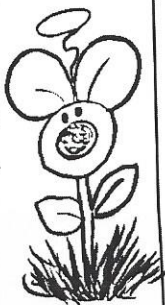
Your Lenten change

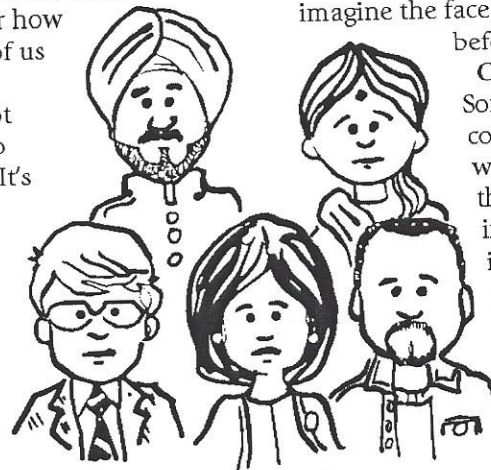
Practice patience. It can be tough to listen to someone with a speech impediment or a heavy accent. Imagine, though, how grateful that

Speak up. Don't stay quiet when you witness prejudice, and be positive about diversity if friends or relatives start criticizing others' faith, cultures or abilities.

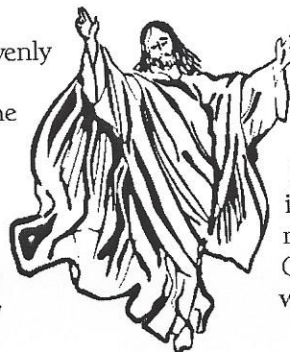
Act with love. The God of love gave of Himself so we could be reunited with Him. We share that love when we assume the best of others and look for the good in all God's children.

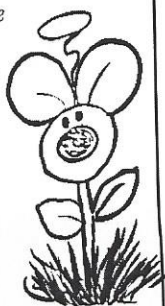


Su cambio cuaresmal

¿Por qué celebran la Ascensión los católicos?

La Ascensión de Jesús a la gloria celestial es una buena noticia. San Pablo explica que en la Ascensión, Jesús, el Sumo Sacerdote, entró en el templo celestial para orar por nosotros con el Padre (Hebreos 9:24). En segundo lugar, desde su trono celestial Jesús nos



envía al Espíritu Santo que sigue conectado a él, especialmente en la Eucaristía. Finalmente, como Cristo entró en la gloria eterna, nosotros como miembros de su cuerpo, la Iglesia, podemos esperar seguirlo si permanecemos fieles a él.

Take good care of yourself. You belong to God.

Taking care of ourselves can become a low priority in the midst of other obligations. Yet caring for our bodies and minds is a duty we have to God. He needs us strong and healthy so we can help build up His kingdom.

Body: What you put into your body is even more important than what you put on it. Take steps to make your diet healthier and more nourishing. Avoid drugs or excessive alcohol. Doctors urge daily exercise and eight hours of sleep each night.



Mind: Become picky about what you feed your mind, too. What you watch, read, and listen to influences the way you look at the world. Evidence shows that it's hard to regularly watch violent shows or movies and still be a calm and happy person. Programs or movies that portray infidelity or promiscuity as acceptable behaviors eventually dull our sense of sin. Feed your mind positive, Gospel-centered images that will build you up and inspire you. Surround yourself with people who do the same.

from Scripture

John 20:19-23, "Receive the Holy Spirit"

This Gospel passage gives us a glimpse of how the apostles spent their first Easter Sunday – hiding in a locked room.

They were terrified the Romans would find them and execute them. To their surprise and great relief, Jesus appeared to them in glory and spoke words of peace. He showed them His glorious wounds as "living proof" of His Resurrection.

Then Jesus gave them a mission: *"Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained"* establishing the Sacrament of Penance (John 20:23). He gave them the Holy Spirit, anticipating the feast of



Pentecost. Now, having authority to forgive sins, the apostles and their successors could continue

Jesus' work after He returned to heaven.

Jesus' appearance to His apostles reveals the fullness of God's mercy. He also sent the Holy Spirit to them. He descended powerfully on Pentecost, the birthday of the Church. That same

Spirit is gifted to us in Baptism and dwells in our souls. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal God's love to you and help you become more like Christ each day.

Q & A

What is the meaning of the Miraculous Medal?

The Miraculous Medal, given to St. Catherine Labouré in 1830, was designed by the Blessed Mother to teach us three things:

Mary prays for us: The medal's front reads: *O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee.* We don't



pray to her; she prays for us! Of course, we can go directly to Jesus anytime. In fact, Mary's role is to bring us to Jesus as swiftly and safely as possible.

Evil can be defeated: Mary is shown crushing Satan's head, recalling the prophecy of his defeat (Genesis 3:15). Mary's humble "yes" to God paved the way for Christ's victory over death, sin, and evil. When we give God our "yes," then Christ's victory bears fruit in our lives.

