UPDATED SACREMENTAL RECORD GUIDELINES

The guidelines for recording sacramental records has been updated to include the OCIA process. Also, please note for confirmations happening with multiple parishes, the guidelines state...

RECIPIENTS FROM MORE THAN ONE PARISH

When more than one parish joins together (as in a cluster of parishes) for the celebration of confirmation, the pastor of each of the parishes involved is responsible to see to the recording of the confirmations of his parishioners in his own parish register and to notify the places of baptism. When confirmation is celebrated on a deanery level, the same responsibilities rest with the individual pastor of those confirmed.

RESPECT LIFE NEWS | "LIFE: OUR SIGN OF HOPE" - ANNUAL YOUTH ESSAY CONTEST

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Pro-Life Activities annually selects a theme highlighting the dignity of each person and respect for his or her life. The October 2025 – September 2026 theme is *Life: Our Sign of Hope*, highlighting our baptism, where we share in the life of Jesus, and our hope for eternal life.



In conjunction with this theme, the Diocese of Superior Respect Life Committee annually holds a pro-life youth contest, endeavoring to:

- 1. Help young people deepen their understanding of our God-given human dignity and what it means for our daily lives and decisions, particularly within the context of respect for human life, and
- 2. Move hearts and minds with the joyful Gospel of Life through the artistic expressions of the young participants.

The contest is intended for use across multiple age ranges and disciplines. Youth in grades 5-12 are eligible to enter. Contestant entries can be in essay or poem format. Please encourage your parish youth to participate in this initiative and engage them in the Catholic faith, help them grow in their relationship with Christ, and provide them an opportunity to bear faithful witness in our local community. VATICAN UNVEILED COMING TO MALL OF AMERICA® | JANUARY 10 - FEBRRUARY 1

SAINT PAUL, MN - While we wait and hope Pope Leo XIV will return to the Twin Cities – where he studied as a seminarian in the early 1980s – we know that 250-300 items from previous popes, saints and others are coming here this winter.

In celebration of the 175th anniversary of the Catholic Church in Minnesota, the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis is hosting Vatican Unveiled, an exhibit of the largest collection of papal artifacts outside of Rome. Father Richard Kunst, a priest of the



Diocese of Duluth, serves as curator of the exhibit. Father Kunst has a deep knowledge of the items and a passion for telling their stories.

This unique, historical collection will be hosted daily at Mall of America from January 10 – February 1, 2026. Some of the items will include a document with the second oldest papal signature outside of the Vatican and a Swiss Guard uniform from the time of Pius X so rare that the Swiss Guard asked to borrow it for their own exhibit.

The 19,000 square foot exhibit is open and welcoming to all, as people will experience interesting historical perspectives, artistic items with old-world craftsmanship, and papal artifacts that show the humanity behind the leaders.

News gatherers, content creators and show hosts are encouraged to tour Vatican Unveiled and speak with Father Kunst and Archbishop Bernard Hebda when each is available, as well as willing attendees. We are confident your readers, viewers and listeners will be interested in the educational and spiritual opportunities an exhibit like this presents.

Media day — with live broadcast opportunities starting very early in the morning — will be Friday, January 9. You will receive more information about media day in mid-December. You may find more details about the exhibit on the Archdiocese's <u>Vatican Unveiled</u> website, along with this media kit and special promotional video from Archbishop Hebda. Archbishop Hebda and the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis look forward to hosting you and your viewers, listeners and readers.

About Father Richard Kunst: Originally from Duluth, Minnesota, Father Richard Kunst was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Duluth in 1998. Prior to ordination, he worked in the political realm as a staff member for U.S. Senator Rod Grams of Minnesota. As a priest, Father Kunst juggles parish assignments as well as diocesan duties, including columnist for The Northern Cross and oversight of initial phases of the sainthood cause of Monsignor Joseph Buh. Father Kunst has a deep love for Church history as can be seen in the collection of papal and other artifacts he has curated.

