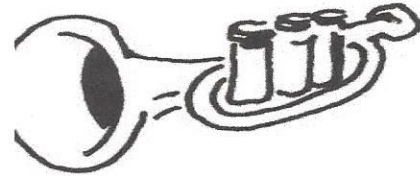

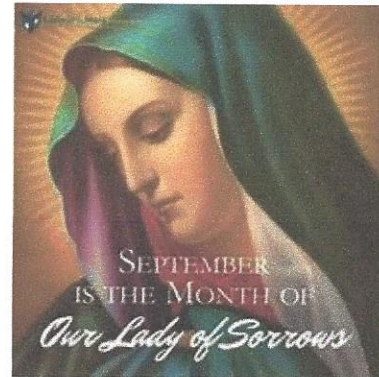

St. Padre Pio

Born to farmers in 1887, in southern Italy,

Francesco

Forgione joined the Capuchin Friars at the age of 15, taking the name "Pio." In 1918, St. Pio received the five wounds of Our Lord's Passion, called the stigmata, in his body. Renowned for his preaching, holiness, and charity, thousands flocked to him for Confession and spiritual direction. Amidst his suffering, he continued to labor for the spiritual and physical well-being of others, founding a hospital that still operates today.



Perfect is possible

Jesus said, "... be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). Perfection to Jesus means loving God with all our hearts, praying for our enemies, and taking care of the poor. Love and service is the true measure of perfection.

Seven virtues for successful Catholics

Practicing virtues – habitual and firm dispositions to do good – leads to long-lasting interior freedom, joy, and peace. The following seven virtues, with God's grace, can help you do that:

Faith enables our belief in God and all that He has revealed through Scripture, Tradition, and the Church's teachings. Reciting the Creed, especially at Mass, is an act of faith.

Hope is the desire for Heaven and trust in God's promises to us. Trusting in the Lord even in trials and asking for forgiveness for sins are acts of hope.

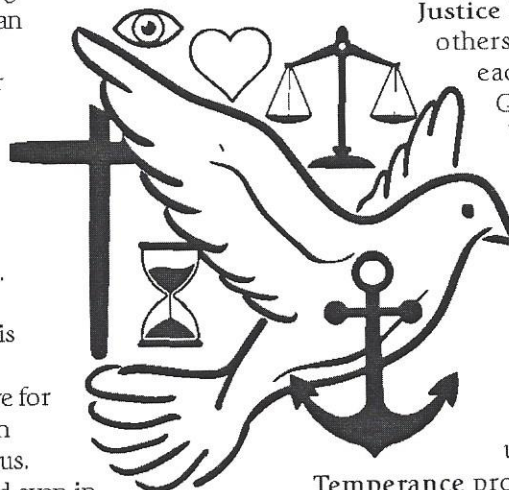
Charity enables us to love God above all things and our neighbors as ourselves. True love is when we wish – and act for – the authentic good of others.

Prudence is the virtue that helps us to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it.

Justice helps us respect others' rights and give to each his due. We owe God our worship. We are made in His image, so we owe each other respect.

Fortitude strengthens us to follow Christ in the world, even if it's unpopular and uncomfortable.

Temperance properly orders our desire for pleasure, so that we appreciate earthly goods in moderation and value heavenly goods most. Observing the one-hour fast from food before receiving the Eucharist is an act of temperance.

Why do Catholics attend Mass on holy days of obligation?

Throughout the year, the Church celebrates six feasts that honor a central mystery of our faith with extra enthusiasm. These days are so important that all Catholics are required to attend Mass to celebrate. They are listed on the US Conference of

All Sundays are also holy days of obligation. We live the third commandment to honor the Sabbath by attending Mass every Sunday.

Celebrating these holy days is a reminder that we belong firstly to God.

