REFLECTION

Awaiting The God Who Comes

We are going toward an encounter with the Lord who will manifest himself. But when will he come? At certain times and in certain places – even today – some say "Very soon!" They seem unable to resist the temptation to point to a certain date. New dates are successively put forward, and no matter how many false prophecies there are, another date is scheduled.

Others, opposed to this, are content with the certitude of immediate experience. Time passes, and nothing comes. They remain asleep. They are really not concerned, and they lack true vigilance. Jesus speaks to both these groups in this Sunday's gospel.

The coming of the Son of Man (the parousia) will be sudden and unexpected. Mark repeats Matthew's urgent warning (First Sunday, Year A): "Stay awake!" And always for the same reason: "You do not know when the appointed time will come." But there is one difference between the two: Mark places the return of the Lord at night.

To place the moment of the Master's return at night is unusual, and must have a meaning. While no one can work during nighttime hours (John 9:4), nevertheless, that is the time when the powers of evil display their activity; it is then that the enemy sows weeds in the wheat field (Matt 13:24-30). The term, "night" therefore, often – and quite naturally – has a negative connotation.

Like everyone, Christians live in the night of this world, but they do not belong to it. They will not be surprised by the day that will come during this night: the light is within them and keeps them in a state of watchfulness.

VOTIVE CANDLE INTENTIONS
