

# "One of the most enjoyable tasks of catechetical ministry is forming children into the liturgical life of the Church."

The General Directory for Catechesis identifies a weak link between catechesis and liturgy as one of the problems affecting the vitality of catechesis in recent years (GDC 30).

As catechists, we can develop a liturgical sense in children by celebrating the rich treasury of liturgical prayer, directing catechesis on liturgical symbols, keeping the liturgical year, and respecting repetition.

- Rule of St. Benedict, written in the 6<sup>th</sup> century is the earliest time that we hear about all of the canonical hours.
- In the Old Testament, priests from the line of Aaron offered a morning and evening sacrifice to God according to the Law. While they were in exile, without a Temple in which to make these offerings, the Jewish people prayed Psalms, hymns, and Scripture readings throughout their day. Once the Temple was rebuilt, they resumed their sacrifices but also continued praying in the mornings, evenings, and at the third, sixth, and ninth hours of the day.
- Acts of the Apostles mentions that the disciples and first Christians continued praying at the third, sixth, and ninth hours of the day (see Acts 10:3, 9)


- 7 times of prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours "Seven times a day I praise you for your righteous ordinances" (Psalm 119:164)
- Repeating four-week cycle of Psalms, biblical canticles, prayers, and Scripture readings
- Other than small revisions after Vatican II to make it more accessible for laity, it has remained constant for 1,000 years
- The prayers vary in accordance with the liturgical season and commemorate the feasts of the church calendar
- Designed to sanctify the entire day
- Second only to the Holy Mass. Both are official public prayers of the Church. Not a private devotion

Divine Office: Another name for LoH. "Work of God", duty

**Breviary:** Set of 4 books that contains all the prayers and texts of the canonical hours

## Hours and Structure

# Major hours

- Office of Readings (Matins): Traditionally prayed in the middle of the night or early morning.
- Morning Prayer (Lauds): Prayed to begin the day.
- Evening Prayer (Vespers): Prayed as evening approaches.

## Minor hours

- Midmorning Prayer (Terce): Around 9 a.m.
- Midday Prayer (Sext): Around noon.
- Midafternoon Prayer (None): Around 3 p.m.
- Night Prayer (Compline): Prayed just before going to sleep.

## Hours and Structure

- Evening Prayer for Tuesday in Ordinary Time


  Loador: Cod come to my aggistance (Sign of the Cross)
  - Leader: God, come to my assistance. (Sign of the Cross)
    - Lord, make haste to help me.
  - Leader: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit:
    - as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen. Alleluia.
- Commonly prayed "choir style"

LEADER: Restore us again,

him in their hearts.

Short version: use above only; long version: use above and below.

SIDE A: Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other.

Faithfulness will spring up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky.

SIDEB: The LORD will give what is good, and our land will yield its increase. Righteousness will go before him and will make a path for his steps.

ALL: Restore us again,
