

#### GOSPEL MEDITATION

23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time



What virtue is the cornerstone of discipleship? Love. Jesus preached about it, lived it, and summarized his greatest commandment featuring it. Love is in our DNA. To follow Jesus, then, is to follow the path of love. While this may appear to be an attractive and easy option, it most assuredly is not. Authentic love always comes with sacrifice. It is the complete giving of oneself to another. The sacrificial character of love always requires that we leave something aside and pursue something else. This is at the heart of selfdenial. Love asks us to make choices that are often difficult. There is a reason Jesus asks that the love of God come first. "Charity is the right attitude of mind which prefers nothing to the knowledge of God. If a man possesses any strong attachment to the things of this earth, he cannot possess true charity (St. Maximus the Confessor)." "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." A devoted disciple must be singleminded in her guest for God. She cannot allow anyone or anything to have more power over her soul than God. When any earthly attachments become more important than Love, we can get ourselves into trouble.

The Gospel calls us to walk boldly into the darkness, confusion, and emptiness of the world clothed in the mantle of love. We are asked to walk with others on their journey, offering a supportive, healing, challenging, and faithful presence. Ours is not to judge. To walk this sacrificial journey means that I must put myself aside and focus on the needs of others. "A sacrifice to be real must cost, must hurt and must empty ourselves (St. Teresa of Calcutta)." Love helps us walk straight and focus to see things more clearly and help others to do so as well. Many folks struggle to find joy and meaning in life. People may simply need someone with the freedom to sit with them in their pain, so they don't feel so alone. Through acts of kindness, gestures of acceptance, and words of compassion, burdens can be lightened. Believe in God's love and seek it above all other things!



# Manitowoc podcast aims to grow faith

MANITOWOC — The soundtrack of the wildly popular Broadway show "Hamilton" inspired Cameron Gruenke to start a Catholic podcast with his friend, John Christianson.

The hip-hop musical about Founding Father Alexander Hamilton features the song "Who Lives, Who Dies, Who Tells Your Story," which addresses how Hamilton might be remembered after death.

"I thought if I died tomorrow, who tells my story?" Gruenke asked. "I thought about all of the people in our parish who I don't really know, who maybe I would see only at the parish picnic or at Easter Vigil. Well, why don't we just have those people tell their story?"

The two started "Humbly Speaking," a St. Francis of Assisi Parish podcast, this past spring. They feature a different guest from their Manitowoc parish in each episode and simply offer an open-ended discussion about their faith journeys.

The parish has provided

a microphone, USB mixer for allowing the playing and recording of audio directly into the computer, headphones, pop filters to prevent audio distortion, as well as a studio space in the parish office.

Gruenke, 29, said he felt it was important for parishioners to get to know other people in the parish in order to build a stronger Catholic community.

"We only see them an hour on Sunday, but it's important to give people a perspective on how the Catholic life is lived outside of the walls of the church because God doesn't ask us to be a Catholic for an hour on Sundays.

# When European WWII refugees came to Wisconsin

**ANTIGO** — "I was 32 years old when the war came to our area in the form of German invasion and occupation."

Those words, typed in the front of the book "Vengeance of the Swallows," a memoir of Polish World War II refugees, serve as a prelude to introducing one of the Catholic church's early programs to assist refugees from war-torn areas, and its links to the Green Bay Diocese.

Sept. 2 is the 77th anniversary of the signing of the documents of surrender aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay, Japan — effectively ending World War II. Earlier, on May 7, 1945, representatives from the Allied high command had

accepted the unconditional surrender of Nazi Germany, officially ending the war in Europe.

"August and Ruby were wonderful people," said Susan Holubecki Steiner, Stanisław's daughter, who was 9 at the time. "They treated us very well."

# St. Michael the Protector

The Feast of the Archangels is Sept. 29. However, before the 1970 revision of the church calendar, only St. Michael was honored on Sept. 29.

2 The day was sometimes called "Michaelmas" — short for "Michael's Mass. It was, for a time, a holy day of obligation.

St. Michal's feast was considered to end the harvest year and filled with celebrations, parades and harvest feasts.

Michael's name - Mikha'el means "Who is like God?" Michael is called the military leader of the angels and protector of God's Chosen People.

The Sept. 29 feast date comes from the fifth century dedication date of the Basilica Archangeli in Septimo, a church about six miles from Rome. It no longer exists.

First of all, I cannot possibly express my sincere gratitude for

your prayers during my surgery and recovery. Your prayers are very powerful; they are tangible and palpable. This experience has helped me see just how powerful and effective intercessory prayer can be. What a beautiful tradition we have within the Catholic Church that

we can pray and offer sacrifice for each other, as well as seek the intercession of the "cloud of witnesses" who have gone before us. When the people of God unite in prayer, there is so much that we can do. Thank you for taking time to pray for me, and I humbly ask you to keep me in your prayers as my recovery continues.

I am so grateful for the doctor, the nurses and staff of HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital in Oconto Falls for their excellent care. They belong to a partnership between the Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS) and Prevea Health. HSHS began with a small group of religious women in the 19th century and has grown to serve people throughout Wisconsin and Illinois. Their commitment to providing health care rooted in their faith is an inspiring example of missionary discipleship. I am also grateful for the home health care that began my rehabilitation program here and for my follow-up care with a local physical therapist.
