They Form a School

When the Wall, Terna and Knoke children arrive for classes at the Sacred Heart school in Dearborn, they just about fill the place.

The three families send a total of 22 children to the school. The Walls have eight youngsters enrolled and the Ternas and Donohues have seven each.

The crowd of children doesn't bother Sacred Heart's principal, Mother Marie Isabel, DCM.

"Families of five and six youngsters are not uncommon here," she said. Eight is the most we've ever had from one family, though.

"All the children are very well behaved. We're proud of them."

ONE UNUSUAL note is that the school has exactly 1,500 children: 987 in the elementary and 513 in high school.

The oldest child in each of the three families is a girl. Their job is to make sure all

their younger brothers and sisters arrive at school on time.

"It's not too much responsibility," remarked Georgia Terna, 15, of 22507 Morley, Dearborn. "The kids take care of themselves pretty well."

"The biggest problem is the ones who dilly-dally around when they're supposed to be getting dressed," added Mary Ann Donohue, 16, of 22317 Edison, Dearborn.

"We're supposed to leave home at 7:35 a.m. and some of them never seem to be ready."

THE PROBLEM is compounded for pretty Kathrynne Wall, 17, of 2060 Academy. She has to drive her seven brothers and sisters to school in the morning, take the three youngest home at noon and return for afternoon classes.

"At times it's fun," she admitted, "but it can be a lot of trouble, especially, sometimes when I have to stop and get gas."

Her charges include twin brothers, Tom and Tim, 7. They wear identical outfits except

for shoes. Tom wears black and Tim, brown.

"That's so we can tell them apart," said Mother Marie Isabel.

All the girls agreed that the biggest handicap of having so many brothers and sisters is when their boy friends come to call.

"They make you feel like some animal in the zoo, the way they stare at you," complained Kathrynne.

"THEY USUALLY climb all over the boy," added Mary Ann. "And it's impossible to get them all upstairs or out of the house at one time."

Besides Kathrynne, the other Walls attending the school include Peter, 14; Mary Ann, 13; Joseph, 12; Clara, 10; Tom and Tim and Charles 8.

The other Ternas are Margaret, 14; William Jr., 13; Mary, 12; Michelle, 10; Kateri, 8, and Theresa 6. The Donohues also have Dolores 15; William Jr., 14; Robert, 13; Helen, 12; John, 11, and Karen, 10.
