




Lenten Encounter Night

Greetings, St. Joseph Parish! This is Zach Bohannon, the Faith in Our Future (FIOF) Building Committee Chair, coming to you with your latest update on your church's renovation project. As you may recall, I have provided all parishioners with a couple of updates thus far. The first update happened last August during the middle of our capital campaign, with the other one coming in the bulletin the second weekend of December, which rolled out the beautiful design by Conrad Schmitt Studios. Now I am proud to provide you our most important update yet with

some key timeline figures. But first, let's get a few things out of the way. Throughout the nearly five years that our FIOF team, led by Joe and Barb Schmall, has been hard at work, a few "non-negotiables" became abundantly clear: 1. Beautify the sanctuary to update the 1977 design, 2. Complete construction by summer of 2025, and 3. Minimize the construction disruption as much as possible.

With that said, I am proud to announce we are on pace to achieve these three things! As you have seen at each entryway of the church, we will be incorporating a rich design to make our church feel more "Catholic", thus beautifying our sanctuary. Second, Rinderknecht, our general contractor, has confirmed construction will be completed by the start of summer of 2025. Lastly, while working with Rinderknecht and Conrad Schmitt Studios, we have been able to compress the construction timeline, along with the disruption, into a manageable schedule. What does that mean you might ask?

In short, construction is set to begin around the main entrance on September 1st of this year (2024). However, we will be able to continue to hold Mass in the church through Christmas, with the sanctuary officially closing on the 26th of December. At this time, we will be shifting our Mass schedule over to the gymnasium at St. Joe's School until we reopen six months later in 2025. While I understand a temporary shutdown is not ideal, our building committee, along with our FIOF team, agreed this is the best case scenario for our project because Fun Days will not be impacted, along with the church being out of operation for only six months. Again, we knew we were going to have to go through a little short-term pain for long-term gain. I hope you each continue to pray and keep the faith in our church's future success. Beautification Symbolism Part 6

In this final installment on the artistry and symbolism of our Church Beautification effort, we'll continue to look up to the ceiling above the Sanctuary and Altar.

OUR AUTURE

ST. JOSEPH

In the area directly above the Altar we see the familiar dove, the symbol of Holy Spirit. The head of the dove is often surrounded by a nimbus or round halo-like sphere which represents holiness. The nimbus may be inlaid with three rays which indicates that the Holy Spirit is one of the three Persons of the Blessed Trinity. The dove is depicted as inflight and rising. This can symbolize the Ascension of Christ or the entry into glory of the martyrs and saints.



The Catechism of the Catholic Church provides this guidance:

701 The dove. At the end of the flood, whose symbolism refers to Baptism, a dove released by Noah returns with a fresh olivetree branch in its beak as a sign that the earth was again habitable. When Christ comes up from the water of his baptism, the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, comes down upon him and remains with him. The Spirit comes down and remains in the purified hearts of the baptized. In certain churches, the Eucharist is reserved in a metal receptacle in the form of a dove (columbarium) suspended above the altar. Christian iconography traditionally uses a dove to suggest the Spirit.

The dove appears as a symbol and a tool of God in both the Old and New Testaments. The dove first appears by name in the book of Genesis.

Genesis 8:9-11 Then he (Noah) released a dove, to see if the waters had lessened on the earth. But the dove could find no place to perch, and it returned to him in the ark, for there was water over all the earth. Putting out his hand, he caught the dove and drew it back to him inside the ark. He waited yet seven days more and again released the dove from the ark. In the evening the dove came back to him, and there in its bill was a plucked-off olive leaf! So Noah knew that the waters had diminished on the earth.

In the Old Testament a dove represented purity. According to Mosaic law, doves and turtledoves were the only birds that could be offered as acceptable sacrifices because of their perceived purity.

Genesis 15:9 He answered him: Bring me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old female goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove, and a young pigeon

Leviticus 12:6 When the days of her purification for a son or for a daughter are fulfilled, she shall bring to the priest at the entrance of the tent of meeting a yearling lamb for a burnt offering and a turtledove for a purification offering.

In the New Testament as John baptizes Jesus in the Jordan River, we again see the dove. The dove is present at Baptism to represent the Holy Spirit being sent to gather mankind into the Church.

Matthew 3:16 After Jesus was baptized, he came up from the water and behold, the heavens were opened for him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming upon him.

Luke 3:21-22 After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."



