

ANNUAL CEMETERY & COLUMBARIUM CERTIFICATION REPORT IS DUE FEBRUARY 6

The State of Wisconsin mandates that each cemetery establishes and maintains a Perpetual Care Fund for the future upkeep of parish cemeteries. The Chancery office will report to the State on behalf of all parishes. This year the state-required report covers cemetery activity between January 1st and December 31st, 2025. The Chancery office will report to the State on behalf of all parishes, based on your completed form. If your parish has a cemetery and/or stand-alone columbarium (NOT in the cemetery), a 2025 Cemetery Certification Request form must be completed. Forms were mailed January 7th. An instructional webinar was held December 10th in an effort to answer topical questions and concerns regarding the Cemetery reporting process and completing the form. 


ANNUAL STATUS ANIMARUM QUESTIONNAIRE: SAQ2025

Considering Diocesan needs when moving forward, “looking back” in the form of the Status Animarum Questionnaire (SAQ) is beneficial and necessary. The SAQ2025 was sent via Survey Monkey February 2nd to the email addresses that were confirmed available to receive it. For those who did not reply to the Jan 7 request for email verification, the survey was sent to the email address that received the SAQ2024 last year.

“LIFE: OUR SIGN OF HOPE” - ANNUAL YOUTH ESSAY CONTEST

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Committee on Pro-Life Activities annually selects a theme highlighting the dignity of each person and respect for his or her life. The October 2025 – September 2026 theme is ***Life: Our Sign of Hope***, highlighting our baptism, where we share in the life of Jesus, and our hope for eternal life.

In conjunction with this theme, the Diocese of Superior Respect Life Committee annually holds a pro-life youth contest, endeavoring to:

1. Help young people deepen their understanding of our God-given human dignity and what it means for our daily lives and decisions, particularly within the context of respect for human life, and
2. Move hearts and minds with the joyful Gospel of Life through the artistic expressions of the young participants.

The contest is intended for use across multiple age ranges and disciplines. Youth in grades 5-12 are eligible to enter. Contestant entries can be in essay or poem format. 


NEW FACES AT THE CHANCERY!

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



Once again, under the direction of Bishop Powers and the Presbyteral Council, our diocese will be celebrating our 3rd Annual Safe Haven Sunday during the first weekend of Lent, February 21st - 22nd. In 2024 the theme, "Equipping the Family, Safeguarding Children," was meant to draw our attention as a diocese to the seriousness of the issue of pornography and to recommit ourselves to take steps to ensure our homes are safe havens for all. In 2025 the theme, "Having Critical Conversations", was meant to guide parents and other adults in having the difficult discussions on pornography with their children. In 2026, the theme, "Safety Through Connection," is meant to emphasize the importance of strong family bonds to protect children from online dangers. 
EXTREME FAITH CAMP PARISH REGISTRATIONS UPDATE

Get ready to lead with purpose! The Diocese of Superior's 2025-2026 School of Servant Leadership is back – and you won't want to miss it!


This inspiring series of presentations is designed for those who feel called to lead -- in the Church, in the community, or in the workplace – and who recognize that true leadership begins with service.

NEW TRANSLATION OF RITUAL BOOK: *Order of the Anointing of the Sick and their Pastoral Care*

This newly translated text will replace the Anointing ritual that has been in use since the early 1980's, "Pastoral Care of the Sick: Rites of Anointing and Viaticum". Besides the newly translated texts, the structure of the ritual book has changed. The ritual from the 1980's was arranged in a manner suitable for use by both clergy and lay ministers. The new ritual text will be only for use by Priests and Deacons. However, as the implementation date approaches, the USCCB will ensure that non-ordained ministers continue to have access to those texts which they use in ministry to the sick and homebound. The newly translated rite may begin to be used as of February 11th, 2026 (the Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes). Its use is obligatory as of April 5th, 2026 (Easter Sunday). Once information about the publishers is released there will be an opportunity for a diocesan bulk order of the new ritual books, timed so that they will be available for pick-up at our diocesan 2026 Priest Assembly / Mass of Chrism – Sunday, March 22 - Tuesday, March 24. catholicdos.org/ritual-books-new-editions

ANNIVERSARY OF CATHEDRAL OF CHRIST THE KING DEDICATION | THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 5

This celebration ranks a feast day in the diocese and as a solemnity at the Cathedral. Mass orations are taken from the Common of the Dedication of a Church, Anniversary of Dedication. (Form "A" is used at the Cathedral and form "B" is used elsewhere in the diocese.) Scripture readings are from the Lectionary at numbers 701-706.


