PREVENTING THE FLU AND OTHER COMMUNICABLE DISEASES. Good health habits can help stop germs, in addition to receiving the flu shot if you are able.

- 1. **Avoid close contact**. Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.
- 2. **Stay home when you are sick.** If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- 3. **Cover your mouth and nose.** Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- 4. **Clean your hands.** Washing your hands often with soap and water is most effective (Center for Disease Control-Atlanta).
- 5. **Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.** Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose or mouth.
- 6. **Practice other good health habits.** Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food. Let us continue to pray for our communities and the families that are affected by influenza and other communicable diseases.

CATECHISM IN A YEAR

How many sacraments are there? And what are their names?

The Church has seven sacraments: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders, and Matrimony.

Why do we need sacraments in the first place?

We need sacraments in order to outgrow our petty human life and to become like Jesus through Jesus: children of God in freedom and glory. In Baptism the fallen children of men become cherished children of God; through Confirmation the weak become strong, committed Christians; through Penance the guilty are reconciled; through the Eucharist the hungry become bread for others; through Matrimony and Holy Orders individualists become servants of love; through the Anointing of the Sick the despairing become people of confidence. The sacrament in all the sacraments is Christ himself. In him we men, lost in selfishness, grow and mature into the true life that has no end.

Why is faith in Jesus Christ not enough? Why does God give us the sacraments, too?


We can and should come to God with all our senses, not just with the intellect. That is why God gives himself to us in earthly signs especially in bread and wine, the Body and Blood of Christ.

People saw Jesus, heard him, could touch him and thereby experience salvation and healing in body and soul. The sensible signs of the sacraments show this same signature of God, who desires to address the whole man, not just his head.

"In days like ours . . . everyone needs to be as completely armed as possible with sound knowledge, not only the clergy, but the people also," an 1884 Pastoral Letter counseled. "In the great coming battle between . . . faith and agnosticism, an important part of the fray must be borne by the laity." Our children are the church's future.

Though Thomas Aquinas is considered the greatest of theologians, he himself had a more modest appraisal of his work. Shortly before his death he stopped working on his Summa Theologiae. When



asked why he did not complete it, he replied, "I cannot go on.... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me." Aquinas' modesty offers a good example to the rest of us. Our greatest accomplishments pale in comparison to the majesty of God.

Thursday, January 29 Today's lesson is character

Some skills can be developed later in life. You can take a course or read a book and open doors to new ideas. But building character starts on the ground floor in childhood. Early American bishops noted that the three great educational arenas are the home, the church, and the school—all of which shape souls and societies. If "the principles of religion animate and direct" the young, they will be prepared to launch out "on the dangerous sea of life,"

an 1884 U.S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter declared. Give financial and volunteer support to Catholic education.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 10:19-25; Mark 4:21-25 (320). "Is a lamp brought in to be placed under a bushel basket . . . and not to be placed on a lamp stand?"

FRIDAY, JANUARY 30 Free up some space for God

It's easy to get caught up in the rush of life. There are so many places to be and things to do. Sometimes you just need to pause and reevaluate what's most important. In some cases, this means giving up the worries and anxieties that add to the frenetic pace of life, making space so you can cherish all that you've been given. Faith flourishes when you make room for it. How are you being invited to make space for God in your life today? There's no end to the goodness God offers, you simply need to be free to receive it.

FEAST OF JOHN BOSCO, PRIEST, RELIGIOUS FOUNDER

Moré honey, less vinegar

Saint John Bosco believed in the potential of young people, especially ones at risk, and he was ahead of his time when it came to educating them. He believed love, not punishment, was the way to help. Ordained in Italy in 1841, he worked with juvenile delinquents and other disadvantaged kids and developed a revolutionary teaching method. "Everything and everyone is won by the sweetness of our words and works," he said. It's easy to forget this advice when young people test your patience, but wise to remember if you want to effectively get through to them.

TODAY'S READDIGS: Hebrews II:1-2, 8-19; Mark 4:35-41 (322). "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen."



The Challenges of the Unborn

One of four pregnancies will be terminated by abortion this year. How can this occur?

The baby in the womb has three major challenges to life. The first is apathy. Forty five percent of our population, according to polls has no strong opinion on abortion. Sadly, it appears that the pro-life movement has been unsuccessful in communicating its message in a meaningful way that would be measured by some meaningful conviction by almost half of our society. To make matters worse, it is more offensive (or politically incorrect) to have pictures of aborted babies in the media than the very fact that the pictures demonstrate babies are being slaughtered. In fact, our media will and do show all kinds of atrocities, with one notable exception—aborted babies.

The second challenge is neutrality, that is, those who claim to have no position. This is reminiscent of those cowardly people who once said, "I believe slavery is wrong, but I support a person's right to choose to own slaves". There can be no neutrality with the killing of babies. When we consider appointments for public office, our main litmus test should be: "are they pro-life, or pro-death?" with no wiggle room.

The third challenge is secularism or the mistaken philosophy that makes perceived personal happiness and convenience the primary consideration for all decisions. No atrocity or injustice is bad if it serves my personal good or makes my life easier. No act is wrong or right, it is just expedient. There is no absolute right or wrong.

Los Desafíos de los bebés por nacer

Uno de cada cuatro embarazos van a ser terminados este año por abortos. Cómo es posible que esto ocurra?

Un bebé en el vientre enfrenta tres desafíos mayores para vivir. El primero es la apatía. Según las encuestas, un 45% de la población no tiene una opinión firme con respecto al aborto. Tristemente, parece que el movimiento pro-vida no ha tenido éxito comunicando su mensaje en una forma significativa. Es así que casi la mitad de la sociedad no está convencida. Peor aún, es más ofensivo (o políticamente incorrecto) tener fotografías de bebés abortados en los medios de comunicación que el mero hecho que las fotografías demuestran que hay bebés que son masacrados. En realidad, los medios de comunicación muestran toda clase de atrocidades con la notable excepción de bebés abortados.

El segundo desafío es la neutralidad, o sea, los que declaran no tener una posición. Esto nos recuerda la gente cobarde que una vez dijo: "creo que la esclavitud es errónea pero apoyo el derecho de una persona a tener esclavos". No puede existir neutralidad con respecto a matar bebés. Cuando se consideran candidatos para

puestos públicos, nuestra principal prueba de fuego debe ser: son "pro-vida" o "pro muerte"? sin dejar margen de maniobras.

El tercer desafío es el secularismo o sea la filosofía errónea que hace que lo que se percibe como la felicidad y conveniencia personal sea la consideración principal para todas las decisiones. Ninguna atrocidad o injusticia es mala si sirve para mi bienestar personal o hace mi vida más fácil. Ninguna acción es buena o mala, simplemente es conveniente. No hay bien o mal absoluto. Esta filosofía es inaceptable.
