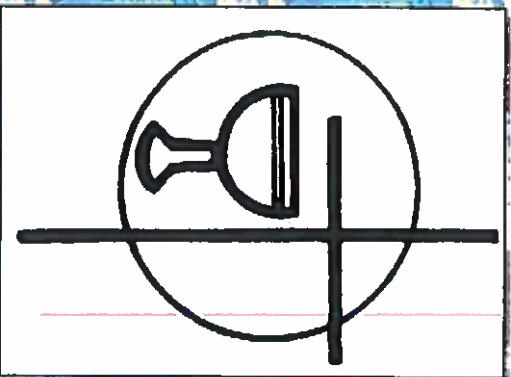



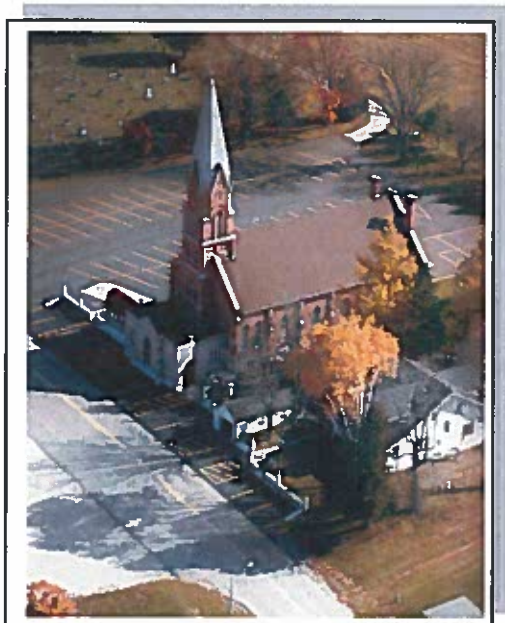

Green Bay Habitat for Humanity's Faith Build seeks parish volunteers

GREEN BAY — No construction experience necessary. Next month, the second annual Greater Green Bay Habitat for Humanity Faith Build, in partnership with Thrivent will begin, and volunteers from churches are invited to reserve dates.

"Saturday, July 13, is our first day with volunteers," said Jennifer Maier, volunteer director. "We learned last year that doing it in the spring is hard, because we don't know when we can start in the spring."

"Our big thing that we tell churches is just pray for our continued success and safety," she added. "You can volunteer at the build site and fund raise in any capacity." Thrivent matches up to \$65,000 in donations from parishes, churches and faith-based organizations for the Faith Build. The average cost of a Habitat home is \$130,000.

Gary Van Handel of SS. Edward and Isidore Parish in Flintville volunteered at last year's Faith Build on Western Avenue in Green Bay. It was his first Habitat for Human-

ity experience. Van Handel, a retired project manager for the Jacobs Group, became interested when a colleague mentioned his volunteer experience with the organization. The parish involvement in the Faith Build provided the perfect opportunity for Van Handel.

"I started last May with the Faith Build and I've worked on about eight or nine homes this

last year," he said. "I started coming every week. I enjoy it. It's great exercise, a lot of fun, great team building and you get to meet different people. We had a small team from the parish last year. I'm hoping we get a few more this year, so I get to know more people from the parish."

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In our catechesis on the Acts of the Apostles, we have seen that the church's evangelizing mission begins with the resurrection of Christ. As the disciples, together with Mary, waited in the Upper Room for the fulfillment of Jesus' promise of the Holy Spirit, they were united in prayer. From the beginning, the church appears as a communion, a community, the People of God. Christ's choice of 12 Apostles shows the continuity between the church and the people of Israel. After the defection of Judas, the apostles were conscious that his place in the 12 had to be taken by another. Guided by Peter, the community as a whole joined in prayer to discern the Lord's choice of Matthias. Jesus had told his disciples that they would be known by their love for one another (Jn 13:35). The visible communion of the apostles was their first form of witness to the Risen Lord and his saving love.

Compass writer pens three books about Civil War-era Catholics

APPLETON — Many people write books. But not many write a vision statement to guide their writing. Amanda Lauer of Appleton has.

"It (the vision statement) is basically 'to write wholesome books that are going to change the world,'" Lauer told The Compass. "I want to make a difference in people's lives."

To that end, Lauer, a freelance writer for The Compass, has written a trilogy set during the Civil War that tells the love stories of three separate Catholic couples caught up in the War Between the States.

The books — "A World Such as Heaven Intended" (2014), "A Life Such as Heaven Intended" (2018) and "A Love Such as Heaven Intended" (April 2019) — all begin in the same

month (May 1864) and end in the summer of 1865, after the war has ended. And, while they are stand-alone stories, the books also interweave the characters' lives. For example, the heroine (Amara McKirnan) of the first book is the sister of the hero (Michael McKirnan) in the third.

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Martha of Bethany

1 July 29 is the feast of St. Martha of Bethany. Martha is the sister of Lazarus and Mary. Jesus stayed at her house when in Jerusalem.

2 Only the Gospels of Luke and John mention Martha.

3 Martha's statement of faith in Jesus — "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God" (Jn 11:27) — was made at her brother's grave.

4 Martha is the patron saint of homemakers, cooks, waiters and waitresses.

5 She is often depicted as slaying a dragon. A medieval legend said Martha tamed (not killed) a dragon (a fictional dragon-like hybrid creature known regionally as a Tarasque) in Provence, France.

Responding to Christ's knock

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

Over the past few months, I have used my column to reflect on the first step of discipleship: discovering Jesus. I shared my story of discovering Jesus and invited you

to consider how Jesus has been present in your own life. Last month, I used the example of Mother Teresa to explore what it means to be a friend of Jesus and accept the love that he offers us every day. I hope that my words have provided encouragement for you to open your life more to the love of God and grow more deeply in your friendship with Jesus.

As we begin to take these first steps, at some point we find ourselves faced with a decision to make — either we accept Jesus as our Lord and commit to following him, or we turn away from him, making something or someone else (often ourselves) the center of our lives. Facing this decision can be a bit scary, but we must remember that Jesus will never force us into a relationship.

One of my favorite paintings is based on Revelation 3:20: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock." The painting, which has been reproduced by many artists, shows Jesus standing outside a home, knocking on the front

door. What is surprising is that there is no door knob on the outside of the door. According to art historians, the painter depicted this as a way to show that Jesus will never violate a person's free will. Only the person inside the home can open the door to let Christ in. What a beautiful depiction of Christ's gentleness and patience with us!

So what are we to do when we hear Christ knocking at the door of our heart? Sometimes it can be tempting to pretend we're not home. After all, inviting Jesus in means that we are willing to give up control and that can be pretty unsettling for us. What if Jesus wants to rearrange the furniture? Or what if Jesus doesn't like the same TV shows that I like? What if Jesus asks me to do something that I don't want to do?

In some ways, these concerns are legitimate. When Jesus enters into our lives, we are faced with the truth that not all of our decisions are good for us. Recognizing this truth means that we will need to make some changes and this can be difficult to accept.

But before you ignore Christ's knock, remember why Jesus wants to be part of your life in the first place. Jesus doesn't want to change you, he wants to love you. Sometimes, out of love, Jesus calls us to recognize how certain choices we make cause pain and hurt. But even in revealing our brokenness, Jesus will always walk patiently with us.
