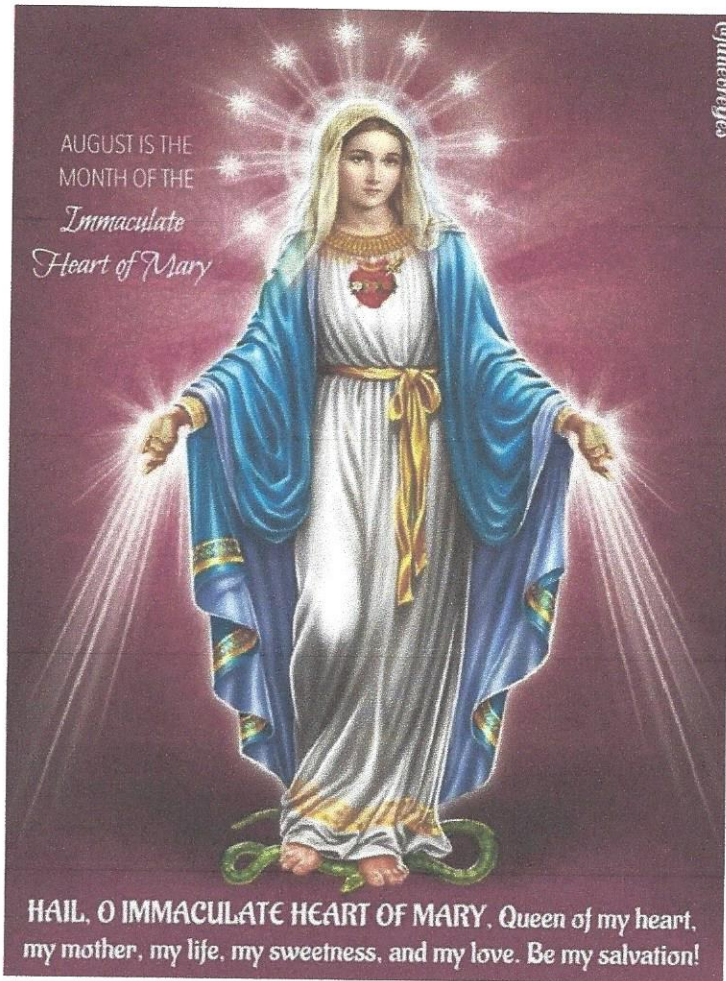

The **Immaculate Heart of Mary** is a [Roman Catholic devotional](#) name used to refer to the Catholic view of the interior life of [Mary, mother of Jesus](#), her joys and sorrows, her virtues and hidden perfections, and, above all, her virginal love for [God the Father](#), her maternal love for her son [Jesus Christ](#), and her motherly and compassionate love for all mankind. Traditionally, the Immaculate Heart is depicted pierced with seven swords or wounds, in homage to the [seven dolors of Mary](#) and roses, usually red or white, wrapped around the heart. It signifies the great purity and love of the heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary for God. This purity is manifested in her "Yes" to the Father at the Incarnation, Her love for, and consecration with, the Incarnate Son in His redemptive mission.

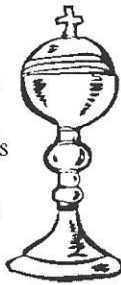

## One Minute Meditations

### A vessel of God's grace

We are each asked to share God's love with others. How much we allow ourselves to be filled with God's grace will determine what we can share with others. We fill up with grace when we frequent the Sacraments, pray, and study our faith. After all, if we don't practice our own faith how can we help someone to become excited about theirs?



### Our powerful Lord

In the Gospels, Jesus healed people 20 times. Seven times Jesus expelled demons. Three times He raised people from the dead, and eight other miracles showed His power over nature. With God all things are possible. All we have to do is ask in harmony with His will.

*"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for He has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed" (Luke 1:46-48).*



## Build up the Kingdom of God

As followers of Jesus, we're each called to take our place in the Kingdom of God and help build it up. Consider these suggestions to do your part:

**Find your gifts:** What special gifts do you possess? In addition to talents and skills, these can include wisdom from life experience or a particularly deep faith. Discern your gifts and ask God where He wants you to use them.

