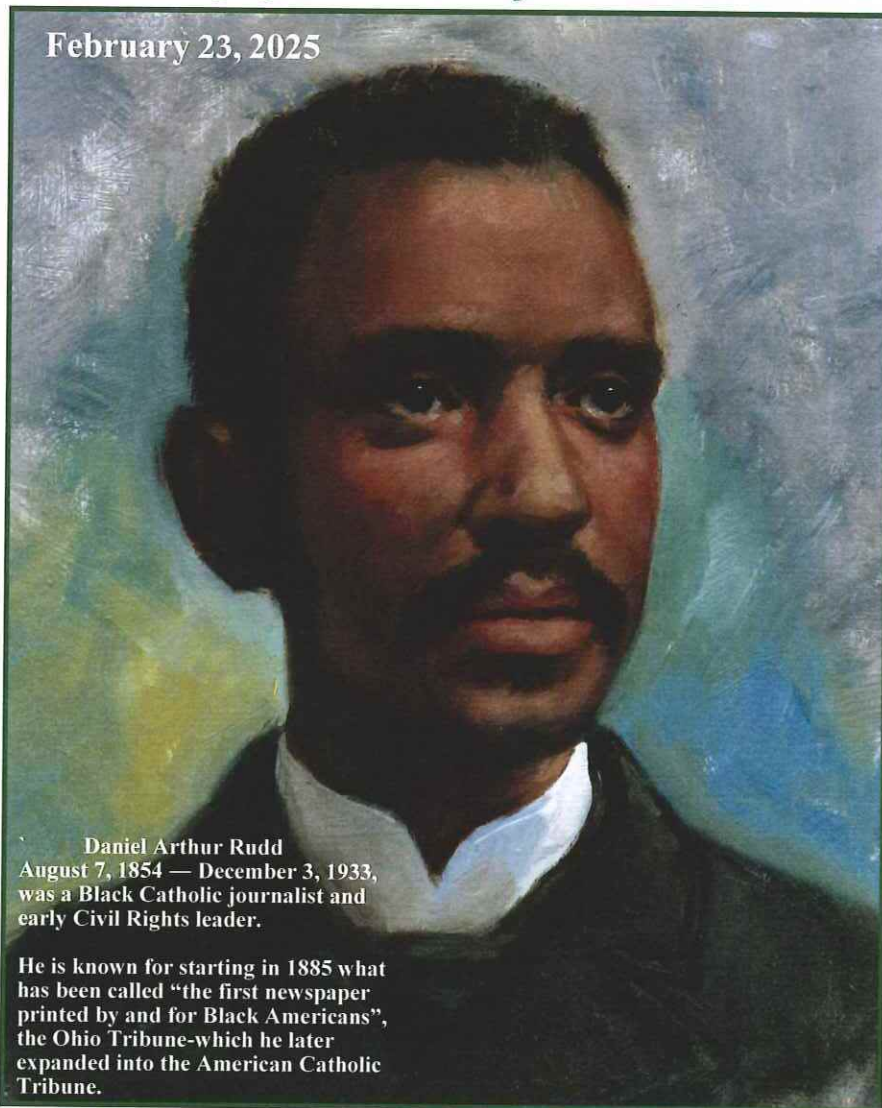

is the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults



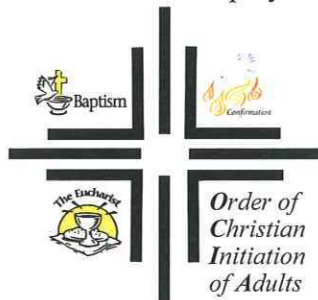
Have you noticed our catechumens being called forward? Are you yourself seeking? Maybe seeking baptism for yourself? Or becoming Catholic? Have you thought about completing confirmation as an adult? What are your questions about coming to **adult faith** in the church today? You are most welcome to contact Margaret Roncalli at mrncalli@stcolumba-oak.com with your inquiries.

Hmm, I've been wondering...

Q: Why are catechumens anointed before they are baptized?

A: There are many rites associated with the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. Every rite before baptism emphasizes a particular gift or addresses a particular need of those on the journey to baptism. We use anointing with oil to strengthen and to set aside the catechumens, acknowledging that already they are part of the church. We pray to strengthen them against any

distraction by the hinderer and to announce that they belong to Christ.

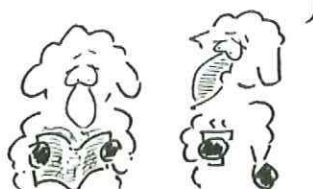

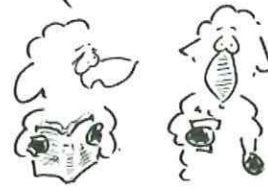

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Where the rubber meets the road...

