Fr. Matthew Colle ordained July 2





s you probably know, last Friday, on the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Supreme Court overturned the Roe v. Wade decision, eliminating the federal right to abortion. This is a monumental decision. one that I and countless pro-lifers have been

praying for nearly 50 years! This decision will lead to fewer babies suffering the cruel fate of abortion and, hopefully, lead to new opportunities for our nation to come together in support of life, whether of the unborn, their mothers or any other person.

First and foremost, I want to thank God that this scourge on our nation has finally been lifted. The legal right to abortion has hung over our country like a dark cloud for nearly 50 years, bringing immense suffering to many people. The concept of choice, supported in

Roe v. Wade, is built on a false notion of freedom. It seeks to build the advantage of one person on someone else's disadvantage, which is not a path to freedom and justice. This "choice" has horrible consequences for mothers, fathers and children, who have never gotten a chance at life. Again, I am grateful that there is new light shining through the darkness on this issue.

While I am grateful for this new day for life, I also recognize that our work is not done. There will still be many places in this country where abortion is legal and there will be people who fight to make abortion more accessible. Even in places where abortion is illegal, there will be attempts to go around the law. Most importantly, there will still be women who find themselves in difficult circumstances and feel that abortion is their only option. So as Catholics and pro-lifers, how should we approach this new post-Roe world? I want to offer a few suggestions.
