Shrine's new St. Michael statue honors World War II hero

CHAMPION — A decorated World War II veteran was honored at the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help on Sunday, Nov. 8, just three days shy of Veterans Day.

A statue of St. Michael the Archangel was dedicated and blessed by Father of Mercy Peter Stryker, shrine rector, in honor of Edwin Gerlikowski, a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army. The statue stands in a devotional grotto, behind the shrine, which honors those who have served in the military.

Gerlikowski, a Green Bay native who died in 1994, was a recipient of the Soldier's Medal for heroism and the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service. When he was deployed to Europe, Gerlikowski asked his mother, Helen, to continue making her weekly visits to the shrine to pray the rosary and ask the Blessed Mother for his safe return.

Gerlikowski, who had a strong devotion to the Blessed Mother, carried a finger ring rosary with





him to war. According to his family, Gerlikowski promised the Blessed Mother that he would do something special for the shrine if he made it home safely from the war.

The soldier did make it home from battle, but not before witnessing the atrocities perpe-

trated by the Nazis in Germany. On April 29, 1945, Gerlikowski's 42nd Rainbow Infantry Division liberated approximately 30,000 prisoners at Dachau concentration camp.

"I asked the students where they wanted to go next year — a spiritual type of mission trip or a work-type mission trip again," Deacon Trzinski said. "They said they wanted to do something with their hands to help people. All that excitement from a mission trip burns out quickly."