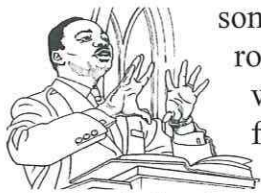
I am certain that Jesus understood the difficulty inherent in the act of loving one's enemy. He never joined the ranks of those who talk glibly about the easiness of the moral life. He realized that every genuine expression of love grows out of a consistent and total surrender to God. So when Jesus said, "Love your enemy," he was not



unmindful of its stringent qualities. Yet he meant every word of it. Our responsibility as Christians is to discover the meaning of this command and seek passionately to live it out in our daily lives.

Let us be practical and ask the question, How do we love our enemies?

First, we must develop and maintain the capacity to forgive. He [sic] who is devoid of the power to forgive is devoid of the power to love. It is impossible even to begin the act of loving one's enemies without the prior acceptance of the necessity, over and over again, of forgiving those who inflict evil and injury upon us. It is also necessary to realize that the forgiving act must always be initiated by the person who has been wronged, the victim of some great hurt, the recipient of some tortuous injustice, the absorber of some terrible act of oppression. The wrongdoer may request forgiveness. He may come to himself, and, like the prodigal



son, move up some dusty road, his heart palpitating with the desire for forgiveness. But only the injured neighbor, the loving father back home, can really pour out the warm water of forgiveness.

OUR FASCINATING FAITH

Maybe I'm weird, but I like spending time in doctor's offices, confession lines in churches, auto repair shops, prison cells, and support groups of various kinds. It's refreshing to be with people who humbly admit something is wrong and forthrightly set out on a path toward a solution. When we ignore what is off kilter, we become alone and fragile. In places where people are honest and hopeful about brokenness, sturdy if subtle fellowship usually ensues.

Consider the image we see of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. "...they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by a demon. The whole town was gathered at the door." The entire human community is afflicted in various ways, and so it gradually forms a strange new community around Jesus. The healer from Nazareth is like a sun of health around which orbits a throng of humanity absorbing his healing rays. These blessed souls can't fix themselves and become healthy, and they know it. But they have found in him the living source of all imaginable healing.

It's the Church, isn't it? A sin-sick community gathered and healed is what happens at the beginning of every Mass. We shuffle in through the door from everywhere and announce that we are not okay, and we can't fix it. In doing so, we are drawn into the orbit of the healing power of Christ — and into a renewed community with the whole human family. It's nothing to fear or rush. Maybe we can even learn to enjoy more how good it is to be in such a happy place.

Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina for the Seventh Week in Ordinary Time

We begin our prayer:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Grant, we pray, almighty God,
that, always pondering spiritual things,
we may carry out in both word and deed
that which is pleasing to you.
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,
who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the
Holy Spirit,
God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time)

Reading (*Lectio*)

Read the following Scripture two or three times.
Luke 6:27-38

Jesus said to his disciples: "To you who hear I say,
love your enemies, do good to those who hate you,
bless those who curse you, pray for those who
mistreat you. To the person who strikes you on one
cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the
person who takes your cloak, do not withhold even
your tunic. Give to everyone who asks of you, and
from the one who takes what is yours do not

demand it back. Do to others as you would have
them do to you. For if you love those who love you,
what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those
who love them. And if you do good to those who do
good to you, what credit is that to you? Even
sinners do the same. If you lend money to those
from whom you expect repayment, what credit is
that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, and get
back the same amount. But rather, love your
enemies and do good to them, and lend expecting
nothing back; then your reward will be great and
you will be children of the Most High, for he
himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be
merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

"Stop judging and you will not be judged. Stop
condemning and you will not be condemned.
Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give, and gifts
will be given to you; a good measure, packed
together, shaken down, and overflowing, will be
poured into your lap. For the measure with which
you measure will in return be measured out to you."

Meditation (*Meditatio*)

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses.

Prayer (*Oratio*)

Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition, or thanksgiving that the Word inspires in you.

Contemplation (*Contemplatio*)

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours do not demand it back.

How can I become more generous? What impedes me from being more generous with my time, treasure, and talent?

Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. When have I experienced God's mercy? What opportunities do I have to share God's mercy?

Stop judging and you will not be judged. In what situations am I most judgmental? How can I look on others as God sees them?

After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:

Closing Prayer:

Bless the LORD, O my soul;
and all my being, bless his holy name.
Bless the LORD, O my soul,
and forget not all his benefits.

He pardons all your iniquities,
heals all your ills.
He redeems your life from destruction,
crowns you with kindness and compassion.

Merciful and gracious is the LORD,
slow to anger and abounding in kindness.
Not according to our sins does he deal with us,
nor does he requite us according to our crimes.

As far as the east is from the west,
so far has he put our transgressions from us.
As a father has compassion on his children,
so the LORD has compassion on those who fear him.

