



RCIA Catechumenate and Dismissals

We celebrated the Rite of Acceptance the weekend of December 3 where our inquirers entered into a period of teaching called the Catechumenate. With the help of their sponsors and members of the community, they are learning about the teachings of the Church and growing in faith. This period will conclude with The Rite of Election – Call to Continuing Conversion which will take place the first Sunday of Lent. The rite celebrates the call of catechumens to receive the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil.

After the Rite of Acceptance, the catechumens and candidates are usually dismissed from Mass after the Liturgy of the Word to reflect more deeply on Scripture and prepare themselves for their eventual participation in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This dismissal is not meant to exclude those in RCIA from the Liturgy of the Eucharist, but to help them and the parish joyfully build up anticipation of the Easter Sacraments. During the dismissal we have time to slowly read and reflect further on the Scripture readings of the day. We break open the word with them and help them to see God's work in their life through the Scripture readings. I have heard year after year from those who participate in dismissals how much they enjoyed and benefited from the dismissals. It is time well spent becoming familiar with and discussing openly the Word of God. We could use help with dismissals. Do you have a love for sharing the Word with others? G.K. Chesterton said that only when he realized that the things of this world would not make him ultimately happy did he find real joy in them.





School's enrollment on the rise



St. Joseph's enrollment increased significantly this school year. The school went from 139 K-8 students to 186, which is a 34% increase and the largest in the Archdiocese of Dubuque.

St. Joseph already was growing before the state of lowa created Education Savings Accounts, but that accelerated the number of new students who can now afford a Catholic education.



Middle school SERVICE

St. Joseph Middle School students have spent a lot of time this first semester serving the needs of others. Service gives students the opportunity to live out their faith in the community. They gain real-world skills through these experiences, helping educate the total student. Here are some ways that the middle school students have served others so far this year.

Each day middle school students help Mr. Burmeister and Mr. Kling by washing the lunch tables and helping put them away.

Middle school students also participated in the Eucharistic Revival with activities led by the Lead, Learn, Serve Committee (LLS) as well as our teachers. Students visited the displays in the church basement and spent time learning about Eucharistic miracles. The students then went to teach their kindergarten and preschool buddies about the Eucharistic miracles, and



how Jesus is in the body and blood at Eucharist.


Also, led by the LLS Committee and the middle school teachers, the middle school students had an afternoon dedicated to service where they raked leaves at parishioners' homes, helped winterize the gardens at Prairie Woods, and helped Mr. Burmeister complete tasks on the St. Joseph property.

Currently, led by the LLS Committee and the middle school teachers, stu-

dents are helping with the Advent Angel at church. Students have helped to put stickers on each angel, hole punch them, put hangers on each angel, and write the gifts on each angel. As gifts have been given by parishioners, students have begun sorting them. The students and their buddies also will spend time decorating and filling gift bags for the elderly and homebound.

Extracurricular clubs explore math, robotics and more



St. Joseph was able to offer many different club opportunities this fall. At the K-2 level the school offered Crazy 8's Math Club. Crazy 8's offers unique, high-energy math activities that appeal to kids of all math abilities. This club was facilitated by teachers Mrs. Rhinehart and Mrs. Schleier.

In grades 3-5 the school had the Hummingbird Robotics Club. A kit consisting of lights, sensors and motors allows students to build a robot out of any materials. This club was facilitated by teachers Mrs. Virden and Mrs. Gadient.

In grades 3-8 the school offered a 3D printing club. Parent and 3D printing enthusiast Mr. Ryan Unruh ran this club. Students were able to design and print objects such as keychains, toys and decorations.

THREE SEMINARIANS ADMITTED TO CANDIDACY FOR HOLY ORDERS

Archdiocese of Dubuque seminarians Steven Kessler, Jackson Miller, and Matthew Smith were admitted to Candidacy for Holy Orders on Wednesday, August 30, at Mundelein Seminary.

Candidacy is an important step in priestly formation when a declaration is made by the seminarian that he is resolved to prepare himself for Holy Orders and ministry in the Church. That declaration is then acknowledged and received by the Church.

