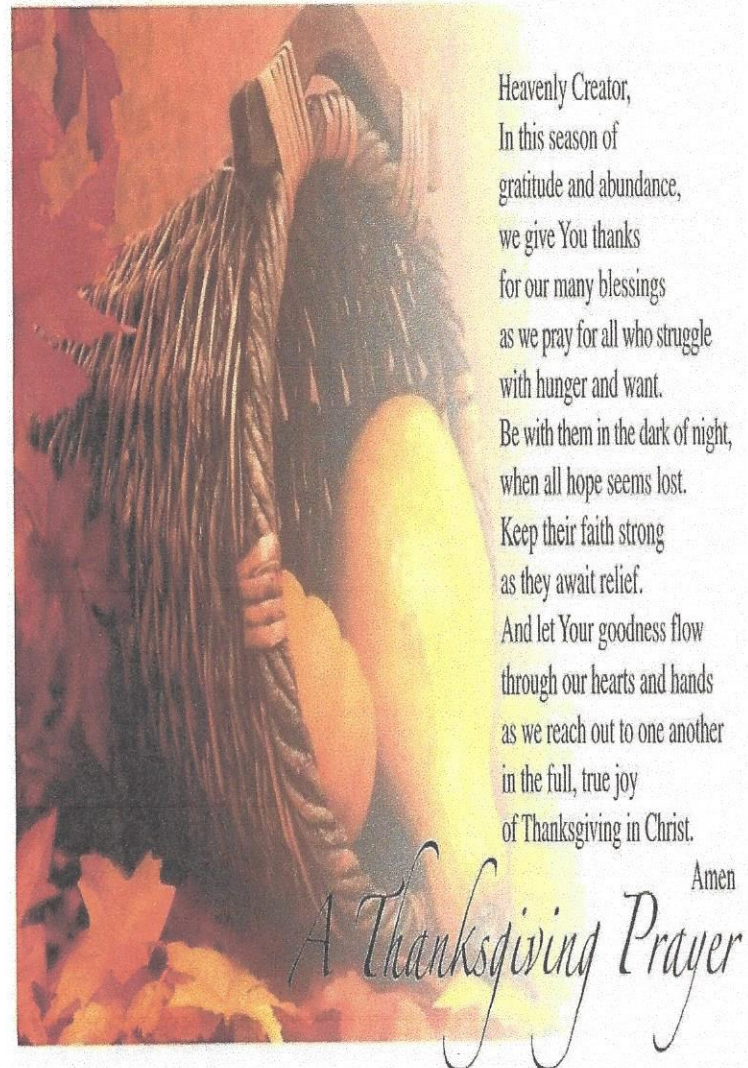
PRAYER FOR RAIN

REPARATION- The act or fact of making amends. It implies an attempt to restore things to their normal or sound conditions, as they were before something wrong was done. It applies mainly to recompense for the losses sustained or the harm caused by some morally bad action. With respect to God, it means making up with greater love for the failure in love through sin: it means restoring what was unjustly taken and compensating with generosity for the selfishness that caused the injury. (Etym. Latin *reparare*, to prepare anew, restore.)

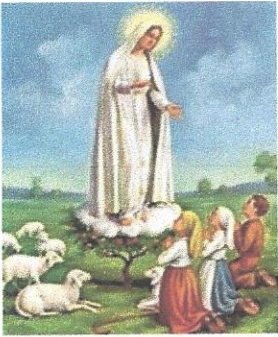

On May 13, 1917 in a small village of Fatima, Portugal, as three young peasant children were tending their family's sheep, a Lady dressed in white appeared to the youngsters. The Lady told them that God had sent her with a message for every living man, woman, and child. She promised that God would grant peace to the entire world if Her requests for prayer, reparation and consecration was heard and obeyed.

From that day in May, through October of that year, the Lady appeared and spoke to the children on the 13th day of each of those 6 months. On Our Lady's last visit to the children on October 13, 1917, she said "I am the Lady of the Rosary." On each of her previous visits she had encouraged the children to pray the Rosary for Peace in the World.

We have a most powerful weapon in the Rosary. Devout praying of the Rosary, with faith, has won battles fought heresies and wrought countless miracles. Many Popes and Saints have endorsed it, and the fact that the Mother of God promotes it should be enough to make it truly powerful!

America Needs Fatima is a special campaign to spread the message of Fatima in the United States. In 1917 ANF started the October Rosary Rally Campaign asking people to pray a rosary in a public place, on the Saturday closest to October 13th, the day our Blessed Mother asked the 3 children to always pray the rosary as it is a most powerful and most effective means of sanctification and in fighting evil.

So we Catholics need to grab our rosaries and pray with all our might because we are faced with situations in our country, in our private lives, and in the Church that are very serious and confusing. For example, the wars (including WWII as the Blessed Virgin Mary predicted would happen); paganism, materialism, and secularism; the satanic invading our cities and our schools; the tremendous increases in abortions, divorce, and birth control; homosexuality, prostitution, immorality in general have increased to an alarming degree. Windthorst Woman Has a Heavenly Experience

Becky Schreiber with her gift, Everyday Angels. She knows that all of the nurses, doctors and rehab specialists were all "every-day angels"

Most of us have heard accounts of people dying and going to heaven only to be brought back to life, but forever changed. A popular book by Don Piper called 90 Minutes in Heaven tells the story of a man who had such an experience. Some of us may personally know someone who has experienced a glimpse of heaven, but most of us have just read accounts or have heard about it on talk shows. Skeptical? Not Becky Crow Schreiber from Windthorst,

Texas. Over 45 minutes without a pulse and she experienced that glimpse of heaven herself.

