TWENTY SEVEN GRADUATE TONIGHT

Twenty seven graduates will receive their diplomas from Father Sharpe this evening as they bid adieu to Sacred Heart High School. For the majority of them tonight's ceremonies will mark the end of their formal education. Beginning tomorrow, most of them will be "on their own," faced with entirely new problems and new difficulties and surrounded by different associates.

The past four years have been very important ones in the lives of these graduates, more important, perhaps, than they themselves realize. They have been instructed in various branches of knowledge and have been given an opportunity to fit themselves for a useful and happy life. To what extent they have taken advantage of this opportunity will be shown in large measure by the manner in which they acquit themselves from now on. Their future lives will be the carrying out in practice of the things they have learned in school. They will soon realize whether they have learned, during their high school course, to mark or to loaf, to handle problems or to depend on others. More important than their academic training has been the moral and religious training they have received. They have heard over and over again that the one great purpose of their earthly existence is to know, love, and serve God. They have been taught to make their lives a continual prayer, to consecrate their every action to God. And they have developed in their own lives habits of regular prayer and a deep appreciation of the value and necessity of Mass and the Sacraments.

Tonight as they receive their diplomas in front of the altar, the chief quest will be Christ, the head of the Catholic School System. These graduates are His children and they are brought before Him, presented to Him as products of the schools that carry His cross and keep Him as the chief Student Adviser. And their graduation exercises will come to a solemn close as they kneel before Him for His blessing.

On behalf of the entire parish we extend to them our sincere congratulations, trusting and praying that they will dedicate their future lives to the spread of the truth they have learned, to the practice of the moral goodness they have been taught, to the advancement of Christ's kingdom in their various walks of life.
