LIGHTS OF RECONCILIATION AND FORGIVENESS

Bishop James Powers is continuing to require/direct all diocesan parishes to maintain a "Light of Reconciliation and Forgiveness" in their worship spaces. This is a multiple-day votive light inserted into a holder and placed on a stand. Its position, color, design and appearance should strictly avoid any confusion with the sanctuary or tabernacle lamp. Incorporating the color purple into the design of the candle and/or its stand is suggested but not required. A position in or near an existing devotional area may be best, or in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel if available. Having copies of "A Prayer for Our Church" nearby is encouraged. Anyone who believes that they have been sexually abused is strongly encouraged to report as well."


FALL CONFERENCE | OCTOBER 24

NEW TRANSLATION OF RITUAL BOOK:

Order of the Anointing of the Sick and their Pastoral Care

This newly translated text will replace the Anointing ritual that has been in use since the early 1980's, Pastoral Care of the Sick: Rites of Anointing and Viaticum. Besides the newly translated texts, the structure of the ritual book has changed. The ritual from the 1980's was arranged in a manner suitable for use by both clergy and lay ministers. The new ritual text will be only for use by Priests and Deacons. However, as the implementation date approaches, the USCCB will ensure that non-ordained ministers continue to have access to those texts which they use in ministry to the sick and homebound. The newly translated rite may begin to be used as of February 11th, 2026 (the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes). Its use is obligatory as of April 5th, 2026 (Easter Sunday). Once information about the publishers is released there will be an opportunity for a diocesan bulk order of the new ritual books, timed so that they will be available for pick-up at our diocesan 2026 Priest Assembly / Mass of Chrism – Sunday, March 22nd through Tuesday, March 24th. catholicdos.org/ritual-books-neweditions

Within the implementation stage of the synod, our local Church is called to receive the directives of the Final Document of the Synod and begin to apply them through a process of accompaniment and evaluation. LITURGICAL CONSIDERATIONS FOR MASS AND LITURGY OF THE HOURS ON ALL SAINTS DAY AND ALL SOULS' DAY IN 2025-PROVIDED BY THE USCCB SECRETARIAT OF DIVINE WORSHIP

In 2025, the Solemnity of All Saints on November 1st falls on a Saturday, with the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls' Day) taking place on the following Sunday, November 2nd. Both All Saints Day and All Souls' Day are ranked at no. 3 on the Table of Liturgical Days.

"Saturday-Monday rule," as usual

All Saint's Day is not a holy day of obligation this year, owing to the 1992 decision of the USCCB abrogating the precept to attend Mass when November $1^{\rm st}$ falls on a Saturday or Monday.

Liturgy of the Hours

- On Friday evening, October 31st, Evening Prayer of All Saints is celebrated.
- On Saturday, November 1st, both Morning and Evening Prayer II of All Saints Day are celebrated. (Though for pastoral reasons where it is the custom, Evening Prayer II may be followed by Evening Prayer for the Dead.)
- For Sunday, November 2nd, the Office for the 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time is said, especially in individual recitation. (The Office of the Dead may be used, however, if Morning or Evening Prayer is celebrated with the people.)

Mass

- On Friday evening Masses are those of the day since All Saints Day is not a day of precept this year and thus may not be anticipated.
- On Saturday evening any normally scheduled anticipated Masses should be for All Souls' Day. (If desired for pastoral reasons, a Mass of All Saints Day outside the usual Mass schedule may be celebrated on Saturday evening.)

The following chart may be helpful in this regard:

<u>DATE</u>	EVENING MASS	LITURGY OF THE HOURS
Saturday, November 1 st , '25	All Souls' (anticipated)	Morning and Evening Prayer II of All Saint (EP of the Dead optional after EP II of All Saints)
Sunday, November 2 nd , '25	All Souls'	Individual recitation: Morning and Evening Prayer II of 31 st Sunday in Ordinary Time Celebrated with the people: Office of the Dead

Ritual Masses

- Since Saturday is a common day for the celebration of Marriage in the United States, it should be noted that Ritual Masses are forbidden on All Saints Day.
- While the Ritual Mass for the Celebration of Marriage is forbidden, the Mass of the Day with the ritual itself and the nuptial blessing could be celebrated.
- Alternatively, the Order of Celebrating Matrimony without Mass could also be used if the celebration of Marriage is to take place on this day.
- Ritual Masses are also forbidden on All Souls' Day.
- Because All Saints Day is not a holy day of obligation in 2025, funeral Masses may be celebrated on this day.

THANKSGIVING DAY | THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 27

In the diocese of Superior, Thanksgiving Day has been chosen as one of our four Special Days of Prayer and focuses on gratitude for the harvest and the fruits oof the earth. Proper orations and a preface for Mass on this day are found in the Missal at Masses and Prayers for various Needs and Occasions, either its no. 28 (After the Harvest) or no. 49 (For Giving Thanks to God) along with their suggested prefaces. Options for scripture readings are found in Volume IV of the Lectionary (nos. 943-947 – In Thanksgiving to God).

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION | MONDAY, DECEMBER 8

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated as a holy day of obligation in 2025.

SOLEMNITY OF MARY, THE HOLY MOTHER OF GOD | THURSDAY, JANUARY 1, 2026

This is celebrated as a holy day of obligation in 2026.



There is perhaps no more beautiful celebration than when parents bring their newborn child to the waters of baptism. Parents, godparents, family, and friends share in this sacrament with incomparable joy. For in baptism, we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and through the outward signs of water and oil, are made *children of God* and given the hope of eternal life with Him.

"The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope." Through our Lord Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious. "Hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may bring. Because of this Christian hope, we can face the unknown trials of life with faith rather than fear.