Becky had driven to Seymour after work on Thursday, September 16, to watch a football game. Little did she know that life was going to take an unexpected turn for her and her family. Plain and simple, her heart stopped! No heart attack, no stroke. Just complete cardiac arrest. According to her doctor, only 10% of people who have suffered from cardiac arrest outside of a hospital setting ever survive. He attributes her survival to being in a small town when it happened, because the determined paramedic administered CPR for 45 minutes while waiting on her to stabilize long enough to transport her to United Regional Hospital in Wichita Falls. According to Becky, her doctor said that most paramedics don't go that long with CPR. He also attributes her survival to her husband who was constantly by her side. Becky contributes it all to the power of prayer. After getting to United Regional, it was still touch and go for many days. Placed on life support, the doctors gave Becky a paralytic drug and then froze her body, a new cutting edge technology. They froze all of the other body organs so that the brain could just concentrate on repairing itself. Over forty-five minutes without a pulse causes severe brain damage due to the lack of oxygen and blood to the brain. The doctor told her family that he knew they all wanted Becky to live, but he wanted them to know he had never seen anybody recover in any way shape or form and functioning after being out as long as she was. Both her neurologist and her cardiologist said that there is no medical science reason as to why she has the brain intact as she does now. "My family is a very prayerful family," Becky said. "There were prayers from all over the country."

Four days passed in the hospital with no response from Becky. The doctors finally decided that they would do the MRI on the fifth day to check for any functional brain activity and assess the damage. Then the family would be able to make a more informed decision about whether or not to end life support. Her husband David lay his head down on Becky's unresponsive body and emphatically and pleadingly said, "Open your eyes, Becky. Open your eyes." And she did.

As soon as she could scribble on a piece of paper, she wrote, "Went to Heaven." After she regained her ability to speak, she told her sister-in-law the story of her experience in Heaven who wrote it down word for word. Becky's account of her out of body experience is as follows: "There was this bright light, and it was very, very, very peaceful. I could hear birds and crickets and all sorts of noises. Then I started getting this overwhelming sense of the smell of lilac. All of the noises and senses were very acute.

My dad, who has been gone for four years, my grandfather, grandmother, and my aunt and uncle all came walking up. They all looked very young, very peaceful. My dad and uncle both had on flannel shirts like they used to wear. My grandfather had on a suit. My Nanny was in a house dress and she looked like she did when she was in her 50's, though she died when she was in her 90's. They were all just smiling very peaceful smiles. I was just trying to get them to come to me and hold me, but I could not get to them.

Distinctly in my daddy's voice, he said, 'Go back baby girl, go back. It's not time yet.'

I asked them if I could stay because I didn't hurt there, but they said, 'No.'

I kept trying to get to them. Then my grandfather stepped forward and said, 'It's not your time. It's not your time; go back.'

I couldn't touch them. The first thing I remember was everyone was yelling, 'BECKY JEAN.' I got the feeling that I had limited time there.

My grandfather told me, 'You can't linger. Tell everyone that we're all fine.'

It was peaceful but lonely and exhausting. I had to walk away."

A dream? An out of body experience? Becky just knows that she had a very real glimpse of heaven.

Twenty-eight days in the hospital and 30 days in inpatient rehab, Becky has made remarkable progress. She lost her speech, movement on the left side of her body, and the ability to do even the simplest math. She is talking up a storm now, and she walked with a cane for the first time at rehab just days ago. Rehab is helping her with reconnecting her short term memory and she is working and making progress with her mathematical skills.

Becky takes 16 meds a day, has a pacemaker and a defibrillator, but just visiting with her, I could notice no difference in the Becky I have always known. She was busy boxing and wrapping Christmas presents that she shopped for over a two day period. She is tough. She is a cancer survivor of 8 years and now healing after a miraculous recovery from cardiac arrest.

Becky has a goal written down. She wants to walk a lap carrying the flag at the Relay for Life next April with Mark Brown, a Scotland resident who is battling cancer. I have no doubt she will achieve this goal.

According to Becky's sister Bev, the neurologist said that he did not actually believe in miracles, but if there was a miracle, this was it. Becky should not have survived, and of the 10% that do survive, patients always have major brain damage. Becky's is very minimal. I don't think you can convince Becky and her husband David, or anyone else in their circle of family and friends, that a miracle did not occur. They know that God has the power to do whatever he wants, and that there is nothing like the power of prayer.

For Catholics, prayer is as essential to the dead as breathing is to the living. Our prayers, according to Catholic tradition, can contribute to the healing of the souls of our dearly departed on the day of judgment.

According to the scriptures, after we die, we will be judged based on our actions while we are living ([Revelations 20:11-13](#)). And on the day of judgment, we will receive the reward or punishment we deserve. The righteous will be with God in paradise, but those who did wrong will be sent either to hell or purgatory. But just like how the saints can intercede for us, our prayers can help our deceased brothers and sisters, too. If many people will pray for those poor souls in purgatory, God - in his mercy and kindness - will surely hear our pleas. This is why the rosary includes the [Fatima Prayer](#) so that we will always include in our prayers a plea for all souls, especially those in need of God's mercy. Aside from what the scriptures tell us, we pray for the dead simply because we love them. Even if they're not with us physically, the memories we shared and the impact they left in our lives will forever stay with us. Offering a prayer for them is also a way of remembering them, a sort of tribute to their memories.

It is an appropriate coincidence that today we also honor Catherine of Alexandria, a young convert martyred at the tender age of 18 during Roman persecutions around the year 300. She was reportedly subject to terrible tortures, but her courage instead attracted hundreds more converts. No woman should have to endure violence for any reason. Today is a day we can honor martyrs both modern and ancient with a firm *"No más, no more."*
