"You will soon be paired by an electronic computer with all the people at your school who best suit your personality!"

So reads the blurb put out by Contact Computer Corp. in Boston, a company that promises to find you an ideal date for the dance.

An ideal date! Imagine! Sound too good to be true? Well it's not, not if you'll fill out a questionnaire (and be honest about it!), send in 53 cents, whisper a hasty prayer . . . and let the machine do the rest.

Dating by computer is THE thing for high school dances and is a sure-fire way of finding out if that dreamboat way back in the last seat of your history class really is your Romeo or Juliet.

Students who sign up for a computer dance are given a number and asked to fill out a questionnaire. Completed questionnaires are returned to the company where they are run through a computer to find the best possible boy-girl combinations.

On many questions the student describes both himself and his ideal date. Included are questions on his height and his ideal date's height, the length of his hair and the length of hair he prefers on a date, his looks (handsome, very good looking or average) and his ideal date's looks and his and her personality.

Mark Robertson, a senior at Sacred Heart Dearborn, decided to take a chance on a computer dance held last weekend at Our Lady of Lourdes.

HE FILLED OUT his questionnaire and described his ideal date as a girl who had average or long hair, between 5'2" and 5'6" tall, in the upper half of her class scholastically, interested in sports and talkative.

Mark, who is about 5'9", good looking and has short light brown hair, described himself as being talkative, interested in sports (he's the captain of the football team), having above average marks and a very good sense of humor.

When he got to the dance Friday night he matched the number he had with the other

"It was pure chance," he says, "pure chance." Chance aided by the fact the odds at the dance were three to one—three girls to one boy.

Jack Sockowicz, Sacred Heart senior, also took a chance on the computer and had 14 ideal dates.

"I described myself honestly and then tried to beat the system by calculating which answers would get me the most dates," he said with a grin.

Jack described his ideal date as a talkative senior girl about 5'4", with average length blond hair.

FELLOWS WEREN'T the only ones who did well in the dating game though. Therese Terns, Sacred Heart freshman

who says she put "average" down for every question, had eight ideal dates.

There are some pitfalls to the computer dating game though, for the computer, electronic marvel that it is, is not error proof. Neither are the ideal dates.

One young man from Our Lady of Lourdes spent the evening moaning, "My ideal dates are giants, all giants."

In another big goof, the computer paired a football player with another male who had described his ideal date as a petite feminine blond.

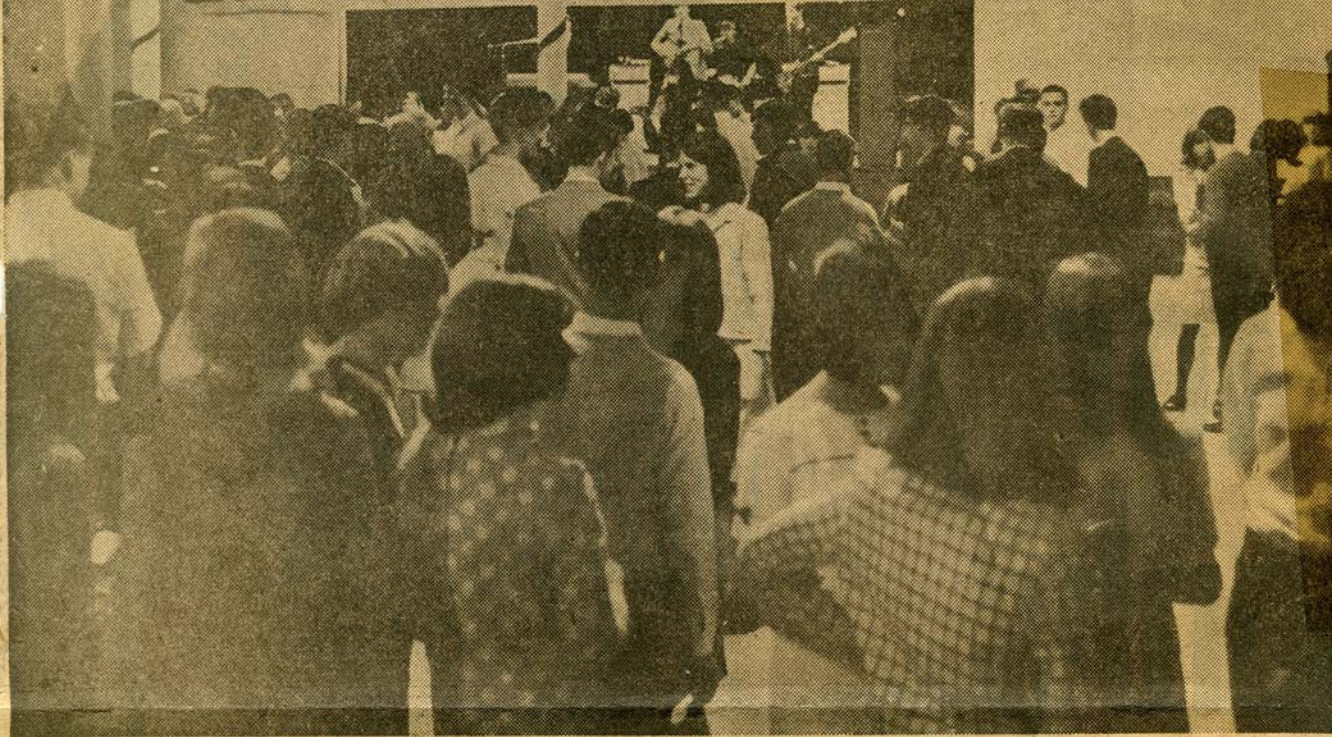

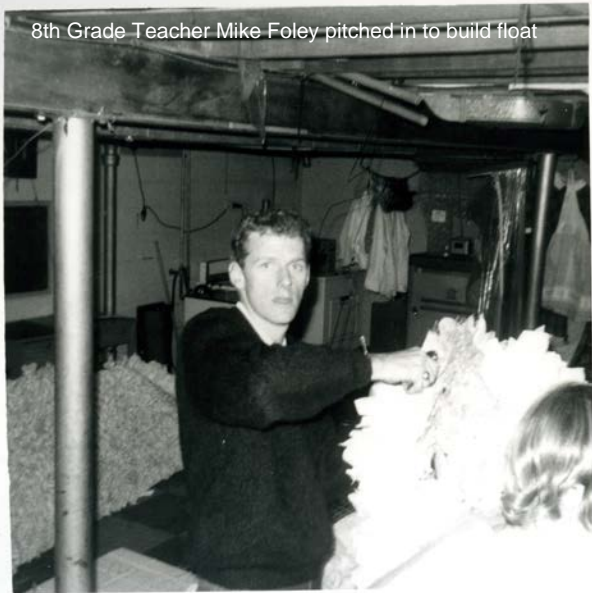