Catholic Medical Association Guild

The following is a message from Amy Schneider, a doctor in Rice Lake, who is working with Bishop Power's blessing to establish a local chapter of the Catholic Medical Association. She writes:

"Catholic Medical Association was established in the early 1900's and is the largest association of Catholic physicians and healthcare professionals in the United States, with a mission to help physicians imitate Jesus Christ. Catholic Medical Association is active in a variety of areas, including working on public policy regarding bioethical issues, supporting the spiritual health of CMA members, providing resources for Catholic healthcare professionals faced with conscience protection issues, and more. Local CMA Guilds are active in over 80 dioceses around the country. Up until now, the Diocese of Superior has not had a CMA Guild, but that is hopefully changing! Together with Andrew Smith, seminarian for the diocese, and Father Adam Laski, who has agreed to be our chaplain, I'm trying to form a guild for our diocese. It is open to all healthcare workers (active and retired) and clergy, or really anyone interested in the questions of how to follow Jesus more closely through the practice of medicine. Our three specific goals for our Guild as we begin are:

- 1. Monthly virtual prayer meeting to pray for our patients, our workplaces, and any other intentions.
- 2. Yearly in-person event to include Mass, meal together, and an educational component that might be something like a speaker or presentation related to faith and medicine or bioethical concerns.
- **3.** Encourage the membership to join CMA at the national level and potentially attend the CMA annual conference (for those interested/able).

We are currently working on establishing our group as an official CMA Guild. Our first prayer meeting is scheduled for **Thursday, November 13, at 12:15 via Zoom,** link below. The goal is that perhaps people can join to pray on their lunch breaks. It should be 30 minutes at max and it is ok to either join late or step out early if needed. I'm aiming for the second Thursday of each month over lunch. If others in the membership have a different time they would like to suggest, please reply back and I can make a second meeting option. I certainly need all the prayer I can get.

NEW TRANSLATION OF RITUAL BOOK:

Order of the Anointing of the Sick and their Pastoral Care

This newly translated text will replace the Anointing ritual that has been in use since the early 1980's, Pastoral Care of the Sick: Rites of Anointing and Viaticum. Besides the newly translated texts, the structure of the ritual book has changed. The ritual from the 1980's was arranged in a manner suitable for use by both clergy and lay ministers. The new ritual text will be only for use by Priests and Deacons. However, as the implementation date approaches, the USCCB will ensure that non-ordained ministers continue to have access to those texts which they use in ministry to the sick and homebound. The newly translated rite may begin to be used as of February 11th, 2026 (the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes). Its use is obligatory as of April 5th, 2026 (Easter Sunday). Once information about the publishers is released there will be an opportunity for a diocesan bulk order of the new ritual books, timed so that they will be available for pick-up at our diocesan 2026 Priest Assembly / Mass of Chrism – Sunday, March 22nd through Tuesday, March 24th. catholicdos.org/ritual-books-neweditions

SYNOD ON SYNODALITY IMPLEMENTATION STAGE 2025-2028

Within the implementation stage of the synod, our local Church is called to receive the directives of the <u>Final Document</u> of the Synod and begin to apply them through a process of accompaniment and evaluation. In review of the Final Document, the Diocese of Superior has identified that much of what is expressed and expected of the local Church is already in process through our Maintenance to Mission initiative and pastoral plan. As a diocese, we will continue follow the <u>Pathways for the Implementation</u> through our Maintenance to Mission Initiative. While we remain on this journey, **please continue to recite the Synodal Prayer at Mass at a minimum of one weekend per month**. SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE | SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 23

The Solemnity of Christ the King, a feast born out of resistance to totalitarian incursions against religious liberty, is an excellent opportunity to preach about religious liberty, both in the United States and abroad. In 2025 Christ the King is also the date we celebrate our Eucharistic Consecration as a diocese, culminating our "33 Days to Eucharistic Glory" spiritual pilgrimage initiative—a catalyst for ongoing faith. Begun on October 22, 2025, the diocese now formally consecrates itself to the Lord Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist, fostering in us a deeper, more personal and lifelong surrender to Christ's presence in the Eucharist.

