





Sacred Heart High School Class of 1950 A Golden Anniversary Retrospective



The annual Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom will be held again this year at Dearborn Inn on Wednesday, April 26th. This is undoubtedly the social affair which our high school students look forward to with great eagerness. As in past years, we recognize that it is your last word of interest and encouragement as well as helpful planning that will make that evening an occasion of joy for all concerned. Our pupils themselves realize that this annual affair is really a nicer one than most schools enjoy. It seems an opportune time then, for home and school to impress upon the students that if such a lovely traditional social is to continue in S. H. S., they must be willing to meet the standards set for them on this occasion. The school counts the time and labor which such an affair demands of the faculty well spent and willingly given if each boy and girl repays it in perfect obedience to the wishes of mother and dad, gratefully sharing of the joys of the evening with mother and dad.

Since hundreds of dollars go into making the banquet and prom at the Inn a gala affair which is possible only because parents and interested friends supported the students' earlier activities, it seems only reasonable that the pleasant hours spent together at the Dearborn Inn should suffice for one evening. Therefore, we ask that none attend any public place after the prom nor ride around for any time after it. Each one of you fully realizes that your job is made easier when other parents make the same demands, so we appeal to the parents of the girls to remind them that it is the courteous young lady who suggests the homeward wending to her escort. We depend upon the parents of the boys to show them that riding around even after taking the young ladies home is entirely out of place.

The banquet begins at seven-thirty. Dancing ends at twelve-thirty and all are expected to be out of the Inn by one o'clock. The school can assume no responsibility for the boys and girls after they leave the Inn. Each parent must decide what is the reasonable time for his son or daughter to be home. The school may not allow the pupils to be free on the following day. They must be in school on Thursday morning by 10:30.

As willing as mothers may be, everyone understands that family circumstances may not permit every home to welcome the son or daughter and companions in after the prom. However, we can assure you, parents, that in the past three years where the home could and did invite them to bring a small group in for a snack ("snacks" seem the "must" nowadays) that act of thoughtfulness was most appreciated both by the boy or girl and the friends.

When selecting the date for this event, the Juniors were mindful that it was the feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel. Incidentally, Wed. the 26th is also the feast of the Solemnity of St. Joseph. Under such patronage the occasion is bound to be a happy one. May Our Blessed Lady and St. Joseph, those dearest friends of the Sacred Heart, bless you and yours for the whole-hearted cooperation and sincere appreciation which you have always evidenced towards the Sisters. May we also take this opportunity to thank especially for the many kindnesses shown us during this school year?
