# From the desk of Father Rudolph

#### Upside down is right side up...

Jesus Christ had a way of standing things on their head. To be defeated is to be victorious. To give up everything one has is to gain everything one needs. To not resist evil is to overcome it. And to die is to gain life.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus is trying to help his followers understand his imminent passion, death, and resurrection. He uses the analogy of a single grain of wheat, which must "die," falling into the ground, before it can bear much fruit—growing into a new stalk of wheat that can bear one hundred grains or more.

In a very real way, Jesus was born to die. When he grew up and began his public ministry, he said many amazing and wise things that have changed the world. And he did many miracles of healing that demonstrated who he was. But it was his willingness to suffer on the cross—laying down his life for all people—that was his most powerful message. And it was his Resurrection that was his most powerful miracle. This message and miracle broke the grip of Satan on the world and set in motion God's ongoing plan of salvation and renewal in Jesus Christ.

That plan continues every time someone decides to follow Jesus. When we say "no" to the devil's temptations to worship the idols of this age—like power, pleasure, possessions, and popularity—we dethrone him from our hearts and minds. And if we make room for Jesus to live and reign there instead, he will continue to draw everyone to himself through us. Each one of us Christians is called to be a sign pointing to the Savior.

The saints are the most obvious example of this. I doubt if any of them set out to be recognized as saints. They just tried to respond with faith, hope, and charity to everyone and everything that came their way. We can't choose most of the people we encounter, or many of our circumstances. But we can choose how to respond. I'm reminded of a conversation between Gandalf and Frodo in the book *The Lord of the Rings* (also found, in slightly different words, in the movie version). Frodo is lamenting the finding of the evil Ring of Power, his unasked-for temporary custodianship of it, and the rise of the power of the evil Sauron, who is trying to regain the Ring and so put all the world into darkness. Frodo says, "I wish it need not have happened in my time." Gandalf replies, "So do I, and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us." Lent is a wonderful time to think about how we can use the time given to us to do everything with great love, like Jesus and the saints.

Love always involves sacrificing for the good of others—doing the right thing, no matter what the cost is to ourselves. The martyrs are the greatest example of this after Christ. The Church has always recognized two forms of martyrdom. "Red martyrdom" means giving up one's life for faith and love. "White martyrdom" means suffering for others that falls short of death, but that can go on for many years. We might think our suffering is pointless and unappreciated and will bear no fruit. But if done with love, the whole world will be changed. This is expressed beautifully in a quote by English author George Eliot, used at the end of the movie "A Hidden Life," about Blessed Franz Jägerstätter, the Austrian peasant farmer who underwent imprisonment and execution rather than support Hitler: "...for the growing good of the world is partly dependent on unhistoric acts; and that things are not so ill with you and me as they might have been, is half owing to the number who lived faithfully a hidden life, and rest in unvisited tombs."

#### Saint of the Day – Saint Patrick


What we know of Saint Patrick for sure comes from his two writings, the *Letter to the Soldiers of Coroticus* and his *Confession*. He was born in the late fourth or early fifth century in Britain into a wealthy Roman family. His grandfather was a priest and his father a deacon. When he was fifteen, he was kidnapped along with some of his father's slaves and taken to Ireland. He lived there for six years, herding his master's livestock. Nostalgia for his own country, people, and kin, plus loneliness and poverty and exposure to the harshness of the climate brought Patrick to such poverty of spirit that God alone became his only and secure treasure. He wrote that the call to prayer was so insistent and such a source of joy that he would willingly face frost, snow, or rain to pasture the animals while he gave himself up to it.

After six years, at the age of twenty-two, Patrick received a message in his sleep: "Soon you will go back to your own country...see, your ship is ready." He escaped and walked 188 miles, guided by God, until he found a ship preparing to sail. Eventually he was able to get back to his own family. Of course they were overjoyed to see him again, and expressed the hope that he would never leave them again. But then Patrick had a vision in the night of someone apparently coming from Ireland carrying many letters, one of which he gave him. He read the letter, which seemed to contain the voice of the Irish from around "the wood of Foclut, near the Western Sea." They begged him to return: "Come, and from now on walk with us." Patrick was deeply moved. Later, he received confirmation that the plea was divinely inspired: "He who gave himself up for you, he it is that speaks to you."

Patrick didn't leave at once because some of his elders, as well as he himself, questioned the prudence of his going on this mission because of his lack of education. It had been interrupted when he was kidnapped. But in the end he answered the call. He was ordained a deacon, then priest, then bishop, sold his patrimony to raise money for the mission, and returned to Ireland, this time as a slave of Christ and resolved to never leave his adopted country. He travelled widely there, spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ, and was amazed at the harvest of souls. As he wrote to the Irish, "Among you and everywhere I travelled for your sake, amid many perils, even to remote places beyond which there was no one and where no one had ever penetrated, to baptize or ordain clergy, or to confirm the people...I am greatly a debtor to God who has bestowed on me such grace that many people through me should be born again to God, and that everywhere clergy should be ordained from a people newly coming to the faith." He was also astonished that grace worked so powerfully on the young who spontaneously chose to be monks and virgins despite parental opposition. Patrick died on March 17<sup>th</sup>, probably at some time in the latter half of the fifth century. Saint Patrick, pray for us! 