THANKSGIVING DAY | THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 27

In the diocese of Superior, Thanksgiving Day has been chosen as one of our four Special Days of Prayer and focuses on gratitude for the harvest and the fruits of the earth. Proper orations and a preface for Mass on this day are found in the Missal at Masses and Prayers for various Needs and Occasions, either its no. 28 (After the Harvest) or no. 49 (For Giving Thanks to God) along with their suggested prefaces. Options for scripture readings are found in Volume IV of the Lectionary (nos. 943-947 – In Thanksgiving to God).

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION | MONDAY, DECEMBER 8

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated as a holy day of obligation in 2025.

SOLEMN CLOSING OF THE JUBILEE YEAR | | SUNDAY, DECEMBER 28

SOLEMNITY OF MARY, THE HOLY MOTHER OF GOD | THURSDAY, JANUARY 1, 2026

- IV. Bishop Powers' Report
 - a. Catholic Charities Supreme Court Case

As was presented at the last meeting, the U.S. Supreme Court voted 9-0 in favor of Superior Catholic Charities. Since the ruling, the State of Wisconsin has not honored the decision but are rather trying to figure out ways to work around the decision. Dan Blank explained that the state wants to find a way around the decision and are trying to figure out how to change the law that was declared unconstitutional in order to tax the Church. The State Division of Industry and Labor seems to want to fight this battle. There are a second set of briefs to go to the Wisconsin Supreme Court declaring that the U.S. Supreme Court should hold precedence.

b. Jubilee Year

The Mass at St. Joseph, LaPointe in August was a wonderful event, drawing over 175 people from all over the diocese. Hopefully we are hearing about signs of hope during homilies. The group shared that the Webster Cluster took about 50 people on a pilgrimage to Holy Hill and are participating in reading the Bible sessions. The Frederic/Grantsburg cluster took a pilgrimage to Champion. The Mellen Cluster took a pilgrimage to LaPointe. The Ladysmith teachers took pilgrimage to LaPointe. The Somerset Cluster had a group go to Superior Cathedral and they also say the Jubilee prayer at their meetings.

c. Immigration

When we refer to immigration, we are referring to our working with the status of our international priests. It has not been easy. Once we understand what's going on, things change and unfortunately, this has become the norm. It's not just the Catholic church struggling with this situation. The Green Card process is backed up 2-3 years. Now we have about 2-3 international priests that will need to go back to India for a year in order to come back to serve our diocese. We ceased starting green card status because of the backlog and how difficult it is with them being gone for a year. We are only working for green cards for those priests who have home dioceses that allow them to stay for more than five years.

This process for bringing in international priest's costs about \$5000 per priest. If priests have to go back for year, we are stuck. Our immigration attorney encourages our laity to contact representatives to work on this process. Councilors asked if someone could send out a common language to say to representatives. The hope is that the USCCB and other religious organizations would be able to work with Congress to drop the year length to a month. The question was raised if there was an advantage to advocate for one individual priest. The answer is no. It's the greater process that is the issue.

Keep praying for vocations. We currently have seven seminaries, a good number of men in Diaconate, and an increased emphasis on women religious through Friends of the Bridegroom.

d. 33 Days to Eucharistic Glory

The diocesan consecration to the Eucharist will run Oct 22-Nov 23. A donor is buying the books for any diocese in the world who wants to do this as a diocese. Bishop has asked the parishes to organize small groups to discuss. The hope is that small faith sharing groups continue on into the future. This has been a real boost in the locations that have already done the consecration. The group was asked if the parishes are participating – it appears that yes, everyone has heard about their parishes participating.

V. Discussable Items

a. Catholic Herald

The Catholic Herald is the major form of communication for the diocese. What and how people read has changed drastically. We are running in the red with the budget. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee publishes our paper. The Dioceses of Green Bay and Madison used to also be a part of it, but they have pulled out. We are setting up a committee to work with the Archdiocese of Milwaukee to determine if there is a better way to communicate with the people.

