

With respect to God, it means making up with greater love for the failure in love through sin: it means restoring what was unjustly taken and compensating with generosity for the selfishness that caused the injury. (Etym. Latin reparare, to prepare anew, restore.)



yourself? Prayerfully consider where and to whom you can give your time and attention.



# Why do Catholics pray for the dead?

friendship with sin on his soul must be purified before entering heaven. We can literally help souls get to heaven. Rest assured: if the person we've prayed for reaches heaven, the graces of those prayers are used to help other souls.

# Dealing with loss and those left behind

Christians know that death leads to marvelous new life, but it is still difficult to lose someone we love. We take comfort knowing that we remain connected in the

Communion of Saints, the spiritual solidarity binding the faithful on Earth, the souls in Purgatory, and the saints in Heaven. Still, finding or offering comfort after a death can be challenging:

Pray. Pray that the souls who have died may find their place in Heaven. Perhaps arrange to have that prayer included in the intentions during Mass in your parish. Including them in your daily prayers also helps to

keep their intentions alive.

Be present. Attend the visitation or funeral. Such customs are part of honoring and praying for the deceased person and showing compassion to the

Offer material support. Bring a meal to the family. Mass cards, notes and phone calls can also offer comfort.

Contribute. Consider making a donation of time or money to organizations such as a local Hospice that provide grace and dignity to those dying.

# Matthew 25:31-46, Showing mercy to the "least"

In this Gospel reading, Jesus describes the coming of the Son of Man, that is, of His glorious return on the last day. Jesus will appear at the end of time as the King of the nations and the Judge of history. Everyone who has ever

first to the last, from the greatest to the least, will stand before Christ. All of us will be judged on how we loved, especially how we treated "the least" who are suffering among us.

The specific criterion for judgment is the basis for the

lived, from the

Corporal Works of Mercy, which are: feed the hungry and give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked and welcome the stranger, care for the sick and imprisoned, and bury the dead.

In the end, we will be judged on our response to the suffering of others. Do we,

"blessed," respond with compassion and mercy, or do we, like the others, turn a blind eye and do nothing? The goal is to see Christ in others and to minister to their needs accordingly.

November 1 – All Saints Day (Holy Day of Obligation). In the early Church, there was a great desire to celebrate each of the martyrs. Because there were more martyrs than days of the year, Pope Gregory IV designated November 1 as All Saints Day. Celebrate the Saints by attending Mass.

November 10 – Pope St. Leo the Great (461). A native of Rome, St. Leo was elected pope while on a mission in Gaul. As pope, he defended the faith from heresy and promoted ecclesiastical unity.

November 18 – St. Rose Philippine Duchesne (1852). Born in Grenoble, France, she joined the Society of the Sacred Heart and came to America as a missionary. She opened the first free school for girls west of the Mississippi river, and the first Catholic school for Native Americans.

November 26 – Solemnity of Christ the King. God promised His people a king who would triumph over their enemies. Jesus is our King. In Baptism and

Baptism and Confirmation, we are brought under His kingship.



# Q How does the& Church decideA who is a saint?

There are many people in Heaven who are saints but whose names we may never know. They are uncanonized saints. Canonization is the formal process by which the Church identifies and determines whether someone has become a saint.



In its simplest form, official Church procedures detail three steps to recognizing a saint. First, the bishop of the diocese where the person

died begins an extensive investigation. The results are passed to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. If the Congregation approves, the prefect presents the cause to the pope. With the pope's approval, the petitioner becomes "venerable" and is called "Servant of God."

Next, "beatification," may come after further investigation and a miracle has proven to be attributed to the Servant of God's intercession after his or her death. Then the person can be called "Blessed."

Finally, canonization may follow additional investigation and a second miracle also proven to have occurred after the beatification and as a result of the candidate's intercession. After canonization, the "Blessed" is called "Saint."



