relationship with him.

Anne-Eugénie then attended a series of Lenten homilies at the Cathedral of Notre Dame. On the last day the preacher's words struck home: "It is prayer that re-establishes our relationship with God...Doubt is the beginning of faith." Then, shortly before the following Lent, she had a dream. She was in a strange church, listening to an unknown preacher. A voice instructed her, "He will show you the way you must go." Then, when she went into the church of Saint-Eustache for the Lenten homilies there, she recognized the church and preacher in her dream, Abbé [Father] Théodore Combalot. A strange but fruitful partnership followed. She was only twenty years old, quiet, reserved, and intelligent. He as a fiery orator, ardent and impetuous. But she signed on to a desire he had to found a Congregation of women that would be both contemplative and dedicated to the education of women, whom he regarded as the natural agents for the Christian renewal of society.

To prepare for her new role, she went to stay with the Visitation nuns. There she began a vigorous program of studies: Scripture, Thomistic theology, moral theology, the spirituality of Saint Augustine and Saint Teresa of Avila, and Latin, German, and English. After her studies were completed, in 1839, Anne-Eugénie and five other women began the new religious community, the Religious of the Assumption. Anne-Eugénie—now Sr. Marie-Eugénie—was elected superior by the rest of the group, a position she held for the rest of her life. They faced opposition from time to time from authorities in the Church who thought they prayed too much, or studied too hard, had too much contact with the world, were too interested in social issues, or should only visit with visitors through grills. About this, she said, "The more I go on, the less sympathy I feel for priests or pious lay-people....Nothing that is big or broadminded resonates with them. Must I modify our own way of life so as to suppress everything in it that shocks their narrow minds?" She pushed back against the criticism and in the end was able to maintain their way of life. In spite of the difficulties, she believed in the Church and sought and received approval of the Congregation by Rome. It proceeded to expand, and as of 1999, they numbered about 1,500 sisters, living in 207 communities and thirty-one countries.

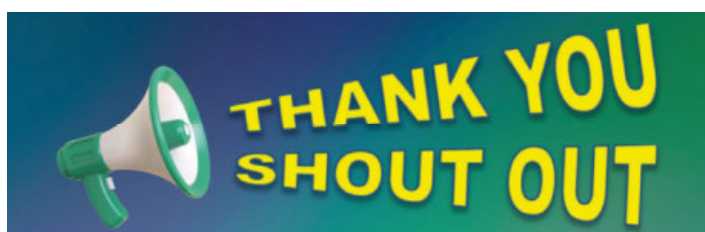