Grace is always available: St. Catherine asked why only some of the gemstones in Mary's rings radiated light. Her answer? The dim gems symbolize "the graces for which souls forget to ask." God's grace is always available to us. All we have to do is ask.

Feasts & Celebrations

May 3 – Sts. Philip and James (1st Century). St. Philip was born in Bethsaida and followed John the Baptist before he followed Christ. After the Ascension, St. Philip preached in Asia Minor, where he was martyred. St. James, son of Alphaeus, was also one of the twelve Apostles.

May 10 - St. John of Ávila (1569). Born to wealthy, pious parents, St. John left a budding career as a lawyer to become a priest. At the request of his bishop, he worked and preached to renew the faith of Catholics in Andalusia.

May 18 – Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord (1st Century). This solemnity marks the completion of Jesus' mission of salvation and His triumphant entry into heaven. *Note: In many dioceses, observance of Ascension has been moved to the following Sunday.*

May 25 – St. Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi (1607). Born to a distinguished Florentine family, Catherine de' Pazzi became a Carmelite nun. Upon making vows, she experienced ecstasies, and became a mystic and a healer.

Juan 20:19-23, "Reciban al Espíritu Santo"

Este pasaje evangélico nos da una idea de cómo pasaron los apóstoles el primer Domingo de Pascua, escondidos en una habitación cerrada con llave. Bautismo y vive en nuestras almas. Pidan al Espíritu Santo que les revele el amor de Dios y les ayude cada día a parecerse más a Cristo.

Fiestas y celebraciones

3 de mayo – Santos Felipe y Santiago (siglo I). San Felipe nació en Betsaida y siguió a Juan el Bautista antes de seguir a Cristo. Tras la Ascensión, san Felipe predicó en Asia Menor donde fue martirizado. Santiago, hijo de Alfeo, era también uno de los doce Apóstoles.

10 de mayo – San Juan de Ávila (1569). Hijo de padres ricos y piadosos, san Juan abandonó su carrera de abogacía en ciernes para hacerse sacerdote. A petición del obispo trabajó y predicó para renovar la fe de los católicos en Andalucía.

18 de mayo – Festividad de la Ascensión

del Señor (siglo I). Esta festividad marca la culminación de la misión salvadora de Jesús y su entrada triunfal en el Cielo. *Nota: En muchas diócesis, la celebración de la Ascensión ha sido trasladada al siguiente domingo.*

25 de mayo – Santa María Magdalena de Pazzi (1607). Nacida en el seno de una distinguida familia florentina, Catalina de Pazzi se hizo monja carmelita. Tras pronunciar los votos experimentó éxtasis y se convirtió en mística y sanadora.



P & R ¿Qué significado tiene la Medalla Milagrosa?

La Medalla Milagrosa, entregada a santa Catalina Labouré en 1830, fue diseñada por la Madre Bendita para enseñarnos tres cosas:

María reza por nosotros: En la parte delantera de la medalla se lee: "Oh María, sin pecado concebida, ruega por nosotros que recurrimos a ti". Nosotros no le rogamos, ¡es



ella quien ruega por nosotros! Nosotros podemos recurrir directamente a Jesús en cualquier momento, por supuesto. En realidad, el papel de María es acercarnos a Jesús con la mayor rapidez y seguridad posibles.

El mal puede ser derrotado: María es representada aplastando la cabeza de Satanás, lo que recuerda la profecía de su derrota (Génesis 3:15). El humilde "sí" de María a Dios sentó las bases para la victoria de Cristo sobre la muerte, el pecado y el mal. Cuando le damos a Dios nuestro "sí", la victoria de Cristo fructifica en nuestras vidas.

La gracia siempre está disponible: Santa Catalina preguntó por qué sólo algunas de las piedras preciosas en los anillos de María emitían rayos de luz. ¿La respuesta? Everything everywhere all the time

Thank Saint Athanasius upon reciting the word "consubstantial"—which used to be "one in being with the Father"—the next time you say the Nicene Creed. Athanasius, as deacon, did the theological homework for his bishop, Saint Alexander I, at the Council of Nicea. Together they resisted Arianism. Prior to the council, the central idea of Arianism had been slowly gaining traction among church leaders: that Jesus wasn't God, wasn't co-equal and co-eternal with the Father as taught by the Christian doctrine of the Trinity. As Athanasius insisted of Jesus and the Incarnation, "there is no part of creation deprived of his presence; together with his Father, he fills everything, everywhere, at all times."

What remains is the legacy

Today the church celebrates the feast of two of the 12 apostles, Philip and James, a peculiar pair of martyrs not otherwise associated with one another in Christian history or tradition. James (also called James the Less) is regarded as the first Bishop of Jerusalem, while Philip was said to have preached in Greece,

Turkey, and Syria. The pairing of their feast days is related to their shared reliquary in the Church of the Twelve Apostles, following a secret move from the Roman Catacombs. Thereafter lost to history for some time, their relics were rediscovered in the church crypt in the 19th century. On this holy feast, let's all remember the sacrifices of the church's first teachers and model their lives of holiness and faith.
