Catholic Identity and Faith Formation

No one who lights a lamp conceals it with a vessel or sets it under a bed; rather, he places it on a lampstand so that those who enter may see the light. Luke 8:16

Our faith is demonstrated and lived every day and our faith teaches the sanctity of each human being. At St. John Bosco we strive to help students become fully human – mind, heart, imagination, and soul – in an environment where students feel safe to discover their unique identity and gifts and where all human life and differences are valued.

We convey our Catholic teachings through classroom materials, field trips, participation and preparation of weekly liturgies, school assemblies, service projects, prayer experiences, behavior expectations, school celebrations, co-curricular activities, and the physical environment of the school building.

Most importantly, the religious education of our students goes beyond the daily religious instructional minutes in the classroom. Staff model our Catholic virtues through their interactions with the students as well as with each other. Additionally, we recognize that parents are the first teachers of the faith and we work in partnership with them to guide and educate our students as stewards of the Catholic faith. Students are provided with religious service opportunities that allow the children a way to live out these values and experience them personally in their own lives.

HOW WE LIVE OUR FAITH:

- Weekly Mass for 5K - 8th grade students (4K students attend Mass once a month)
- All school and grade level service projects including letters, placemats, cards, mobiles, etc.
- Daily prayers as a school and in class
- Service-based field trips to Door County Medical Center and Cardinal Ridge
- School-wide events centered around our faith – Blessing of the Animals, Catholic Schools Week, Grandparent's Day, Veterans Day, Stations of the Cross and the Living Rosary
- 8th grade students attend Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception while on their annual trip to Washington D.C.
- Food drives for Maplewood Parish Food Pantry, Feed My People and Thanksgiving baskets.
- Baby items donated to the Christ Child Society.

How did Jesus love his disciples? By living life with them. In a sense, we love our students; by knowing them deeply, by teaching them, by being an example to them on how to live out their life. By holding them accountable. By challenging them. By training them. By forgiving them. By being a leader for them and then asking them to do the same with others.

As we journey with them toward discipleship. We shouldn't have eyes for only what we see on the outside.

The important distinction with Christian discipleship is that

we are not only called to learn the teachings of Jesus Christ, we are also called to live them. A disciple, who bases his or her life on the teachings of Christ "like a person building a house, who dug a deep hole to lay the foundation on rock" (Luke 6:48). When we make our initial declaration of faith and ask Christ to be our Savior, He will begin changing us from the inside, giving us the ability to understand His word and the desire to live it.

This change happens in many ways. Here are a few examples of how God changes us from the inside:

- As we read God's Word, we learn about Jesus and how He lived. We begin to understand what it means to be like Jesus. We learn to put Him first in all things (Mark 8:34-38).
- We become equipped to listen to the Holy Spirit, who lives within us. He helps us resist temptation and overcome trials (Ephesians 6:10-18).
- We learn how to examine our thoughts, actions, and words—always comparing them with Scripture. We want to be doers of the Word, and not hearers only (James 1:22).
- We begin to understand what it means to "abide in Christ." As we abide, the Holy Spirit produces fruit in our lives—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These aren't things we can conjure up on our own. They are produced by the Holy Spirit—a change from the inside out (Galatians 5:22-23).
- We start loving other people through action (John 13:35).

We long to share our faith with others and tell unbelievers about the changes Jesus has made in our lives (1 Peter 3:15).

And while it is true that when we become Christians, we're called to make disciples of others, we must remember that discipleship must start somewhere. Nobody becomes a disciple-maker overnight. God knows our hearts; He understands that we're going to have to take baby steps to get from point A to point B. So, don't let all that "make disciples" talk frighten you away from seeking Christ and becoming His disciple.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

Becoming a high performing school takes many years of hard work. There is no silver bullet – no single thing we can do to ensure high student performance. At SJB we are focused on this quest – Committed to Excellence by everyone doing their work. Below are the nine characteristics of a high performing school and what we reflect on periodically as a staff asking ourselves how we measure up.

