Homeless Shelter puts wheels in motion

St. John the Evangelist Homeless Shelter volunteers create Spokes 4 Hope

GREEN BAY — Tom Mayhew spins the rear tire of a bicycle secured firmly on a repair rack. The rotations cause a grinding noise. Mayhew, tools in hand, examines the derailleur and makes a slight adjustment. The next tire spin is smooth and steady. The bicycle is ready for the road; ready to provide a means of travel and more independence to a homeless person in the city.

Spokes 4 Hope, a bicycle repair program in cooperation with St. John the Evangelist Homeless Shelter, is back in service. The program, which opened in the St. John the Evangelist Church rectory garage last September, was shut down during the winter months and has since reopened in a space in the rectory basement. Spokes 4 Hope grew out of a conversation between Tony Pichler and Paula Rieder, members of the ministry team at the homeless shelter.

"Many times, for people on the streets, bikes are their primary mode of transportation. A year and a half ago, we were talking about how many bikes were


sitting in the racks here at St.
John's in disrepair," said Pichler,
co-director of the Norbertine
Center for Spirituality in De Pere.
"What would it take to get a bike
repair program started? How can
we get those bikes back in good
repair and give people back the
mobility that they need?"

The program got off to a good start, in part through a

generous donation.

"I met a woman named Donna Marie. I don't even know her last name," explained Rieder, coordinator of pastoral ministry at St. Raphael the Archangel Parish in Oshkosh. "She said, 'I have some bikes, can you use them?'

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Emperors and kings

August was named for Augustus Caesar, by vote of the Roman Senate, in 30 B.C. During Augustus' reign (27 B.C.-14 A.D.) Jesus was born.

2 Tiberius Caesar (14-37 A.D.) appointed Pontius Pilate procurator of Judea (26-37 A.D.). Pilate ordered Jesus' death,

3 Herod the Great was King of Judea when Jesus was born. He rebuilt the Second Temple --- which Jesus knew well — in Jerusalem. It was destroyed in 70 A.D.

Peter and Paul were martyred in Rome during the reign of Nero Caesar (54-68 A.D.), who began persecuting Christians in 64 A.D., after the great Fire of Rome.

5 Constantine, who became Caesar in 306 A.D., signed the Edict of Milan in 313. It ended persecution of Christians.

Three things never to say to 'former Catholics'

The odds of having a loved one who is no longer practicing his or her Catholic faith are high. One in 13 Americans describe themselves as "former Catholics." This may mean that they are no longer attending Mass but they might still have a tenuous connection to Catholicism in terms of a lingering religious identity. I want

to make you mindful of avoiding language which is damaging and hurtful.

"Once you leave, you can't come back"

Not only is this statement not true, it implies that we - rather than the will of God - are in control of a person's life. Many who leave the Church state that they are scared to come back because they are afraid

of judgement and condemnation from family members, friends and parish staff. If someone is brave enough to come back to the Catholic Church we should be as compassionate and understanding as we can be. Remember the parable of the Prodical Son? The Father waited for the son and welcomed him back with open arms. So should we.

"God doesn't love you anymore"

A teenager told her mother that she didn't know if she believed in God any more. Her

mother responded "if you don't come to Church and practice your faith, God won't love you anymore". God's grace, regardless of whether we see it or not, is still active and working in a person's life. The call to eternal life, the Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, comes "totally from God's decision" and surpasses "all power of human intellect and will". (CCC1998). God does love us and will always love us.

"You are going to Hell"

Few, if anyone, has ever been converted to Catholicism by angry finger wagging judgmentalism. We cannot be united to God unless we freely choose to love him (CCC1033). We might not agree with the road a loved one is walking but we are called to pray for them and at the right time to challenge them in love to help them grow. God predestines no one to go to hell (CCC1037) and neither should we.

A far better statement to those who are away from the Church is to live a life of faith that is a shining beacon and witness to Christ. They might not listen to what you say, but they will notice what you do. Be consistently Catholic and do so with joy and love in your heart! That in itself speaks volumes.