**Cultivate gratitude:** Write down everything for which you are grateful in a "blessings list." Review it and add to it regularly, especially when tempted to jealousy or discouragement. Praise and thank God daily for whatever is on your list.

**Practice humility:** St. Thomas Aquinas said, "Humility means seeing ourselves as God sees us: knowing

every good we have comes from Him as pure gift."

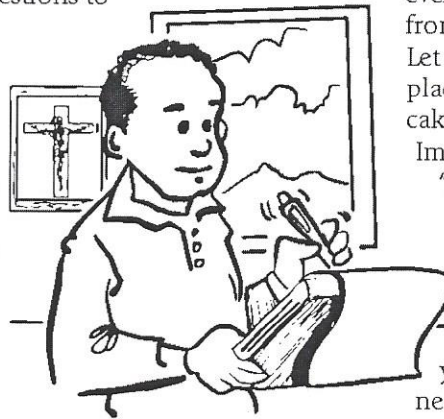
Let others have the best place, the biggest piece of cake, the last word.

Imitate Him who is "gentle and humble of heart" (Matthew 11:29).

**Be ready to serve:** Any act of service can build up your parish, neighborhood, or

community. Small or great, everyone can contribute something. Give of yourself.

**Strive for the higher gifts:** Jesus asked every one of us to love God and each other. Without love, St. Paul said, "I gain nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:3). If you have true charity, you're on the right track.



## Why Do Catholics Do That?

On Easter Sunday, Jesus appeared to the Apostles in the Upper Room and said, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). He breathed on them, saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them and whose sins you retain, they

With that, Jesus established an efficacious way to dispense forgiveness of our sins. He knew we'd need to be assured of His forgiveness by personally hearing the words, "I absolve you of your sins."

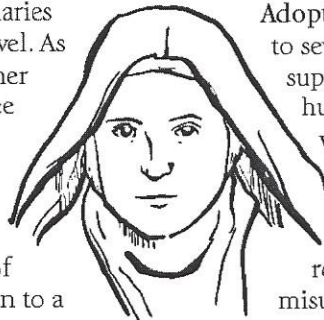




## "Go and make disciples"

We're all called to spread the Gospel as missionaries (Mark 16:15), but not everyone is required to travel. As a Carmelite nun, St. Thérèse of Lisieux lived out her "second calling" to be a missionary. Here are three ways to spread the Gospel within any vocation:

**Go deeper in your faith.** You can't share what you don't have. St. Thérèse developed her "Little Way" of holiness after years of prayer and study. Step deeper into your Faith daily: read a section of the Catechism, pray over a verse of Scripture, listen to a Catholic podcast while driving or walking, pray.



**Adopt-a-missionary:** St. Thérèse was a "spiritual sister" to several missionaries, writing them letters and supporting them in prayer, indirectly helping hundreds of souls. Adopt a missionary – or anyone who shares the Faith. Contact your parish or diocese for suggestions.

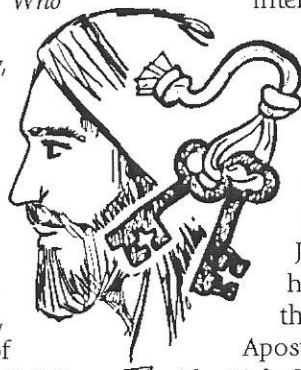
**"Intercession fueled by charity":** St. Thérèse lovingly offered to God the "thorns" she received from others – discomforts, misunderstandings, etc. – to win souls for Christ. Offer your "thorns" as saving graces.

### from Scripture

#### Matthew 16:13-20, The "Rock-solid" foundation

The events in this passage lay the foundations for the Catholic Church. In it, Jesus asks His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" It was a question about Jesus' identity, rather than about the persuasiveness of His teaching or His popularity. The heart of Catholicism centers around the truth of who Jesus is.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Simon answers for the group, identifying Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah (Matthew 16:17). Jesus proclaims this was divinely revealed to Simon and changes his name to Peter ("Rock"). Jesus gives him the



keys to the kingdom, giving Peter (and his successors) the authority to interpret Scripture, forgive sins, and admit people into the Church.

