

Matthew 7:21-29

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the Kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven. Many will say to me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name? Did we not drive out demons in your name? Did we not do mighty deeds in your name?' Then I will declare to them solemnly, 'I never knew you. Depart from me, you evildoers.'







Here is a *lectio divina* lesson plan on "The Desire for God" as found in the *Catechism* (ccc, 27):

- Lectio: Read one of the following Scripture passages to your students to help them foster a deeper understanding on how to have a desire for God (see Genesis 1:27; Acts 17:26-28).
- Meditatio: The desire for God is written in the human heart, because man is created by God and for God; and God never ceases to draw man to himself (CCC, 27).
- Oratio: The search for God requires the effort of the human intellect, a correct will, an upright heart, and the witness to others who teach us to seek God (CCC, 30).
- Contemplatio: How does Jesus speak to me?
