Who is 'good'?

In today's Gospel, a young man approaches Jesus and asks directions to heaven. In response, Jesus first cites the Ten Commandments and the young man responds that he has kept them since he was a child. Jesus affirms his good life, but then says there is one thing more: "Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." As usual, Jesus describes the life of faith as being all-inclusive and invites him to go beyond what the world would consider as sensible. Let's look at Jesus' words.

Go: Our life is not a static one. A relationship with Jesus doesn't come seeking us; it requires active participation on our part. The young man has already begun his journey of faith by approaching Jesus and asking directions. This also indicates that the minimum does not give fullness of faith. In any life, those who are committed to a goal, whether it be work, sports, marriage or anything else go beyond the minimal, often expending much energy and practice to achieve excellence. Jesus isn't repelling the young man, but indicating that he has farther to go in his journey of faith.

Sell what you have, and give to the poor: Catholic life demands a certain degree of detachment from things so that we can choose other things. Jesus doesn't condemn goods and property; they are good in themselves. But, he does ask us to consider our relationship with them. The young man is wealthy; he has most likely worked hard to achieve his wealth. And Jesus asks him to sell it all? That would be difficult for any of us. In actuality, Jesus asks us to consider our relationship to goods and property. If we can realize that all is given us as a gift by God, even when we work hard to attain it, we are less controlled by having to maintain it; we can let go of it when appropriate. The fact that Jesus tells him to give to the poor both reinforces the value of goods and property, and connects us to poor people as brothers and sisters. Think of how parents generously care for their children, providing food, housing and education, even when they have to go without for the good of their children. Can we expand that generosity to society at large? This is the new Jerusalem community that Jesus comes to proclaim.

Then come, follow me: Have you been to a wedding in the Church? One of the three questions that the minister asks the couple is whether they have come freely to proclaim their vows. If there is any withholding of oneself in these vows, there is a possibility of nullity in their marriage. If the young man decides to sell what he has and gives to the poor, he is free of whatever might keep him from saying yes to Jesus. With detachment from physical things we are able to say yes to other things, particularly relationships. I admit, it's hard to let go of something you have worked hard at and in which you have had success. But sometimes that's just what we need to do.

The young man went away sad, for he had many possessions. What we don't know is what he eventually did. Did he just keep walking away from Jesus? Did he go away and realize the depth of relationship that Jesus had invited him to? Did he then sell his possessions? And then return to follow Jesus?

I regularly have to consider my life – what am I clinging to, what gets in the way of living a better life of faith, what keeps me from freely saying yes to Jesus' invitation. And yet, when I do, my life is better. St. Paul says that the Word of God is a sword that penetrates between soul and spirit, joints and marrow. Just when it seems that this journey is going to rip me apart, it most often brings new and deeper life. I pray that you might discover how much you gain when you can sell (be detached from) all that you own.














Pastorela

When Mass cannot be celebrated, a funeral liturgy outside Mass can be celebrated at the church or in the funeral home.



At the funeral liturgy, the Church gathers with the family and friends of the deceased to give praise and thanks to God for Christ's victory over sin and death, to commend the deceased to God's tender mercy and compassion, and to seek strength in the proclamation of the Paschal Mystery. The funeral liturgy, therefore, is an act of worship, and not merely an expression of grief.