By this, Jesus signaled He was building His Church on a rock-solid foundation – on the confession of Peter about Jesus' divinity. This truth has been handed down through the ages, from the Apostles to the bishops to us.

The Holy Spirit would lead Peter – and his successors, the popes – to continue speaking and acting in truth as the visible head of the Church.

### Q & A How can I avoid gossiping?

Chatting with friends can turn to gossip – the sin of unfairly disclosing another's faults or sins without a valid reason, to people who don't know them (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #2477). Try these ideas when chatting becomes gossip:

**Name it:** A gentle reminder between friends is an act of kindness.

Try, "I think we're edging into gossip," or "Oh, that's not kind!" It's better to risk speaking up than silently allowing sin.

**Redirect the conversation:** Highlight praiseworthy qualities of the person about whom others are gossiping. Refocus on inspiring news, a good book you read – anything else that is "honorable ... just ... pure ... pleasing" (Philippians 4:8).

**Leave:** If nothing else works, excuse yourself and leave the conversation. You'll avoid becoming complicit to sin and wordlessly communicate that you find gossip unacceptable.

**Pray:** Sins of the tongue (gossip, slander, calumny, detraction) are serious sins that require grace to resist. Invoke the Holy Spirit for yourself, for those who engage in gossip, and especially for those harmed by it.

### Feasts & Celebrations

**August 6 – Transfiguration of the Lord.** Christ appeared in glory in the company of Moses and Elijah, discussing the Passion (Luke 9:30-31), and a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5).

**August 14 – St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe (1941).** A Polish Franciscan, St. Maximilian was imprisoned at Auschwitz. When the jailers chose ten people to execute, he substituted himself for a man with a family. He was honored as a "martyr of charity" by

Pope John Paul II.

**August 23 – St. Rose of Lima (1617).** Born in colonial Peru, Rose worked constantly to help her poverty-stricken family. She became a lay Dominican, and cared for homeless children, the elderly, and the sick in her house.

**August 29 – Passion of St. John the Baptist (1st century).** St. John the Baptist courageously spoke the truth to the leaders of his time, making him powerful enemies. He was arrested by Herod and martyred (Mark 6:17-29).

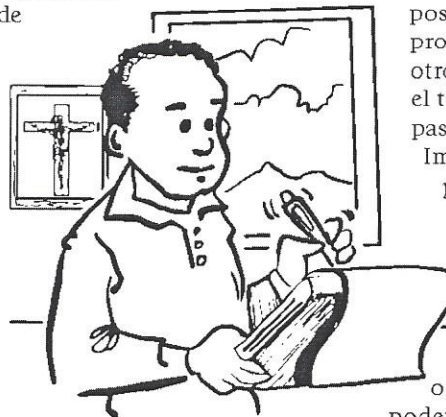

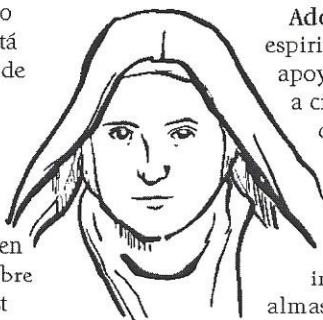




## "Vayan y hagan discípulos"

Todos estamos llamados a difundir el Evangelio como misioneros (Marcos 16:15), pero no todo el mundo está obligado a viajar. Como monja carmelita, santa Teresa de Lisieux vivió su "segunda vocación" de misionera. He aquí tres formas de difundir el Evangelio dentro de cada vocación:

**Profundice en su fe.** No se puede compartir lo que no se tiene. Santa Teresa desarrolló su "caminito" de santidad tras años de oración y de estudio. Profundice en su fe a diario: lea una sección del Catecismo, medite sobre un versículo de la Sagrada Escritura, escuche un podcast católico mientras maneja o camina, rece.



**Adopte a un misionero.** Santa Teresa era la "hermana espiritual" de varios misioneros, les escribía cartas y los apoyaba con la oración, ayudando así indirectamente a cientos de almas. Adopte a un misionero o a cualquiera que comparta la fe. Pida sugerencias en su parroquia o diócesis.

