

A day to vote your values

"When it comes to labor and politics, I am inclined to be sympathetic to the left, but when it comes to the Catholic Church, then I am far to the right." So said Dorothy Day—born this day 125 years ago—voicing the struggle many U.S. Catholics feel on Election Day. Though Day, born in 1897, was a suffragette, arrested for demanding that women get to vote, she never voted in her lifetime once women finally got the right in 1920. Her reasons were complicated. But the U.S. Catholic bishops offer guidance for all who wonder about the worth of their vote, insisting that "participation in political life is a moral obligation."

The incident is immortalized in Christian art and iconography throughout Europe and became a defining image of what it means to be Christian. Martin took to heart the words of Jesus: "Whatever you did for one of these least of mine, you did for me" (Matt. 25:45). In Martin's honor, extend your compassion beyond your comfort zone today.

Seek unity where possible

For the first thousand years Christianity was one big, mostly happy family. But for a number of reasons the church was divided in the Great Schism of 1054. Saint Josaphat (c.1580-1623) was a Catholic bishop trying to reunite the Eastern Church with Rome. But, alas, he was a little heavy-handed. When he discovered a priest in his diocese was celebrating Mass according to the Byzantine practice, he had him arrested and thrown in jail. This angered a mob of unruly citizens who attacked and violently dispatched Josaphat, tossing his body in a river. We can honor his good intentions today, while perhaps choosing another approach to unity. Pray we unite in those things that matter most.

One Minute Meditations

So many saints

In the early Church, there was a great desire to celebrate

the saints and martyrs by assigning each a feast day. However,

Christians had been so persecuted that there weren't enough days in the calendar for individual commemorations. Eventually Pope Gregory IV designated November 1 as All Saints Day.

Happiness

As a loving Father, God wants us to be happy. True happiness is: "Joy and beatitude over receiving the fulfillment of our vocation as creatures: a sharing in the divine nature and the vision of God. God put us into the world to know, love, and serve him, and so come to the happiness of paradise (Catechism of the Catholic Church, # 1720).

Patience makes sense

Don't be tempted to compare yourself to others. God's plan for each of us is unique. "Be still before the Lord, and wait patiently for him; fret not yourself over him who prospers in his way" (Psalm 37:7).

Effective prayer is humble, yet bold

Jesus said, "Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you receive it, and you will" (Mark 11:24). The best prayers require the

boldness to ask for what we want and the humility to surrender to God's will. Try these tips to pray with humility and boldness:

Seek reconciliation:
The most common reason for ineffective prayer is unconfessed sin. Start with a thorough examination of conscience to see what needs confessing. Seek forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation regularly. Ask for the grace to improve.

Step aside: Sometimes our prayers become lists of demands instead of

conversations with our beloved Father. Put the focus back on Him. Choose a Scripture verse, Biblical image, or a mystery of the Rosary, for example.

Meditate on it and talk with Him about it. We learn humility by lessening the focus on ourselves.

Give thanks: Each day, honor God as the source of all that is good in your life.
Think of four or five of your favorite blessings and thank Him for them. Doing this daily strengthens our faith in His care.

Act in faith: "Cast all your anxieties on him, for he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Asking God for help with all your concerns – which is different from demanding – is a sign of humility and bold faith.



Why do Catholics pray the Liturgy of the Hours?

The Liturgy of the Hours is a cycle of prayers said throughout the day. It's the highest form of prayer in the Church after the Mass. The Hours are a meditation on the psalms, canticles, and Scripture

readings, and bring us closer to

Christ, and to each other. The practice began in the monasteries, but has been extended to priests, deacons, religious orders and the lay faithful. At any given time, someone somewhere, is praying the Liturgy of the Hours.

Become new during Advent

During the Advent season, the Church offers us the chance to prepare our hearts to celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas. It's our opportunity to become the people God intended us to be.

Be mindful. Fulfilling our responsibilities well is how we glorify God. Yet, it can be easy to get lost in the routine of daily life. St. Josemaria said, "Carry out the little duties of each moment: do what you ought and concentrate on what you are doing."

Resolve to do better. "I want to be more considerate," is a great start. Specifics will make it happen. "I'll give others my full attention when they're speaking to me," or "I will be on time to respect others' schedules."

Be flexible. If you struggle to find 20 minutes to pray each day, try two 10-minute sessions morning and evening. If you lack time for an entire Rosary, pray one decade at a time throughout the day. Don't miss this chance to prepare well for the birth of lesus at Christmas.

Beginning at the end of this month, the season of Advent is a time of warning and a time of preparation. Next month we celebrate Jesus' coming


at Christmas. But he will come twice more: at our own death, and at the end of time. This Gospel reading reminds us that we will never know ahead of

Confession.



November 2 - All Souls Day. On this day we pray for the dead, especially our loved ones and the souls in Purgatory. Our prayers and sacrifices can help them get to Heaven.

