


### SILVER AND GOLD WEDDING ANNIVERSARY MASS

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### \*\*The Sacrament of Reconciliation: A Divine Gift for Christmas Renewal\*\*

As the Christmas season approaches, the hearts of Catholics worldwide turn towards the celebration of the birth of Christ. Amidst the joyous festivities and the warmth of family gatherings, there lies a profound opportunity for spiritual renewal—the sacrament of confession. In the Catholic faith, the act of going to confession holds a special significance, and during Christmas time, it takes on a deeper meaning that resonates with the spirit of the season.

### \*\*1. Cleansing the Soul: Preparing for the Arrival of Christ\*

Christmas marks the miraculous moment when God became incarnate in the form of a vulnerable child, bringing hope and salvation to humanity. In preparation for the arrival of Christ, the sacrament of reconciliation provides a sacred space for believers to cleanse their souls. ### \*\*3. Experiencing God's Mercy: A Gift Beyond Measure\*\*

Christmas is a celebration of God's boundless mercy and love. Through the sacrament of reconciliation, Catholics have the opportunity to experience this mercy firsthand. Confession is a conduit for the infinite compassion of God, a chance for believers to be reconciled with Him and receive the grace needed to live a more virtuous and Christ-centered life.

### \*\*4. Fostering Spiritual Joy: The True Spirit of Christmas\*\*

While the secular world often emphasizes material gifts and external festivities, the true spirit of Christmas lies in the joy that comes from spiritual renewal. Confession allows Catholics to shed the burdens of sin, experience the joy of forgiveness, and approach the celebration of Christ's birth with a heart filled with gratitude and love.

#### \*\*5. Strengthening Community Bonds: Rejoicing Together in God's Mercy\*\*

Christmas is a time of communal celebration. Going to confession not only benefits individuals but also strengthens the bonds within the faith community. In conclusion, the sacrament of reconciliation holds a profound significance for Catholics, especially during the Christmas season. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ, let us embrace the sacrament of confession as a divine gift that allows us to enter into the joy of Christmas with hearts renewed and spirits uplifted.

Greetings to one and all as we enter the Fourth Sunday of Advent. This liturgical year, Advent is as short as it can be. After all we light the four Advent candles at the Saturday Vigil and Sunday morning and early afternoon Masses, and then we will be celebrating the Vigil of Christmas (Christmas Eve) this very Sunday night at 5:30 p.m. Now, to make it clear, both Saturday evening/Sunday morning and early afternoon, December 23 and 24 a.m. is a holy day of obligation as it is a Sunday Mass; and Sunday evening December 24th and Monday morning, December 25th is a holy day of obligation because it is Christmas. There is no way that you can go to one Mass and take care of both holy days of obligation.

Please note that January 1st, which is a holyday of obligation most years, is not a holy day of obligation as 2024 begins because January 1st falls on a Monday. In the late 20th century, the Bishops of the United States requested permission from the Vatican office of Divine Worship and the Sacraments, which is proper for them to do, to rescind the obligation of attending Mass on the Solemnities of Mary, Mother of God; on the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary; and on All Saints' Day when those Solemnities fall on a Monday or on a Saturday. The Vatican gave permission for this, so now that is law in the United States. Mass will be celebrated at the Cathedral at 7:00 a.m. and at 12:05 p.m. on January 1st; however, it is not a holy day of obligation in 2024 as it falls on a Monday.

As you can easily see, it is beginning to look a lot like Christmas in the sanctuary and around the Cathedral. Many thanks to the Knights of Columbus; and the Arts and Environment team and helpers on Sunday, December 17th who put all of this together. I was able to help a little bit myself – I moved just one thing, as well as talked to several people and then left for a meeting – and I know that they were in the Cathedral throughout the afternoon. I am sorry I could not help further. Sorry about that! There are wonderful and helpful workers around here, which is very much appreciated by all of us! Thank you so much! The proof will be in the pudding, so to speak. When you see the results. I lit up as we begin the Christmas Season, be sure to thank Vickie, Donald, the Knights of Columbus, and all the others who were incredibly instrumental in putting it all together. Sorry I do not have all the names but do understand that you are all greatly appreciated! God sees all!

Just a reminder that due to the Church's understanding of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and our desire to be in line with the mind and heart of the Church, the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will no longer be offered following Mass on the First Friday of each month beginning in January. From the Catechism of the Catholic Church #1527: The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick has as its purpose the conferral of a special grace on the Christian experiencing the difficulties inherent in the condition of grave illness or old age. The word used in the Instruction for this Sacrament is "periculose," which is officially translated into English as "serious." It is not a Sacrament of general healing; it is a Sacrament for those who are experiencing serious illness due to a grave condition or old age. You can call the Rectory and request that one of the priests give you the Sacrament of the Sick if the time has come for it to be received. This will be in keeping with Scripture, from the Letter of James: "Is any among you sick? Let him, or her, call for the priest of the church, and let them pray over him or her, anointing him, or her with oil in the name of the Lord..." James 5: 14-15). The Cathedral priests will be happy to celebrate this Sacrament with you.

I would like to begin the custom of reciting the Litany of the Sacred Heart on First Friday, as we recall those devotions which are important to many Catholics on First Friday, namely that on nine consecutive First Fridays, one goes to Confession, receives the Eucharist, and in the recitation of the Sacred Heart Novena, we are all reminded of the Sacred Heart: Jesus, meek and humble of heart, make our hearts like unto thine! That would be a wonderful thing if our hearts were like the Sacred Heart.

More about this in the coming weeks. Please have patience as we get a routine unfolding on First Fridays, but I am convinced that the Good Lord will guide us as we move forward as the Cathedral parish community.

In these last few hours of Advent, a blessed Advent to one and all and when it comes: a Happy and Merry Christmas to all of you! May the gift of Jesus the Christ help us understand beyond a shadow of a doubt that God loves us immensely. We see this in the tiny little child in the manger at Bethlehem!