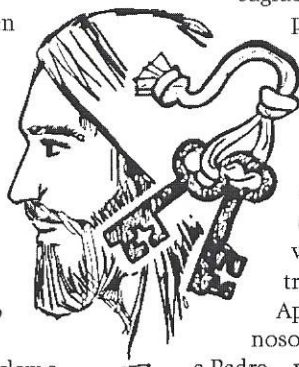
**"Intercesión avivada por la caridad".** Santa Teresa ofrecía amorosamente a Dios las "espinas" que recibía de otras personas – incomodidades, malentendidos, etc. – a fin de ganar almas para Cristo. Ofrezca sus "espinas" como gracias salvadoras.

## de las Escrituras

### Mateo 16:13-20, El cimiento sólido como una roca

Los acontecimientos en este pasaje establecen los cimientos de la Iglesia Católica. Jesús pregunta a sus discípulos: "Ustedes, ¿quién dicen que soy yo?" Era una pregunta sobre la identidad de Jesús, más que sobre la persuasión de sus enseñanzas o su popularidad. La esencia del catolicismo se centra en la verdad de quién es Jesús.

Inspirado por el Espíritu Santo, Simón responde en nombre del grupo, identificando a Jesús como el Hijo de Dios, el Mesías (Mateo 16:17). Jesús proclama que esto le ha sido revelado por Dios a Simón y le cambia el nombre a Pedro ("Piedra"). Jesús le entrega las llaves del



reino, concediendo a Pedro (y a sus sucesores) la autoridad de interpretar la Sagrada Escritura, perdonar los pecados y admitir a la gente en la Iglesia.

Jesús indicó así que estaba construyendo su Iglesia sobre un cimiento sólido como la roca, en la confesión de Pedro sobre la divinidad de Jesús. Esta verdad ha sido transmitida a través de los siglos, desde los Apóstoles hasta los obispos y nosotros. El Espíritu Santo inspiró a Pedro – y a sus sucesores, los papas – para que continúen hablando y obrando en verdad como la cabeza visible de la Iglesia.

## P & R ¿Cómo puedo evitar la murmuración?

La conversación con los amigos puede convertirse en murmuración, el pecado de revelar arbitrariamente y sin razón válida las faltas o los pecados de otros a personas que no los conocen (*Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica*, #2477). Ponga a prueba estas ideas cuando la conversación se vuelva murmuración:



**Diga el nombre:** Un aviso amable a los amigos es un acto de bondad. Pruebe con "Creo que estamos a punto de murmurar" o "Oh, jeso no es amable!" Es mejor decir lo que se piensa que permitir

el pecado.

**Dele la vuelta a la conversación:** Resalte las cualidades encomiables de la persona sobre la que murmuran los demás. Dirija la atención a noticias edificantes, un buen libro que haya leído, cualquier otra cosa que sea "noble... justa... pura... amable" (Filipenses 4:8).

**Márchese:** Si nada más funciona, discúlpese y abandone la conversación. Evitará ser cómplice del pecado y comunicará sin palabras que para usted es inaceptable la murmuración.

**Rece:** Los pecados de la lengua (murmuración, difamación, calumnia, ultraje) son pecados serios y para resistirlos es necesaria la gracia. Invoque al Espíritu Santo para que le asista a usted, a los murmuradores y, especialmente, a las personas perjudicadas.

## Fiestas y celebraciones

**6 de agosto – Transfiguración del Señor.** Cristo se apareció en toda su gloria acompañado de Moisés y Elías, discutiendo la Pasión (Lucas, 9:30-31), y se escuchó una voz que decía "¡Este es mi Hijo, el Amado; éste es mi Elegido, escúchenlo!" (Mateo 17:5).

**14 de agosto – San Maximiliano María Kolbe (1941).** Franciscano polaco, san Maximiliano fue encarcelado en Auschwitz. Cuando los carceleros eligieron diez personas para ejecutarlas, él se ofreció para ocupar el puesto de un hombre que tenía familia. Fue honrado como "mártir de la

caridad" por el papa Juan Pablo II.