November 16 - St. Gertrude the Great (1301). Born in 1256 in Germany, St. Gertrude was raised by and later joined the Benedictine nuns. When she was about twenty-six, she began having visions of Christ. She was known for her personal holiness, her kindness to the rich and poor, and her prayers for the souls in Purgatory.

November 27 – First Sunday in **Advent.** We anticipate Christ's birth and his coming on the last day. Catholics around the world light candles in an Advent wreath to signal the coming of the light of Christ.

November 30 - St. Andrew (1st Century). The son of a Galilean fisherman and brother of Simon Peter, he introduced Jesus to Peter. After the Resurrection, he conducted missions in Turkey, Greece and Macedonia. He was martyred on a X-shaped cross.

Q How does the Church decide who is a saint?

There are many people in Heaven who are saints but whose names we may never know. They are uncanonized saints. Canonization is the formal process by which the Church identifies and

> determines whether someone has become a saint. In its simplest form, official

Church procedures detail three steps to recognizing a saint. First, the bishop of the

diocese where the person died begins an extensive investigation. The results are passed to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. If the Congregation approves, the prefect presents the cause to the pope. With the pope's approval, the petitioner becomes "venerable" and is called "Servant of God."


Next, "beatification," may come after further investigation and a miracle has proven to be attributed to the Servant of God's intercession after his or her death. Then the person can be called "Blessed."

Finally, canonization may follow additional investigation and a second miracle also proven to have occurred after the beatification and as a result of the candidate's intercession. After canonization, the "Blessed" is called "Saint."

¿Por qué rezan los católicos la Liturgia de las Horas?



Mateo 24:37-44, No teman, prepárense

El calendario de la Iglesia es un don que nos ayuda a señalar los tiempos de gozo y de tristeza, de trabajo y de descanso. Podemos alejarnos de las pautas del

mundo y recordar que aguardamos en espera gozosa la llegada de Jesús.

Al comienzo de este mes, el tiempo litúrgico de Adviento es un tiempo de advertencia y de preparación. El mes que viene celebramos la llegada de Jesús en la Navidad. Pero vendrá dos veces más: a la hora de nuestra muerte y al final de los tiempos. Esta lectura evangélica nos recuerda que nunca sabremos con anticipación cuando llegará por nosotros. El Adviento es el momento de preguntarnos:

¿Qué debo hacer a fin de estar preparado para recibir al Señor?"

En primer lugar, examine su conciencia y elija una o dos prácticas pecaminosas que quiere eliminar. Luego intente dedicar más tiempo a la oración, asistir a misa fielmente e ir a

confesar.

Finalmente, dedique unos minutos extra cada día a la oración. Luego, cuando llegue la Navidad, sabrá que está preparado para recibir al Señor con alegría.



2 de noviembre - Día de Todos los Difuntos. En este día rezamos por los difuntos, especialmente por nuestros seres queridos y por las almas del purgatorio. Nuestras plegarias y sacrificios pueden avudarlos a alcanzar el cielo.

16 de noviembre - Santa Gertrudis la Grande (1301). Nacida en 1256 en Alemania, santa Gertrudis fue educada por monjas benedictinas y luego ingresó en la congregación. Cuando tenía veintiséis años empezó a tener visiones de Cristo. Se la conoce por su santidad personal, su bondad con ricos y pobres y por sus oraciones por las almas del purgatorio.

27 de noviembre - Primer domingo de Adviento. Esperamos el nacimiento de Cristo y su llegada al final de los tiempos. Los católicos de todo el mundo encienden velas en una guirnalda de Adviento como signo de la llegada de la luz de Cristo.

30 de noviembre - San Andrés (siglo I). Hijo de un pescador de Galilea y hermano de Simón Pedro, quien conoció a Jesús porque se lo presentó Andrés. Después de la resurrección, fue misionero en Turquía, Grecia v Macedonia. Fue martirizado en una cruz con forma de X.



¿Cómo decide la Iglesia quién R es santo?

Hay muchas personas en el cielo que son santas pero cuyos nombres no conoceremos jamás. Son santos no canonizados. La canonización es el proceso formal mediante el cual la Iglesia determina si alguien se ha

convertido en santo.



En su forma más simple, los procedimientos oficiales de la Iglesia detallan tres pasos para reconocer a los santos. En primer lugar, el obispo de la diócesis en la que murió la

persona inicia una investigación extensa. Los resultados se trasladan a la Congregación para las Causas de los Santos. Si la Congregación da su visto bueno, el prefecto presenta la causa al papa. Con el visto bueno del papa, el candidato se convierte en "venerable" y pasa a ser llamado "Siervo de Dios".

El siguiente paso, la "beatificación", puede llegar tras más investigación y si se comprueba un milagro atribuido a la intercesión del siervo de Dios después de su muerte. A continuación la persona pasa a ser llamada "beata".

Finalmente, la canonización puede necesitar investigación adicional y se prueba que se ha producido un segundo milagro después de la beatificación y como resultado de la intercesión del candidato. Después de la canonización el "beato" pasa a ser llamado "santo."
