Informal Reception for Graduates

IHM recorded Chronicle found of Events of the school 1929-June 1930, 1930-31

On August 16 Mother Mary Louis and Sisters Mildred and Evarilda, Laura, Patrice, Marie Helene and Ann Louise left Marygrove for Sacred Heart Convent where Sisters Antoinette, Mary Luke and JOvita from St. Mary's Convent, Monroe, joined them.

September 10 Sisters Alphonsine and Cephas made a short call on their way to Marshall. On the following day Mother General left Sister Lutegarde with us till noon. Then she left us for Wayne where she was to nurse Sister Charlotte. A few days later Sister Mary Hubert brought on(e) of our former stuents Sister Florent Gillet (Agnes Crowley) to see her father who was seriously ill. Friday of the same week brought to us Sisters Immaculata and Myra, also Siter Mary Clemens.

Activities in February the students took an active part in the breaking of ground for the new Sacred Heart Church. In the same month the eighth grade and high school students in the local essay contest the subject of which was "The Value of Life Insurance". As result of their efforts the following students were awarded prizes in March.

In the Oratorical Contest sponsored by the Michigan Catholic for Catholic High School Students at the Cathedral Central High School Auditorium March 8, 1929 one of our Seniors—Edward Kirk—was awarded second prize.

Rev. F.W. McQueen DD Pastor of St Vincent Church, Detroit delivered a scholarly address upon this happy occasion.

On account of the burning of St. Mary's Academy Monroe, Michigan on June 3, it was impossible for our Sisters to return to the Mother House for their annual vacation and retreat, therefore, our Pastor, Rev Father Sharpe kindly offered Sacred Heart Convent for the use of the Community during vacation. Rev. Mother gratefully accepted his kind offer. Therefore, June 22 closed the Scholastic year of 1928-1929 and opened the Vacation Home for the Sisters appointed for this Convent.

June 23: The laying of the Corner Stone for the new Sacred Heart took place.

"Lights Golden Jubilee" was celebrated with great splendor here in Dearborn in October. During the Celebration. During the celebration on(e) of our seniors, Miss Kathleen Cotter received a silver Loving Cup for having written the best essay on the Celebration. All the schools of Dearborn and Fordson competed. Miss Cotter's success brought great honor to Catholic Parochial Schools.

Sister Antoinette spent Thanksgiving at St. Mary's Monroe with her aunt, dear Sister Flora who was not well at the time.

School closed for the Christmas holidays on December 22.

Sister Mildred went to Monroe for the Reception of our Holy Habit given to her niece Sister Ann Margaret.

On March 2 an elimination Contest was held in the Auditorium to determine the successful contestant. Eleven Freshmen and Sophomores declaimed. Miss Regina Ryan was chosen to represent Sacred Heart School in the District Contest held at the Sacred Heart Seminary. Though not receiving first honors she reflected great honor on her school.

The School was also enrolled in U of D debating League and came through with flying colors until the Second Elimination, when they lost to Royal Oak.

Toward the close of the year three recitals were given by the Music Pupils at the school. At the Senior Recital held June 8 1930 the Detroit Automobile Club presented the Safety Patrol of SH School with a beautiful loving Cup for efficiency in Patrol work. This was their second cup. On the evening of June 16<sup>th</sup> the Graduating Exercises were held in our beautiful new Church. Sixteen Graduates received their diplomas. Rev. Joseph Fillion preached the Sermon. Thus closed a very successful year. On June 22 the Sisters left for their Summer home: five for Monroe, five for Marygrove. Sister Mary Louis had completed her sixth year in Dearborn.