34TH WORLD DAY OF THE SICK | FEBRUARY 11

World Day of the Sick is sponsored by the Vatican's Pontifical Council for Health Pastoral Care and has been celebrated since 1992 on the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. This celebration reminds us to pray for all who are sick and to recognize and honor healthcare workers and caregivers.

"The compassion of the Samaritan: loving by bearing the pain of the other" is the theme chosen by the Holy Father for this World Day of the Sick. This year's theme is centered on the Gospel figure of the Samaritan who manifests love by taking care of the suffering man who has fallen into the hands of thieves. This is intended to emphasize this aspect of love for one's neighbor: love needs concrete gestures of closeness, through which we take on the suffering of others, especially those who are ill, often in a context of fragility due to poverty, isolation and loneliness.

FACULTY TO CONFIRM

The question of who possesses faculties to confirm can be confusing (Canon 883). By the law itself, a priest may lawfully confirm in virtue of office or mandate when:

- He baptizes an adult.
- He receives a previously baptized non-Catholic into full communion.
- He readmits into full communion a previously baptized Catholic who apostatized from the faith.
- He readmits into full communion a previously baptized Catholic who through no personal fault was instructed in or adhered to a non-Catholic religion.
- He confirms a baptized Catholic in danger of death.

A priest must, however, request the faculty to confirm a baptized Catholic if this person:

- Was baptized (Catholic) before the use of reason and un-catechized.
- Never belonged to another church.
- Never apostatized from the faith.
- Never left the church.

In the situations stated, the priest must request in writing, the faculty to confirm from Bishop James Powers to facilitate the above process. 

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Rules on General Absolution

Pastors are reminded that use of General Absolution (or “Form III”) of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is forbidden except in cases of grave necessity as defined by Canon Law and the Apostolic Letter Misericordia Dei. This form of the Sacrament may not be celebrated without explicit permission from Bishop James Powers.

ASH WEDNESDAY, SPECIAL DAY OF PRAYER | WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and one of the prescribed Special Days of Prayer in the Diocese of Superior. The focus of this day is for the general needs of humankind. While the scriptural readings and texts must be for those of Ash Wednesday, the idea of the needs of humankind may be woven into the Prayer of the Faithful and/or be reflected in the homily. Operation Rice Bowl begins.



RITE OF ELECTION / CALL TO CONTINUING CONVERSION (FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT) SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 22

The Rite of Election / Call to Continuing Conversion is always celebrated on the First Sunday of Lent. It will be celebrated in 2026 on Sunday, February 22nd at the Cathedral of Christ the King in Superior. The liturgy, which is not a Mass, begins at 3:00pm with Bishop Powers presiding. All parishes are asked to submit the names of their catechumens (unbaptized) and their candidates (already baptized) who will take part in this annual liturgy in Superior. 

EASTER VIGIL | SATURDAY, APRIL 4, 2026

Earliest allowable start times by sunset:

45 minutes after sunset

This year, the celebration of the Easter Vigil occurs on Saturday, April 4th, 2026. In order to ensure sufficient darkness, at least 45 minutes (preferably one hour) should elapse after sunset before the Vigil may begin. The following sample is the listing of the time of sunset in key parishes in our Diocese (from East to West), and the earliest the Easter Vigil should begin there. Parishes to the North and South of these locations would use similar times.