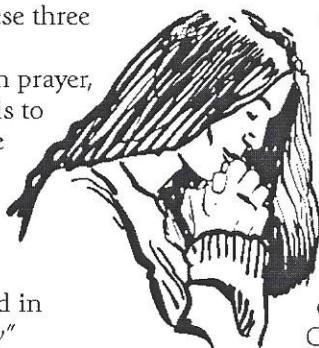


Finding time for powerful prayer

If you struggle to find time to pray, try these three tips:

Prioritize. Much unseen good depends on prayer, and it's as critical to our souls as breathing is to the body. Jesus corrected St. Martha because she lost sight of *"the one thing...needful"* (Luke 10:41-42). Reserve time for daily prayer. Treat it as an important appointment – because it is.

Set boundaries. Jesus dismissed the crowd in the evening and *"went up into the hills to pray"*



(Matthew 14:23). Give God your undivided attention in prayer for whatever time you can. Be fully present, minimizing distractions. Let the world wait while you spend time with the One who loves you most.

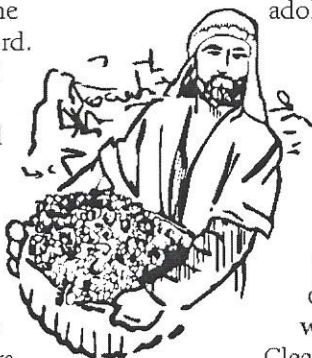
Activate your work. Few of us have the luxury of being able to spend all day in prayer but we can make a morning offering, giving our day to God's service. Entrust all the events, tasks, and concerns of the day to God's mercy and providence. This way, our work is made holy and can help bring souls to Christ.

from Scripture

Matthew 20:1-16a, The generous landowner

In this Gospel reading, Jesus told a parable in which He compared God's kingdom to a vineyard in the charge of a generous landlord. In the parable, the landlord hires groups of workers at various times of the day. All agree with the landlord to work for a "fair wage."

The vineyard is God's kingdom and God is the generous landlord. Some Bible scholars propose that the earlier groups of workers represented the Jewish people, who had followed God's laws for thousands of years, while the Gentiles were the latecomers. The workers also stood for



those whom God calls at various stages of life: from infancy, adolescence, adulthood, and old age.

Then the landlord paid the laborers, beginning with the five o'clock workers. It must have shocked Jesus' listeners to hear that the landlord paid those who worked one hour as if they'd worked for twelve hours.

Clearly, God's idea of a "fair" wage is not the same as ours. What is important is not how many hours we've served God, but if we answered Him when He called us.

Q & A What's the proper way to show reverence before I receive Communion?

In days past, everyone approached the altar, knelt at the altar rail and received the host on our tongues. That was prescribed as a posture of reverence to show respect and adoration for the Body and Blood of our Lord.

The bishops in the United States have decided that we may approach the altar and stand to receive Communion. When we approach, we are to bow as a gesture of reverence before we receive the consecrated host from the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of Holy Communion.

Today we can receive the host either on the tongue or in the hand. To receive in the hand, we place one hand, palm up, on top of the other to form a "throne." We can also receive Holy Communion in the form of precious Blood. When Holy Communion is offered under both kinds we repeat the bow of our heads before receiving each one.

Genuflection is appropriate at other times. For example, we genuflect before the tabernacle containing the Blessed Sacrament.

Feasts & Celebrations

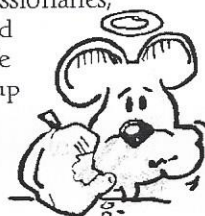
September 1 – St. Giles (710). Shrouded in mystery, St. Giles was a hermit who lived near the Rhône River in France. His fame as a miracle worker drew crowds and disciples to him. Eventually, St. Giles became abbot of a monastery.

September 8 – Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mary's birth brought her parents joy, and we are joyful too – because Mary brings salvation to all of us with the birth of Jesus.

September 14 - The Exaltation of the Holy Cross (c.326). St. Helena, mother

of Emperor Constantine, discovered what is believed to be the Cross of Christ while on pilgrimage in Jerusalem. Constantine built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on the site.