**23 de agosto – Santa Rosa de Lima (1617).** Nacida en el Perú colonial, Rosa trabajaba constantemente para ayudar a su empobrecida familia. Se hizo dominicana laica y se ocupó en su propia casa de los niños sin hogar, los ancianos y los enfermos.

**29 de agosto – Pasión de san Juan Bautista (siglo I).** San Juan Bautista dijo valientemente la verdad a los líderes de su tiempo, creándose poderosos enemigos. Fue arrestado por Herodes y martirizado (Marcos 6:17-29).

**May your faith ripen sweetly**

It's about this time of year that grapes in many parts of the world begin a crucial transformation process the French have named *veraison*. It's when grapes start to ripen and change from green to purple—not always at the same time in the same cluster, making for some beautiful color combinations. Mostly likely because of the timing of his feast day, Pope Sixtus II is the patron saint of grape prosperity. Where are you in the midst of your own *veraison* as a Christian? Pray for cause to celebrate your faith bearing ripe fruit.

TODAY'S READINGS: Numbers 11:4b-15; Matthew 14:13-21 (407). *"They all ate and were satisfied."*

**Tuesday, Aug 08, 2023**

**For want of a better word**

When Dominic founded the Order of Preachers in 1216, he'd been appalled by the rise of the Albigensian heresy, denying the goodness of God's creation. Even more appalling was the lack of informed preaching to inoculate the congregation against it. Dominic threw himself into the kind of witness modeled by the Acts of the Apostles, his new religious community adopting the motto "to praise, to bless, to preach." Not surprisingly, the Dominicans have given us eloquent saints, including Catherine of Siena and Thomas Aquinas—even captivating the world in 1963 with a chart-topping pop song, "Dominique." To quote another Dominican, Saint Martin de Porres: "Everything, even sweeping ... could be a prayer, if it were offered to God."

**Wednesday, Aug 09, 2023**

**The awful truth**

The bombing of Nagasaki, which occurred on this day in 1945, was truly awful in all senses of the word. Splitting the atom to unleash its enormous power put the genius and depravity of humanity on full, awe-inspiring display. Though we have many positive uses for atomic energy, its initial use to increase our

capacity to kill on a massive scale is a moral failure that we have yet to overcome. The war machine rages on. What role will you play in helping humanity move toward the good?

TODAY'S READINGS: Numbers 13:1-2, 25—14:1, 26-29a, 34-35; Matthew 15:21-28 (409). *"We have sinned, we and our fathers; we have committed crimes; we have done wrong."*

**Thursday, Aug 10, 2023**

**Where's your treasure?**

During the persecution of the Early Church, Saint Lawrence was under a death threat from Emperor Valerian. But his persecutor offered a deal. Lawrence could live if he turned over the treasures of the church. In one of history's most audacious rebukes, Lawrence is said to have gathered the poor and sick and told Valerian: Here is our treasure. For his act of resistance and faith, Lawrence was burned to death. How do you resist injustice? Saint Lawrence, give us courage.

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Corinthians 9:6-10; John 12:24-26 (618).

**Love takes its toll**

Inspired by her mentor Saint Francis, Saint Clare and the women who eventually joined her to form the Poor Clares had a "radical commitment to corporate poverty." The women lived simply and spent most of their day in prayer and chores. It was a hard life, but one filled with joy for those who chose it—and continue to choose it. Spend time today pondering this pearl of wisdom from Clare: "Love that does not know of suffering is not worthy of the name."

**Saturday, Aug 12, 2023**

**Youthful endeavors**

According to the United Nations website, half the people on Planet Earth are under 30 years of age. Yet only 2.6 percent of government lawmakers worldwide are under 30. International Youth Day, observed annually on August 12, is designated by the United Nations to draw attention to cultural and legal issues surrounding youth. Pope Francis teaches in *Laudato Si'*, "What kind of world do we want to leave ... to children who are now growing up?" (#160). International Youth Day recognizes everyone's responsibility to hand on a sustainable, free, and secure Earth to the next generation. What's going on in your community to accomplish this goal?

TODAY'S READINGS: Deuteronomy 6:4-13; Matthew 17:14-20 (412). *"If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move."*

*Invest just five minutes a day, and your faith will deepen and grow—a day at a time*