We are called to be signs of hope to all people, especially those whose goodness, value, and dignity are undermined. As members of the Body of Christ, we carry this hope with us as we continue Jesus' mission on earth. Pope Leo XIV encourages us, "How important it is that each and every baptized person feel himself or herself called by God to be a sign of hope in the world today."

Sadly, there is a devastating absence of hope today. We see this most profoundly in a sweeping disregard for human life in its most vulnerable forms and stages. Abortion and assisted suicide are products of

hopelessness and despair. Yet even amid the increasing attacks on human life, we know that the "storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death."

We have been entrusted with a message of hope for the woman who finds herself unexpectedly pregnant or for the man diagnosed with a terminal illness. At these challenging moments, we must bring God's presence, witnessing to His love, and inspiring a renewal of hope in those whose hearts are burdened. For "hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross."⁵

Having been "buried with Christ in Baptism, we receive in his resurrection the gift of a new life that breaks down the walls of death." Confident of God's presence within us, may we share the Gospel of Life with those most in need of hope, knowing that "the grace of God precedes and accompanies his people as they press forward firm in faith, active in charity and steadfast in hope."

HOPE that Anchors Us

Facing the end of life, whether for ourselves or someone we love, can stir fear, sadness and deep questions about what lies ahead. Yet, in these moments, we are called to cling to a hope far greater than anything this world offers. Christian hope is not just a wish for things to improve; it is a certainty, rooted in a person who will never fail us. Our hope rests in the One who guarantees it—Jesus Christ, who holds our future in His hands.

So how do we truly live out this hope, especially when suffering weighs heavy?

Let us use the letters of the word "hope" to reflect more deeply on the assurance Jesus has given us.

Holding Fast to Christ -

Our hope is not in vague ideas but in Jesus Christ: God who took on flesh, loved us to the end, and conquered death. When life's final chapter feels uncertain, He remains our sure and steadfast anchor. We are held by a God who keeps His promises. "The mystery of the Redemption of the human person is in an astonishing way rooted in the loving involvement of God with human suffering. That is why we can entrust ourselves to God and to convey this certainty in faith to the person who is suffering and fearful of pain and death."

Overcoming Death

Through His resurrection, Jesus Christ, overcame death and gave us the hope of joining Him in eternal life. Eternal life is a relationship with our Lord who does not die, who is Life and Love itself. "Death is a decisive moment in the human person's encounter with God the Savior." Thanks to the grace of Christ, death is not the end of life but a promise of communion with God. This is the glorious future awaiting us, and the great hope that steadies us even now when we are suffering.

Persevering in Solidarity

The Gospel is not just information; it transforms. It changes our life and enables us to act. Since we know who holds our tomorrow, we can face today's fears with courage. This hope reshapes how we face suffering. It means living our final days not in despair, but with joy, offering our pain as prayer and witness.

This hope is not just for us; it is a light we pass to others. In hospice rooms, family conversations, and quiet acts of care for others, we become living reminders that no life is beyond God's reach. "The scene of the Cross provides a way of understanding that even when it seems that there is nothing more to do there remains much to do, because 'remaining' by the side of the sick is a sign of love and of the hope that it contains." Together, we can build communities anchored in solidarity that no illness or grief can destroy. We believe that every human

life, to the very last breath, has inestimable value and demands our protection and care.

Embracing Suffering

Jesus did not just observe human suffering—He entered into it. Our God chose to become like us! Love Himself chose to suffer with us, and that changes everything. Even when we feel alone, He is there, whispering, "I am with you." Our suffering becomes meaningful when united to Christ's suffering on the Cross. When we unite our pain with His, it becomes a share in God's redeeming work, a mystery where our deepest wounds become vessels of grace. This is the scandal of our faith: a God who did not spare Himself so that we would know we are never abandoned.

Isaiah the prophet tells us, "They that hope in the Lord will renew their strength" (Is. 40:31). In life's hardest moments, let us fix our eyes on our Lord Jesus Christ. He walks this path with us, redeems our struggles, and promises a dawn where every tear is wiped away. May His hope light our way, guiding us and our loved ones to our heavenly home with Him.

With great joy we celebrate October as Respect Life Month amid the Church's Jubilee Year of Hope. This Jubilee Year "offers us the opportunity to appreciate anew, and with immense gratitude, the gift of the new life that we have received in Baptism, a life capable of transfiguring death's drama." The life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ is the foundation of our hope. Through Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious.

Yet, the daily headlines remind us of how desperately our world is thirsting for the hope that only God can provide. Every day we witness the overwhelming disregard for human life: through rising rates of abortion and assisted suicide; the killing of innocent school children, even at prayer; the mistreatment of our immigrant sisters and brothers as they endure an environment of aggression; and political and ideological violence inflicted against unsuspecting victims. These attacks threaten life precisely when it is most vulnerable and in need of protection.

Despite these realities, the gift of human life exists as a sign of hope to our world today, defying the powers of darkness and the culture of death. It is of the utmost importance that we work to ensure that every life, in every stage and circumstance, is protected in law.

Earlier this year, history was made when Planned Parenthood and other big abortion businesses were banned from receiving federal Medicaid dollars for one year. I thank Catholics across the country who "The gift of human life exists as a sign of hope to our world today, defying the powers of darkness and the culture of death."

have embraced a <u>nationwide call to prayer</u> for the end of all taxpayer funding of abortion centers, and I ask that we continue those prayers throughout the month of October.

This Jubilee Year we are challenged to be agents of hope to those whose hearts are burdened by trial, difficulty, or suffering, offering them the hope that comes from Christ Jesus alone. *Walking with Moms in Need* and *Project Rachel Ministry* are just two examples of how the Church continuously reaches out with love, compassion, and mercy to those most in need of a message of hope.