September 28 – St. Wenceslaus (929). Raised by his devout grandmother, St. Ludmilla, "The Good King" St. Wenceslaus worked to end Christian persecution in Bohemia, encouraged German missionaries, built churches, and cared for the sick and poor. He was martyred by a group of dissatisfied nobles, led by his brother, Boleslaus.

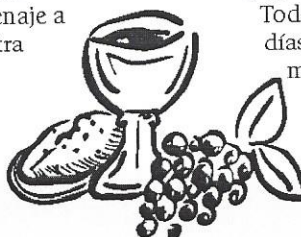

Tiempo para la oración poderosa

Si le cuesta trabajo encontrar tiempo para rezar, ponga a prueba estos tres consejos:

Establezca prioridades. Mucho bien desapercibido depende de la oración y es tan indispensable para nuestras almas como la respiración lo es para el cuerpo. Jesús corrigió a santa Marta porque ella perdió de vista la única cosa "necesaria" (Lucas 10:41-42). Reserve tiempo para la oración diaria. Trátela como si fuera una cita importante, porque lo es.

Ponga límites. Jesús despidió a la multitud por la



tarde y "subió al cerro para orar" (Mateo 14:23). Préstele toda su atención a Dios, minimizando las distracciones. Deje que el mundo espere mientras usted pasa tiempo con quien más le ama.

Active su trabajo. Pocos de nosotros disfrutamos del lujo de poder pasar todo el día en oración, pero podemos hacer una ofrenda matutina, dedicando nuestra jornada al servicio de Dios. Confíe a la misericordia y a la providencia de Dios todos los acontecimientos, tareas y preocupaciones del día. Así santifica su trabajo y puede contribuir a llevar almas a Cristo.

de las **E**scrituras

Mateo 20:1-16a, El propietario generoso

En este pasaje evangélico, Jesús contó una parábola en la cual comparaba el reino de Dios a la viña de un generoso dueño. En la parábola, el dueño contrata a grupos de jornaleros a distintas horas del día. Todos acuerdan con el dueño trabajar por un "salario justo".

La viña es el reino de Dios y Dios es el dueño generoso. Algunos estudiosos de la Biblia sugieren que los primeros grupos de trabajadores representan al pueblo judío que había seguido las leyes de Dios durante miles de años, mientras que los gentiles eran los que llegaron al final. Los trabajadores



representaban también a aquellos a quienes Dios llama en las distintas etapas de la vida: desde la infancia, la adolescencia, la madurez y la vejez.

El dueño pagó a los jornaleros, empezando con los trabajadores de las cinco de la tarde. Los que escuchaban a Jesús debieron de sorprenderse al oír que el dueño pagó a los que trabajaron una hora lo mismo que si hubieran trabajado doce horas. Está claro que la idea que tiene Dios de un "salario justo" es distinta de la nuestra. Lo que es importante no es cuántas horas hayamos servido a Dios, sino que respondimos cuando nos llamó.

¿Cuál es la manera adecuada de mostrar reverencia antes de recibir la Comunión?

En el pasado, todo el mundo se acercaba al altar, se arrodillaba en el comulgatorio y recibía la hostia en la lengua. Así estaba establecido como postura de reverencia para mostrar respeto y adoración al Cuerpo y la Sangre de nuestro Señor.

En la actualidad, los obispos de los Estados Unidos han decidido que nos acerquemos al altar y recibamos la Comunión de pie. Al acercarnos debemos inclinarnos como gesto de reverencia antes de que el sacerdote, el diácono o el ministro extraordinario de la Sagrada Comunión nos dé la hostia consagrada.

Hoy día podemos recibir la hostia en la lengua o en la mano. Para recibirla en la mano, colocamos una mano, con la palma hacia arriba, sobre la otra formando un "trono". También podemos recibir la Sagrada Comunión en la forma de la preciosa Sangre. Cuando recibimos la Comunión bajo las dos especies repetimos la inclinación de cabeza antes de recibir cada una.