SYNOD ON SYNODALITY IMPLEMENTATION STAGE 2025 - 2028





Our Sign of Hope



There is perhaps no more beautiful celebration than when parents bring their newborn child to the waters of baptism. Parents, godparents, family, and friends share in this sacrament with incomparable joy. For in baptism, we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and through the outward signs of water and oil, are made *children of God* and given the hope of eternal life with Him.

"The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope."¹ Through our Lord Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious. "Hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may bring."² Because of this Christian hope, we can face the unknown trials of life with faith rather than fear.

We are called to be signs of hope to all people, especially those whose goodness, value, and dignity are undermined. As members of the Body of Christ, we carry this hope with us as we continue Jesus' mission on earth. Pope Leo XIV encourages us, "How important it is that each and every baptized person feel himself or herself called by God to be a sign of hope in the world today."³

Sadly, there is a devastating absence of hope today. We see this most profoundly in a sweeping disregard for human life in its most vulnerable forms and stages. Abortion and assisted suicide are products of

hopelessness and despair. Yet even amid the increasing attacks on human life, we know that the "storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death."⁴

We have been entrusted with a message of hope for the woman who finds herself unexpectedly pregnant or for the man diagnosed with a terminal illness. At these challenging moments, we must bring God's presence, witnessing to His love, and inspiring a renewal of hope in those whose hearts are burdened. For "hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross."⁵

Having been "buried with Christ in Baptism, we receive in his resurrection the gift of a new life that breaks down the walls of death."⁶ Confident of God's presence within us, may we share the Gospel of Life with those most in need of hope, knowing that "the grace of God precedes and accompanies his people as they press forward firm in faith, active in charity and steadfast in hope."⁷

Hope that Anchors Us



Facing the end of life, whether for ourselves or someone we love, can stir fear, sadness and deep questions about what lies ahead. Yet, in these moments, we are called to cling to a hope far greater than anything this world offers.

Christian hope is not just a wish for things to improve; it is a certainty, rooted in a person who will never fail us. Our hope rests in the One who guarantees it—Jesus Christ, who holds our future in His hands.

So how do we truly live out this hope, especially when suffering weighs heavy?

Let us use the letters of the word “hope” to reflect more deeply on the assurance Jesus has given us.

Holding Fast to Christ

Our hope is not in vague ideas but in Jesus Christ: God who took on flesh, loved us to the end, and conquered death. When life's final chapter feels uncertain, He remains our sure and steadfast anchor. We are held by a God who keeps His promises. "The mystery of the Redemption of the human person is in an astonishing way rooted in the loving involvement of God with human suffering. That is why we can entrust ourselves to God and to convey this certainty in faith to the person who is suffering and fearful of pain and death."¹

Overcoming Death

Through His resurrection, Jesus Christ, overcame death and gave us the hope of joining Him in eternal life. Eternal life is a relationship with our Lord who does not die, who is Life and Love itself. "Death is a decisive moment in the human person's encounter with God the Savior."² Thanks to the grace of Christ, death is not the end of life but a promise of communion with God. This is the glorious future awaiting us, and the great hope that steadies us even now when we are suffering.

Persevering in Solidarity

The Gospel is not just information; it transforms. It changes our life and enables us to act. Since we know who holds our tomorrow, we can face today's fears with courage. This hope reshapes how we face suffering. It means living our final days not in despair, but with joy, offering our pain as prayer and witness.

This hope is not just for us; it is a light we pass to others. In hospice rooms, family conversations, and quiet acts of care for others, we become living reminders that no life is beyond God's reach. "The scene of the Cross provides a way of understanding that even when it seems that there is nothing more to do there remains much to do, because 'remaining' by the side of the sick is a sign of love and of the hope that it contains."³ Together, we can build communities anchored in solidarity that no illness or grief can destroy. We believe that every human

life, to the very last breath, has inestimable value and demands our protection and care.

Embracing Suffering

Jesus did not just observe human suffering—He entered into it. Our God chose to become like us! Love Himself chose to suffer with us, and that changes everything. Even when we feel alone, He is there, whispering, “I am with you.” Our suffering becomes meaningful when united to Christ’s suffering on the Cross. When we unite our pain with His, it becomes a share in God’s redeeming work, a mystery where our deepest wounds become vessels of grace. This is the scandal of our faith: a God who did not spare Himself so that we would know we are never abandoned.