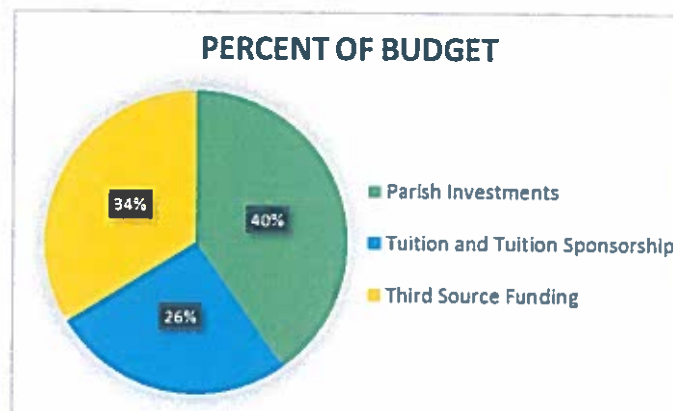
1. **A clear and shared focus:** Everyone knows where they are going and why. The focus is on achieving a shared vision, and all understand their role in achieving the vision. The focus and vision are developed from

common beliefs and values, creating a consistent direction for all involved.

2. **High standards and expectations for all students:** Teachers and staff believe that all students can learn and meet high standards. While recognizing that some students must overcome significant barriers, these obstacles are not seen as insurmountable. Students are offered an ambitious and rigorous course of study.
3. **Effective school leadership:** Effective instructional and administrative leadership is required to implement change processes. An effective leader is proactive and seeks help that is needed. They nurture an instructional program and school culture conducive to learning and professional growth.
4. **High levels of collaboration and communication:** There is strong teamwork among teachers across all grades and with other staff. Everybody is involved and connected to each other, including parents and members of the community, to identify problems and work on solutions.
5. **Curriculum, instruction and assessments aligned with standards:** The planned and actual curricula are aligned with the essential academic learning requirements. Research-based teaching strategies and materials are used. Staff understands the role of classroom and assessments, what the assessments measure, and how student work is evaluated.
6. **Frequent monitoring of learning and teaching:** A steady cycle of different assessments identifies students who need help. More support and instructional time are provided, either during the school day or outside normal school hours, to students who need more help. Teaching is adjusted based on frequent monitoring of student progress and needs. Assessment results are used to focus and improve instructional programs.
7. **Focused professional development:** A strong emphasis is placed on training staff in areas of most need. Feedback from learning and teaching focuses extensive and ongoing professional development. The support is also aligned with the school mission and goals.
8. **Supportive learning environment:** The school has a safe, civil, healthy and intellectually stimulating learning environment. Students feel respected and connected with the staff and are engaged in learning. Instruction is personalized and small learning environments increase student contact with teachers.
9. **High level of family and community involvement:** There is a sense that all have responsibility to educate students, not just teachers and staff in schools. Families, as well as businesses, social service agencies, and community resources, all play a vital role in this effort.

These characteristics of a high performing school provide a rigorous framework to assist us in our on-going school improvement.

Finances



Parish Investments (\$355,000) = 40%

Tuition and Tuition Sponsorship (\$231,250) = 26%

Third Source Funding (\$298,750) = 34%

At St. John Bosco, we are very aware of the investment that is being made in our children by the parishioners, parents, and community members. We take seriously our responsibility to be fiscally responsible with decisions we make. The above figures are what has been budgeted for the 2018-2019 year. Third Source Funding includes our Golf Outing, Annual School Fund Drive, Gala of Giving, and other donations.

Special Project Grants and Donations (\$117,959)

Special Projects are not part of our general school budget and it is necessary to fund these projects thru grants and donations. Our current STEM, (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) initiative, PLTW, (Project Lead the Way) is a nationally recognized program and will be in phase II during the 2019 – 2020 school year. Minor projects are also underway and will continue into the summer.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Our eighth annual school musical presentation of The Little Mermaid was a definite highlight of our year. The students in grades 5 – 8 began their preparation in February for the performance in April. Their hard work and commitment resulted in performances exceeding our expectations. We are especially proud of the great cooperation and respect shown by the students for one another in working together to make the production a success. This year we fielded three basketball teams of various grades and genders. The focus was continued growth in their skill set along with teamwork and sportsmanship. Two math teams competed at T.J Walker Middle School in the Door County Math Competition held in March. Of the thirteen teams competing, one of our teams placed 6th. Prior to the competition students refined their skills in problem solving, numerology, formulas, probability and statistics and algebraic reasoning. Not only did the students develop confidence in their ability to reason and solve problems but

they gained insight as to its application to real world situations. Student Council provided students an additional opportunity to provide leadership and service to the community. Their year began with a baby supply drive for young mothers and ended with a school countdown celebration of the last 10 days of school.