La genuflexión es apropiada en otras ocasiones. Por ejemplo, hacemos una genuflexión ante el sagrario que contiene la reserva del sacramento.



Fiestas y celebraciones

1 de septiembre – San Gil (710). Envuelto en misterio, san Gil era un eremita que vivía cerca del río Ródano en Francia. Hasta él acudían multitudes y discípulos atraídos por su fama de milagrero. Finalmente, san Gil se convirtió en abad de un monasterio.

8 de septiembre – Natividad de la Santísima Virgen María. El nacimiento de María fue una alegría para sus padres y también nosotros nos alegramos pues María nos trae la salvación a todos con el nacimiento de Jesús.

14 de septiembre – La exaltación de la Santa Cruz (c. 326). Santa Helena, madre

del emperador Constantino, descubrió lo que se cree que es la cruz de Cristo durante una peregrinación a Jerusalén. Constantino construyó la basílica del Santo Sepulcro en ese lugar.

28 de septiembre – San Venceslao (929). Criado por su devota abuela, santa Ludmila, el "Buen Rey" san Venceslao se esforzó por terminar la persecución a los cristianos en Bohemia, alentó a los misioneros alemanes, construyó iglesias y se ocupó de los pobres y de los enfermos. Fue martirizado por un grupo de nobles insatisfechos a cuya cabeza iba su hermano Boleslao.

Scripture tells us that the laborer is worthy of his hire (1 Tim. 5:18), and many a church document, including *Rerum Novarum*, outline the value of workers and their work: "Justice, therefore, demands that the interests of the working classes should be carefully watched over, so that they who contribute so largely to the advantage of the community may themselves share in the benefits which they create." And, today, in honor of our labor, it's time to take a break.

The first daughter of charity

It's not every day that a Catholic saint is honored with a United Nations resolution. But then, Mother Teresa is hardly an everyday saint. The U.N. honored the famous nun from Kolkata, known the world over for her hands-on care of the poor, with a resolution in 2013. It declared that on the September 5th anniversary of Mother Teresa's death each year, the world would now observe an International Day of Charity. Let's take her at her word: "Love is not patronizing and charity isn't about pity, it is about love. Charity and love are the same—with charity you give love, so don't just give money but reach out your hand instead."

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6, 9-11; Luke 4:31-37 (432). *"All of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness."*

Pray for the persecuted and forgotten

On this day, many Christians of the Eastern tradition celebrate the feast of Saint Donatian and his companions, a group of lesser-known fifth-century martyrs driven out of North Africa by the Arian King Huneric, who persecuted a great many Trinitarians for their faith. Though we may not today face death for our confession, many of our brothers and sisters around the world do, and it is for them that we must pray with the help of Donatian and all who died

for the name of Christ. Even more, we are tasked to help them materially if we can, since—as the Lord says—whatever we do for the least of his siblings, we do for him.

TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:1-8; Luke 4:38-44 (433). *"We have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love that you have for all the holy ones because of the hope reserved for you in heaven."*

School days, Golden Rule days

It's back-to-school season. Learning is foundational to our democracy and also to informed faith. In 2,000 years' time, Christianity has overcome countless heresies (a type of twisting of the belief) and accumulated many saints, martyrs, stories, and traditions. With school back in session, consider sending yourself to "school" to learn more about your own religion. Check out study materials from the U.S. Catholic bishops and formed.org, a program both individuals and parishes can use for faith formation. Make a choice to grow in wisdom and understanding.

The church officially celebrates three Nativities: the Nativity of Jesus, the Son of God (Christmas); the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist (24 June); and the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (8 September). These events tell us everything we need to know about God, faith, and the path to salvation. Through Jesus' Incarnation, we learn that God is with us—always and everywhere. Through John's witness we come to understand that we are not God—not even close—and we must prepare ourselves to welcome God's great goodness into our lives. And through Mary, we are shown the meaning of true discipleship—how to answer God's call and follow Christ through the joyful, sorrowful, and luminous mysteries of our lives in faith.