Isaiah the prophet tells us, “They that hope in the Lord will renew their strength” (Is. 40:31). In life’s hardest moments, let us fix our eyes on our Lord Jesus Christ. He walks this path with us, redeems our struggles, and promises a dawn where every tear is wiped away. May His hope light our way, guiding us and our loved ones to our heavenly home with Him.

Catholic Devotions

What Are Devotions?

Devotions are ways that we can express our love for God. Participating in the Sacraments and the Liturgy of the Church are the primary ways this happens, but devotions support that participation by saturating our everyday life with prayer; to “pray without ceasing,” as 1 Thes 5:17 says. While there is a wide variety of popular devotions, their shared quality is that they provide consistency and stability to our prayer.

What Devotions Are Not:

It is possible for devotions to be distorted in ways that hinder faith, like through superstition or content that misrepresents God’s character. Thankfully, there are many time-tested devotions that can enrich our spiritual life and help us to grow in our love of God and neighbor.



“This man was righteous and devout...”

The Presentation of the Lord is a great example of devotion: Mary and Joseph by fulfilling the requirements of the Mosaic Law – even though they would be exempt by their unique circumstance – and Simeon and Anna by faithfully “awaiting the consolation of Israel” (Lk 2:25). Both show us why it is important to remain consistent in prayer in daily life, even when we are unable to see its effects.



There are many forms of devotion to the **Blessed Virgin Mary**. The most well-known is the Rosary. Another is praying the **Angelus** throughout the day (usually at 6am, noon, and 6pm), which reminds us that God has come into the world and continues to come into our lives.

“With the Rosary, the Christian people sits at the school of Mary and is led to contemplate the beauty of Christ’s face and to experience the depths of his love.”
- St. John Paul II, Rosarium Virginis Mariae

Mary has been given many titles to show her unique role in the Church and in the lives of each of the faithful. The **Litany of Loreto** contains many such titles and can provide a new perspective on who Mary is to us.

The Sacred Heart of Jesus

Popular devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus comes from the repeated appearances of Jesus to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in the 17th century. While devotions to Jesus' Passion and his Five Wounds already existed, a number of new practices spread due to the promises attached to them, including the Holy Hour and reception of Holy Communion on First Fridays. Other practices include the **Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus** and **prayers of consecration**.

“O most Sacred, most loving Heart of Jesus, Thou art concealed in the Holy Eucharist, and Thou beatest for us still.” - St. John Henry Newman



The Holy Name of Jesus

Reverence for Jesus' name and its power is found throughout the New Testament. From Jesus' promise that everything asked of God in his name will be given (Jn 16:23) to the declaration that all of creation should kneel at his name (Phil 2:10).

Litany of the Holy Name of Jesus



Two of the most widespread prayers centered on the Holy Name of Jesus are the **Hail Mary** and the **Jesus Prayer**. Even his name alone is an all-encompassing prayer, since Jesus is present in the heart of the one who calls on his name (CCC 2666-2668).

*Jesus Prayer
Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God,
have mercy on me a sinner.*



The Stations of the Cross or Way of the Cross

This meditation on Jesus' Passion developed from pilgrims' practice of following in Our Lord's footsteps through Jerusalem. Although the Stations are frequently prayed during Lent, they can be prayed at any time. They are a way to make a spiritual pilgrimage to Calvary and to renew gratitude toward God.

The Holy Angels

The Church teaches that each of the faithful have an angel as a personal protector and guide, and the Catechism reminds us that the angels are constantly present and helping the Church (CCC 334-336).

Devotion to your Guardian Angel – or to all the holy angels – as a powerful intercessor and friend is a sure way to grow closer to God and overcome temptation (as the angels cheer you on! Lk 15:10) Some devotions to the Angels include saying the **Prayer to Your Guardian Angel** regularly or praying the **Chaplet of St. Michael**.