The Archdiocese of Milwaukee is also using Flocknote. Many dioceses have gone to a monthly magazine. The Somerset Cluster uses Flocknote and Dcn. Larry commented that it is very simple and easy to get messages to people. The Eagle River Cluster also uses Flocknote. Pam Berdal mentioned that she also gets the Catholic Herald and the Diocese of LaCrosse magazine. Many councilors commented that it is nice to have a hard copy rather than reading online.

For the elderly/home-bound it would be nicer for them to receive a hard copy – some don't have access to electronic version. Keeping the home-bound connected in some way is important. Merrill Cluster uses Flocknote, but Stephanie says she appreciates the hard copy articles as well. Many newspapers and magazines give options of hard copy or online. The Somerset Cluster takes all of their extra Catholic Heralds to the home-bound when they visit them.

The personal story angle is helping more people want to read the newspaper. So, more information of "around the diocese" would get more people to read. People want local news. Having state-wide information is nice. Mixing up the columns would be beneficial. If you have any ideas please send them to Dan Blank, Anita Draper or Steve Tarnowski (starnowski@catholicdos.org).

b. Blessing at time of Communion

First a little background – Within the Roman Missal of the Mass, the only time in the Mass that a blessing should be administered is at the end of Mass – the final blessing. Many times, since Vatican II, our diocese, along with several diocese throughout the world, were experimental dioceses. One of those experiments was giving permission to invite everyone who professed to be Christian could receive Communion. It was believed that the Eucharist was the greatest unity of Christians, however it is clear that there is not unity in the belief of the Eucharist – true presence of Jesus. Back over thirty years ago under Bishop Fliss, that experiment was stopped.

As a result of this, we have a practice in our diocese of individuals who are unable to receive communion, coming forward, crossing their arms, and receiving a blessing. We are going to continue allowing those to come forward and arms crossed, however, as has already been part of the instruction, only clergy can offer the blessing and lay Eucharistic ministers cannot.

Most of the printed missalettes, have a statement in them that the reception of the Eucharist is only for a Catholic in good standing. The Presbyteral Council is working on a statement to announce before communion to help people understand what we believe and what those who cannot receive should do.

c. Diocesan Office Manager Reports

- i. For a lot of legal and insurance reasons, each parish needs to be identified as independent each parish is a corporation with Bishop as the president. If there is a cluster letterhead with a combined name, each parish needs to still be identified as an individual parish with their legal name and Inc. We do have a lawsuit in our diocese right now. It is against the individual insurance company, the diocese, the parish and the cluster. The cluster will be taken out because it is not a legal entity.
- ii. The CSA supports a lot of salaries and programs throughout the diocese. Please encourage participation. We are anticipating turnover on diocesan staff due to retirements please help us to encourage people to apply.
- iii. There are a lot of great things offered from the diocese Oct. 24 Fall Conference on Artificial Intelligence Oct 28 finance department "the Great Bookkeeper Get-

- together" January and February Men's and Women's Retreats (we would love to see more men participate).
- iv. There are six men in the Permanent Diaconate program. The Rite of Candidacy is next week.
- v. The School of Servant Leadership has 19 people participating. One of the sessions now covers Evangelization and Missionary Discipleship.
- vi. The Office of Parish Transformation Chris Newkirk, Peggy Schoenfuss and Fr. Andrew Ricci have been meeting with all the clusters and parishes in the diocese with a focus on evangelization and the pastoral plan. Goal setting will be coming up.
- d. <u>Diocesan Pastoral Plan</u> and Diocesan Goal Setting (*Chris Newkirk*)
 In the same way parishes have been asked to submit goals by May 15, the diocese is also doing this. Diocesan staff and clergy have also been working on this. We will be working on the dreams for the diocese as a whole and for the diocesan staff. The end result will be to bring the dreams from all these groups to the Presbyteral Council who will prioritize for Bishop and staff to set the goals for the diocese. Councilors broke into small groups to discuss goals and then each group presented their suggestions.
