3rd Grade Eagles Read! Book Trivia Annotations

Please read the two REQUIRED books before the first day of school August 2023.

<u>REQUIRED</u>—**Flat Stanley** by Jeff Brown—Stanley Lambchop is an ordinary boy. At least he was, until the night his bulletin board fell off the wall and flattened him. (Fantasy Fiction)

REQUIRED —**Judy Moody was in a Mood** by Megan McDonald—"Judy Moody was in a mood. Not a good mood. A bad mood. A mad-face mood." (Humorous Fiction)

Gladys the Magic Chicken by Adam Rubin—Gladys the dancing chicken goes on an epic adventure when she is mistaken for a magical chicken who grants wishes to those she encounters. (Humorous Fiction)

Dirt Book: Poems About Animals that Live Beneath Our Feet by David L. Harrison—A collection of poems about dirt and the many organisms that live there such as grubs, moles, earthworms, chipmunks, etc. (Poetry)

The First Cat in Space Ate Pizza by Mac Barnett—Something terrible is happening! Rats are eating the MOON! There's only ONE hero for the job, a bold and fearsome beast . . . a cat. (Graphic Novel—Humorous Fiction)

Haven: a Small Cat's Big Adventure by Megan Wagner Lloyd—When Ma Millie becomes too sick to care for her, Haven's cozy life is turned upside down, so she decides to find another human for help. (Animal Fiction)

Blue: A History of the Color as Deep as the Sea and as Wide as the Sky by Nana Ekua Brew-Hammond—Explores the history and cultural significance of the color blue. (Informational text)

Unbound: the Life + Art of Judith Scott by Joyce Scott—An introduction to the life and art of Judith Scott, a renowned artist with down-syndrome. (Picture Book Biography)

The Legend of Gravity: a Tall Basketball Tale by Charly Palmer—With Gravity on the team, the Eagles feel unstoppable until they face-off against the Flyers and realize they need more to bring them to victory. (Sports Fiction

Leave It to Plum! by Matt Phelan—At the Athensville Zoo, peacocks are allowed to wander freely among the visitors. Curious Plum is the peacock most proud of their responsibility. (Animal Fiction)

The Secret Garden of George Washington Carver by Gene Barreta—The inspirational story of George Washington Carver and his childhood secret garden. (Biography)

J.D. and the Great Barber Battle by J. Dillard—J.D. has a big problem: he's gotten his first and worst home haircut. When the insults become too much for J.D., he takes matters into his own hands. (Realistic Fiction)

Lion of Mars by Jennifer Holm—When a mysterious virus breaks out in the U.S. settlement on Mars, Bell and his friends must work together to save their home and the rest of the planet. (Science Fiction)

The Best of Iggy by Annie Barrows—Tells the story of the three times that nine-year-old Iggy got into trouble, two of which he does not regret and one for which he is very, very sorry. (Humorous Fiction)

Stella by MaCall Hoyle—Stella used to be a bomb-sniffing dog, but after a terrible accident, she goes to live on a small family farm to recover from her fear of loud noises. (Animal Fiction)

Swish: the Slam-Dunking, Alley-ooping, High-flying Harlem Globetrotters by Slade, Suzanne—The true story of the high-flying Harlem Globetrotters--the team that changed basketball forever. (Informational text)

Help Me, Mr. Mutt: Expert Answers for Dogs with People Problems by Janet Stevens and Susan Stevens Crummel—Mr. Mutt, Canine Counselor, has solutions to the most sticky dilemmas. (Humorous Fiction)

Bartali's Bicycle: the True Story of Gino Bartali by Megan Hoyt—The true story of Gino Bartali, a beloved Italian cyclist, and a secret champion in the fight for human rights during WWII and the Holocaust. (Biography)

Memoirs of a Tortoise by Devin Scillian—Oliver the tortoise looks back on his happy life as he wonders why his pet human, Ike, who he has had for eighty years, has stopped visiting the garden. (Animal Fiction)

Rock by Rock: the Fantastical Garden by Nek Chand by Jennifer Bradbury—The true story of artist Nek Chand and how his secret--and illegal--art project became one of India's most treasured wonders. (Biography)

The Oldest Student: How Mary Walker Learned to Read by Rita L. Hubbard—The inspiring and incredible true story of the nation's oldest student, Mary Walker, who learned to read at the age of 116. . (Biography)