# Mateo 25:31-46, Mostrar misericordia al más pequeño

En este pasaje evangélico, Jesús describe la llegada del Hijo del Hombre, es decir, de su glorioso regreso el último día. Jesús aparecerá al final de los tiempos como el rey de naciones y el juez de la historia. Todos los vivientes, desde el primero hasta el último, desde el mayor al menor,

Este criterio específico de juicio es la base de las Obras Corporales de

1 de noviembre – Día de Todos los Santos (día de precepto). En la Iglesia primitiva, existía un enorme deseo de celebrar a cada uno de los mártires. Como había más mártires que días en el año, el papa Gregorio IV designó el 1 de noviembre como Día de Todos los Santos. Celebren a los santos yendo a

10 de noviembre - San León Magno, papa (461). Nativo de Roma, san León fue elegido papa cuando estaba de misiones en Galia. Como papa defendió la fe de la herejía y fomentó la unidad eclesiástica.

18 de noviembre – Santa Rosa Filipina Duchesne (1852). Nacida en Grenoble, Francia, ingresó en la Sociedad del Sagrado Corazón y fue como misionera a Estados Unidos. Fundó la primera escuela gratuita para niñas al oeste del río Mississippi y la primera escuela católica para nativos americanos.

26 de noviembre - Solemnidad de Cristo Rey. Dios prometió a su pueblo un rev que triunfaría sobre sus enemigos. Jesús es nuestro rev. Nos sometemos a su majestad por el bautismo y la confirmación.

# P ¿Cómo decide la & Iglesia quién R es un santo?

Hay muchas personas en el cielo que son santas pero cuyos nombres quizá no conozcamos nunca. Son santos sin canonizar. La canonización es el proceso formal por el que la Iglesia identifica y determina que alguien es santo. En su forma más simple, el procedimiento oficial de la Iglesia enumera tres pasos

para reconocer a un santo. En primer lugar, el obispo de la diócesis donde murió la persona

inicia una investigación en profundidad. Los

resultados se comunican a la Congregación para las Causas de los Santos. Si la Congregación lo aprueba, el prefecto presenta la causa al papa. Con el visto bueno del papa, el solicitante pasa a ser "venerable" y se le considera "Siervo de Dios".

A continuación puede producirse la "beatificación" tras más investigación y si se demuestra un milagro atribuido a la intercesión del Siervo de Dios después de su muerte. La persona puede ser llamada "Beata".

Finalmente, para la canonización se puede requerir investigación adicional y que se demuestre un segundo milagro atribuido al candidato después de su beatificación. Tras la canonización, el "Beato" pasa a ser llamado "Santo".

# Honor wise council

Let us be grateful that our ancestors cared about the deposit of faith enough to gather and debate at length in order to hand down to future generations such as ours the best the tradition has to offer.

# Act decisively for justice

Today, we remember our forebear Joseph Rummel, the longtime archbishop of New Orleans during the era of Jim Crow segregation in the Deep South. As head of the diocese with one of the largest black populations in the nation, Rummel set out to desegregate local Catholic parishes and schools, including the archdiocesan seminary, beginning in 1948. After a letter from local segregationist Catholics to the pope was rebuffed by the holy father, Rummel declared all parochial schools desegregated in 1962. Famously, he later excommunicated several vocal holdouts

who protested his move. Where is such decisive action against racism among bishops today? We are all responsible for opposing injustice. How will you act for the common good?

### Let the good times roll

Catholics have lots of words with their own twists, and one of them is "feast." While we don't all sit down to a giant meal for every "feast," in some corner of the world, Catholics may well be doing just that. In church language, "feast" means something special is celebrated on a particular day. Feasts range from the death days of saints, to events in Jesus' life, to the foundation of a church with a special history (such as today's feast of the Lateran Basilica). Many feasts have special followings in particular cultures. Let feast days remind you that sometimes devotion also calls for a good party!

#### A veteran worthy of his day

Because Saint Martin of Tours (c. 320-397) was the son of a Roman army officer, he was required by law to serve in the Roman military. Two years after his conversion to Christianity he announced, "I am the soldier of Christ: it is not lawful for me to fight." He was arrested and charged with cowardice. So he volunteered to go into battle unarmed. Before he could make good on his offer, he was discharged from the military. This Veterans Day, we can remember those, like Saint Martin and Venerable Emil Kapaun, Army chaplain, who, for the sake of Christ, go into battle armed only with the love of Christ.
