"As it is the parents who have given life to their children, on them lies the gravest obligation of educating their family. They must therefore be recognized as being primarily and principally responsible for their education. The role of parents in education is of such importance that it is almost impossible to provide an adequate substitute" (GE, #3).¹

"The task of imparting education belongs primarily to the family, but it requires the help of society as a whole" (ibid. #2). Pastors of souls have a "...very grave obligation to do all in their power to ensure that this Christian education is enjoyed by all the faithful and especially by the young who are the hope of the church" (ibid. #2).

Note well that: "Catholic parents are reminded of their duty to send their children to Catholic schools wherever this is possible, to give Catholic schools all the support in their power, and to cooperate with them in their work for the good of their children" (ibid. #8).

My dear brothers and sisters, the young are the future and the hope of the church. This is the reality and it is of highest importance. The youth are being educated in something, and it is either authentic education and formation as a disciple of Jesus Christ or it is something else.

"True education is directed towards the formation of the human person in view of his final end and the good of that society to which he belongs and in the duties of which he will, as an adult, have a share" (ibid. #1).