As we look closer at the other area above the altar, we see the presence of the Fleur-de-Lis. The Fleur-de-lis or lily flower is a symbol of purity often representing the Virgin Mary. The Fleur-de-lis is also used to symbolize the Trinity, with each of its 3 petals representing a part of the Holy Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit).

The lower brown beam is adorned with multiple Fleur-de-lis, each with 3 stems and flowers that resemble an Easter lily. On the ceiling area above the alter and surrounding the dove are larger quadruple Fleur-de-lis arrangements with each stem starting from a single focal point.

Our series started by focusing on the 4 ceiling areas adorned with a verse from the Prayer to our Patron, St Joseph. As we close out, we'll revisit that beautiful prayer again.

Prayer to Saint Joseph

To you, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our tribulation, and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and through the paternal love with which you embraced the Child Jesus, we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance which Jesus Christ has purchased by his Blood, and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ;

O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence; O our most mighty protector, be kind to us and from heaven assist us in our struggle with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril, so now protect God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection, so that, supported by your example and your aid, we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness, and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven.

Amen.



Meet Fr. Louis Jaeger and Fr. Bernard Grady, who celebrated jubilee years in 2023.



Rev. Louis Jaeger was ordained a priest on March 31, 1973 and celebrated his Golden Jubilee in the year of 2023. A celebration of this anniversary

was held at St. Mary's Parish in Manchester with a Mass and reception this past spring.

1. What are aspects of your active priestly duties that you miss?

The aspect that I miss most of active ministry is dealing with people. There are some really great people in the Church and I miss dealing with them. When I was pastor I enjoyed doing visioning for schools or parishes. I liked hearing other people's ideas.

2. As you celebrate this golden anniversary, what reflections do you have on the impact of your priesthood on both yourself and the communities you served?

The biggest impact on me was through

prayer getting closer to God and realizing why God put me places. As for impact on the communities? You would have to ask the people.

3. How has your perspective on the role of a priest evolved since the time of your ordination to your retirement?

The role of priest has changed from visiting people, celebrating sacraments, etc. to more of a collaborative ministry with active participation of the laity.

Rev. Bernard Grady was ordained a priest on June 1, 1968 and celebrated his 55-year jubilee in 2023.

1. Looking back on your years of active ministry, what are some of the most fulfilling and rewarding aspects that you experienced?

For the most part, Ι was privileged and blessed to work with wonderful parish staff and members serve wonderful parish members: 1968-1972 as an



Assistant at St. Joseph in Marion; 1972-1977 as an Associate in Team Ministry at Immaculate Conception in Charles City and St. Mary, Roseville; 1986-1993 as Pastor at Blessed Sacrament, Waterloo; 1999-2005 as Pastor at Saint Mary, Marshalltown; and 2005-2012 as Pastor at Saint Patrick, Hampton and Saint Mary, Ackley.

For some 25 years, our Archdiocese staffed and supported a large parish in Cochabamba, Bolivia, "La Parroquia de San Rafael". I volunteered and served on the parish staff from 1977 to 1986. Due to the shortage of priests back here, the parish was then turned over to the local Archdiocese in Bolivia. From 1993 to 1998, I was permitted to be an Associate member of the Society of Saint

Columban, an Irish Missionary Group, and served as Pastor of a Columban Parish on the outskirts of Lima, Peru. During these early years after the Second Vatican Council, the "Basic Christian Community" movement was especially popular in parishes in South America, and served to form small communities within parishes and encourage leadership among the laity.

2. Besides the ways that you still live out your ministry as a retired priest, how do you spend your time in retirement?

In retirement, I have owned a home in Marshalltown for the past eleven years and have enjoyed my hobby of woodworking. My brother Pete and sister-in-law Jeannine have lived in Marshalltown for many years, and I enjoy their presence and support in many ways. I served for a time delivering Meals on Wheels, and continue to enjoy volunteering at the Emergency Food Box. Age is now taking its toll, but Pete and Jeannine and parish members and neighbors are ready and willing to offer a helping hand whenever I have a need. I also enjoy contacts via visits, phone calls, emails and letters from other family members, classmates, and members of the parishes I have served over the years.

3. As you celebrated your 55th jubilee in 2023, what reflections did you have on the impact of your priesthood on both yourself and the communities you served?

During the Christmas season, I received several greetings from classes and individual students of many of the schools and parishes of our Archdiocese. Many of them thanked me for being a priest. In my response to them, I pointed out that God must be calling some from among them to the priesthood and religious life. I ended each of my replies with: GO FOR IT!!!!