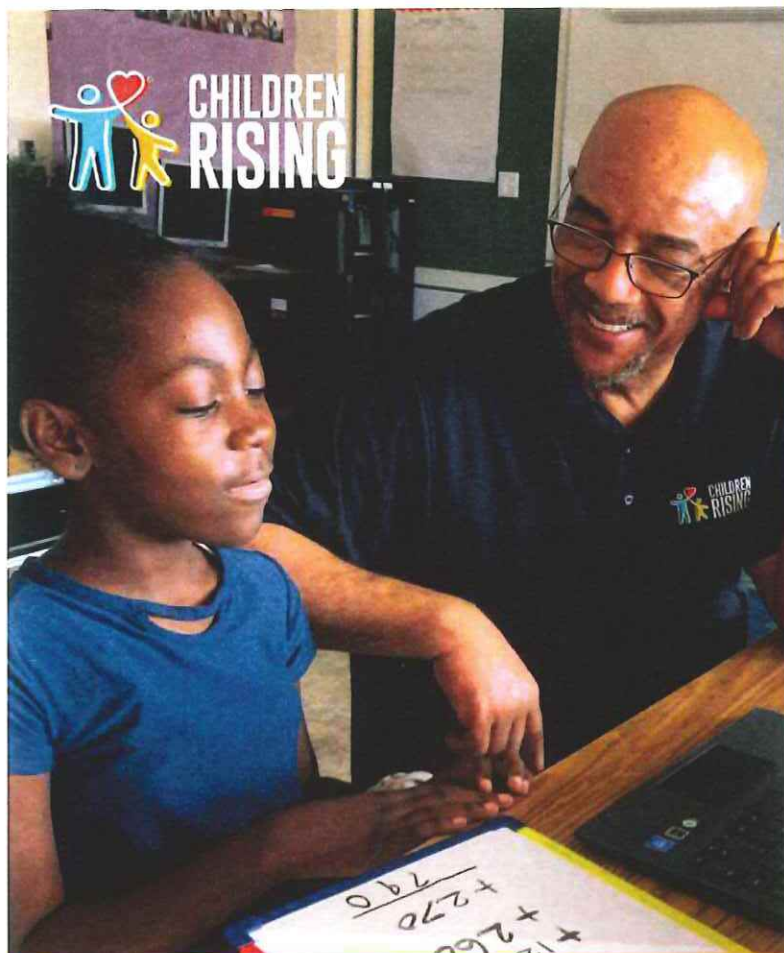

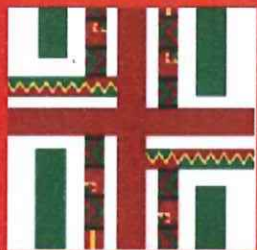

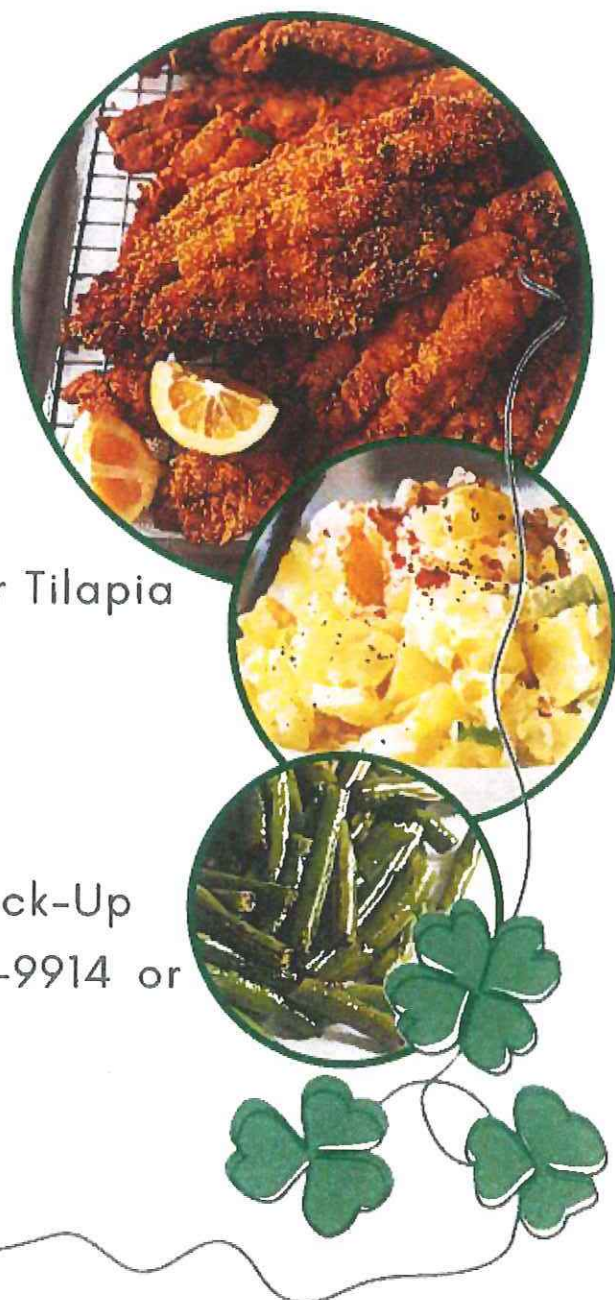