The current ceremony of Admission of Candidacy began to be used in the Roman Catholic Church on January 1, 1973. In its current form, the man in formation for the priesthood or the permanent diaconate states his intention to receive the sacrament of Holy Orders, and the clerical state. The bishop or archbishop will then formally accept him as a candidate. The ceremony calls to mind when the twelve apostles answer Jesus' call to be with him and follow him. It includes three parts: the call to candidacy, the scrutiny of the candidate, and the blessing of the candidate.

"To be formally admitted as a Candidate for Holy Orders, a seminarian has developed a relationship with Jesus as a disciple who follows the Lord, listens to His word, and

puts the word into practice," said Fr. Mark Murphy, Director of Vocations for the Archdiocese of Dubuque.

"He gives evidence of striving for a life of virtue, of prayer, and of human qualities that will be beneficial to him, and to God's people, as a priest. As it takes time to be formed as a disciple of Jesus with the intention of priesthood, a seminarian is formally admitted as a Candidate for Holy Orders after several years in seminary formation. He will then have several more years of formation until he is ordained a priest."

"In the Rite of Admission to Candidacy for Holy Orders, a bishop asks the seminarians two questions similar to these below, and the seminarians respond with 'I do."

1. Dear sons, the pastors and teachers charged with your formation, and those who affirm that they know you, have given a good report of you which we fully trust. In response to the Lord's call, do you resolve to complete your preparation, so that in due course you are made ready to undertake ministry in the Church through Holy Orders?

2. Do you resolve to form your mind and heart in such a way that you will be able faithfully to serve Christ the Lord and his Body, the Church?

Below, the three newest candidates for Holy Orders in the Archdiocese of Dubuque share remarks regarding their experience of the ceremony and its significance.

The actual part of the Mass in which we were admitted to Candidacy for Holy Orders was short. We simply stood up when our names were called

and then answered two questions posed to us by the Cardinal. "In response to the Lord's call, do you resolve to complete your preparation so that in due time through Holy Orders you will be prepared to assume ministry within the Church?" and "Do you resolve to prepare yourselves in mind and spirit to give faithful service to Christ the Lord and his Body, the Church?" These two simple questions have a deep and very important impact on our lives. If you think of ordination like a wedding, then candidacy is like an engagement. We promised to continue to say "yes" to God's call and to do everything we can to prepare ourselves to be ordained into the priesthood and into service to God's people and His Holy Church.

It was short and simple, but so powerful, beautiful and moving. It's hard to put into words how I felt in the moment but now, looking back, it was a life-changing night. I felt a new sense of confirmation that this is what God is calling me to do, who God wants me to be. I cannot express the joy this brings me but I will say, it is a

great moment to look back on when I am struggling with classes, or with life. A great reminder that I am moving toward what God wants of me. I said "yes" to God's call and now I have promised the Church to follow through with my formation so I am fully ready to say "I do" on the day of my ordination.

It was on me to kick off the process of admission by writing a formal letter to Bishop Pates requesting to be admitted to candidacy. I was

grateful to express in handwriting that I freely wish to serve the people of God in Dubuque as a priest and that I resolve to guard and foster my vocation in preparation for priestly life. In the week before the ceremony, my classmates and I were on a silent retreat and were especially encouraged to pray about the resolutions we were going to make in a week. This time of reflection enabled me to make a firm and emphatic "Yes!" in front of the Church during the rite of admission. Since the Mass, it has been wonderful to know that the Church has received my resolve and is calling me to continue in formation for the priesthood!

"You're in the big leagues now" said a priest in one of the first Masses upon my arrival at Mundelein seminary. Two short weeks later I

found myself standing in the front of the main chapel for the "Rite of Candidacy" where I made public my desire to become a priest and to serve the people of God. This "public declaration" was nothing more than professing five simple words total, but the gravity of the ceremony was not lost on me. It was a profession I was making in the presence of many witnesses, both human and divine! The gathered community and the heightened

sense of solemnity was a deeply personal call to me to approach my formation and my prayer life with a greater sense of intensity, purpose, and responsibility.

God-willing, it is only four short years until I am ordained, and that time will no doubt fly by quickly. This experience was a call to give myself over completely to the Lord so that He can mold me into the priest He wants me to be. As I continue this journey in major seminary, the phrase "you're in the big leagues now" continues to echo in my mind as a constant reminder that there will be challenges ahead and that there are great expectations. But with each passing day I am fueled by the love of God and the anticipation of becoming the servant of God that seminary is preparing me to be.
