

Pew kneelers are repurposed into wall-sized rosaries

SHAWANO --- In what used to be the milk house on her family farm, Mary Lou Kugel dips a clean, soft yellow cloth into a container of Danish oil, then transfers the pungent compound onto the cross of an over-sized wooden rosary.

From the cross, she works her way up the one-and-one-halfinch-long rectangular beads. rubbing the oil thoroughly around each side, top and bottom, then moving on to the next and the next and the next.

By the time she's done with the finishing, Kugel will have 28 wallsized rosaries, each unique, ready to present as gifts --- and for the special purpose that begat the rosary project in the first place.

"Last year we went down to the storage room at Sacred Heart Church in Shawano," Kugel recalled, "and they had some pews and kneelers left from when the church was remodeled a few years ago.

"They needed the storage space, and my husband Chuck and I said we'd take the kneelers," she said. "Chuck tinkers

in woodworking, so we figured we'd use them for something."

Although her family belongs to St. Martin of Tours Parish in Cecil, where she lectors and is an extraordinary minister of holy Communion, Kugel is coordinator for the Rural Life Days celebration at the church in Shawano. which shares a priest with St. Martin, Fr. Thomas Farrell.

After last year's Rural Life Days at Sacred Heart, Kugel was think-

ing about what she could use for door prizes for the 2019 celebration. An idea to turn the wood from Sacred Heart's old kneelers was inspired by two large wooden rosaries that adom walls in her own home, one from the wood of the home she grew up in and another from black walnut trees on her grandfather's farm.

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5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

The Lord's baptism: Jan. 13

- 1 The Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord ends the church's liturgical season of Christmas.
- 2 Before 1955, the Lord's Baptism was marked on the Octave (Eighth Day) of Epiphany. (In 1955, the Vatican suppressed many octaves and therefore began this feast.) Before 1955, it was called the "Commemoration of the Lord's Baptism." Today, it is celebrated on the Sunday following Jan. 6.
- In the Eastern Orthodox and Catholic churches, this feast is known as the "Theopharry," because all Three Persons of the Trinity are manifest together.
- 4 Jesus' baptism is considered as the start of his public ministry.
- 5 In 1979, St. John Paul II began the custom of popes baptizing babies on this feast.

'Follow Jesus' Discipleship Formation Seminar

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

Recently in writing about the sexual abuse crisis in the church, I shared that strengthening our friendship with Jesus and growing

Bishop David Ricken in holiness will help us to overcome evil. That's why over the past couple of years the diocese has offered training to help people grow in their relationship with Christ through our Discipleship Formation Seminars. Last month, as part of a yearlong series on discipleship, I highlighted the first seminar called "Discover Jesus." In this column, I want to focus on the second seminar called

Getting to know someone is the first step in any relationship, and with Christ this is no different. But in order to live as a disciple of Christ, we must commit to following Jesus. We see this distinction throughout the Gospels.

"Follow Jesus."

One example of the difference between discovering Jesus and following Jesus is the story of the "Rich Young Man" recorded in three of the four Gospels. In this story, the young man asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life, and in responding to the

young man's question, Jesus outlines the cost of discipleship. Upon hearing the cost, all three writers report that this young man "went away sad." His sadness illustrates that while he had discovered Jesus, he was not willing to follow Jesus.

Following Jesus is more difficult because there is a cost. While we must weigh this cost, Jesus also reminds us of the benefits of following him. After the rich young man leaves sad, Jesus tells those that remain, "Everyone who has given up houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother for the sake of my name will receive a hundred times more and will inherit eternal life" (Mt 19: 29).

The "Follow Jesus" seminar helps us to understand and accept the cost of disciple-ship. Our journey as a disciple begins in baptism, but simply being baptized does not make a person a disciple. The word disciple comes from the Greek word mathetes, meaning pupil/student of the master, so to be a disciple means we are willing to place ourselves before Jesus to learn from him. He is our leader and teacher and in all things we must follow him.

In this seminar, we present "The 10 Habits of a Disciple's Life." These habits help us to center our lives more fully on Jesus and follow him more closely.

Filipino Catholics kick off traditional 'Simbang Gabi' celebration

ALLOUEZ — Very few countries are home to more Catholics than the Philippines. As of 2010, according to the Pew Research Center, there were about 76 million Catholics living in the Philippines, which is made up of over 7,000 islands. About eight in 10 Filipinos identify themselves as Catholic.

The Diocese of Green Bay is home to an enthusiastic community of Filipino Catholics, and anyone not familiar with just how exuberant Filipinos are about the Christmas season, should know that celebrations in the Philippines actually begin in September.

But Dec. 16 is a key day during Advent, as Filipinos look ahead to Christmas Day. It is that day that the devotional nine-day series of Novena Masses, referred to as "Simbang Gabi" — "Misa de Aguinaldo" or "Misa de Gallo" begins.

Filipino Catholics in the Diocese of Green Bay and other parts of the state gathered Dec. 16 at Resurrection Church in Allouez for this first Mass that will lead to Christmas Day. Seven Filipino priests concelebrated in Tagalog, the national language of the Philippines, with an estimated 250 people in attendance.

Missionaries of Faith Fr.
Judah Pigon, administrator of St.
Benedict Parish, Suamico, and St.
Pius, Little Suamico, planned the
liturgy. This is the sixth year the
celebration was held.
