GOSPEL MEDITATION

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Freedom properly defined is freedom properly understood. The Cambridge Dictionary tells us that it is, "the condition or right of being able or allowed to do, say, think, etc., whatever you want to, without being controlled or limited." That same dictionary defines liberty as, "the freedom to live, work, and travel as you want to." Both definitions sound very similar. Is there a difference between freedom and liberty? Many are accustomed to believing that freedom and liberty are interchangeable and simply involve possessing rights and privileges. For the Christian, however, there is a big difference between the two.

St. John Chrysostom directs that "the only person who is free is the one who lives for Christ." There are many other inspirational people throughout history who see freedom as something far greater than liberty. True and properly understood freedom has little to do with entitlement or self-promotion. For the believer, it is a matter of the heart and soul. Freedom (and liberty, for that matter), seen only in terms of the world, can quickly be taken away. The freedom spoken of by St. John Chrysostom can only be lost by personal choice. When one lives for Christ, they live in pursuit of virtues that enlighten one's soul (faith, hope, and love) and strengthen one's character (justice, fortitude, temperance, and prudence). Rather than having the ability to acquire or do more things, true freedom asks us to be detached. Privileges, rights, and responsibilities are important, but they do not define us.

The world is not always open to listening to the truth. "I am sending you like lambs among wolves," Jesus tells his disciples. The secular definitions of freedom and liberty are very attractive. They promise us a great deal. It is no wonder Jesus asks his disciples to travel with very little. The Gospel is not dependent upon things or anything those with worldly power or investment can say or do. When one chooses to live for Christ, they choose to live with peace. That's what true freedom will give us. If we do not want what Christ offers, we can close the door, and the messenger will walk away. Distracted by the lure of personal liberties, we risk losing our freedom. We will not have anything truly life-giving to share with others. ©LPi

Middle schoolers: stay tuned for a FUN and faith filled night coming your way soon! Parents, keep an eye out in your email for dates and happenings.



Hispanic resource center's co-founder retiring

GREEN BAY — It's been 10 years since Casa Alba Melanie opened its doors as a Hispanic resource center for the Green Bay area.

For Sr. Melanie Maczka, executive director and namesake of Casa Alba Melanie, she said she knows this is the right time to retire, leaving the work left to be done with the Hispanic community in the capable hands of longtime staff, volunteers and newly-announced executive director Amanda Garcia.

A founder of Casa Alba Melanie, Sr. Melanie's official retirement date was May 27, though she will still be working with Garcia for a time as she learns her new role at Casa Alba Melanie.

A day of celebration was held May 24, honoring not only Sr. Melanie, a member of the Missionary Sisters for the Church of the Divine Spirit based in Chihuahua, Mexico, but also Norbertine Fr. Ken De Groot, also a founder of Casa Alba Melanie. Though he had already retired, that

hasn't stopped him from volunteering — generally for several hours each day. At age 87, his plan is to step back from volunteering.

Casa Alba Melanie's mission "is to nurture the well-being and wholesome development of all members of the Hispanic community living in the greater Green Bay area." It is located at

314 S. Madison St., not far from St. Willebrord Church at 209 S. Adams St., where Green Bay's ministry to the Hispanic community really got its start, explained Fr. De Groot — and it all began with a knock on the rectory door.

From seven to eight: vicariate changes in the diocese

ALLOUEZ — With 156 parishes and 285,000 Catholics in the 16 counties that make up the Diocese of Green Bay, how does the bishop keep in touch with the pulse of the people in the pews?

One way is through the vicariate system that links parishes into regional groups. These regional divisions are also required by canon law. Started in

the 1970s by Bishop Aloysius Wycislo, the Green Bay Diocese was divided into 12 vicariates. In 2009, Bishop Ricken reduced that number to seven, following a plan undertaken by Bishop David Zubik before his assignment to Pittsburgh.

"In order to properly care for the many people and ministries within our diocese, my predecessors established vicariates or regions within the diocese to better focus the work of the church,"

Bishop Ricken explained. "Each vicariate has had a priest assigned as its regional vicar, whose task has been to be the bishop's representative in the field."

Regional vicars assist parishes and their pastors or pastoral leaders in maintaining parish sacramental registries and overseeing the spiritual and financial health of the parishes.

Keys, not Stars and Stripes

1 July 4 is about the Stars and Stripes. But the Vatican's national flag is yellow and white. It dates to June 7, 1929, when the Vatican became a city-state.

2 Its proper name is the Vatican City flag. It is also called "the papal flag" and bears the papal tiara and two crossed keys on the white half of the flag.

3 Even though it's yellow and white, those colors represent gold and silver.

4 The crossed keys on the Vatican flag are shown as gold and silver, representing the power of heaven (gold) and earthly power (silver), both held by the pope.

5 The Vatican flag is one of only two square-shaped national flags in the world. The other is Switzerland's.
