

Can you drink?

In about six weeks we will celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, and every year as we approach this feast the scripture readings for Mass speak more and more of the suffering that Jesus will undergo to fulfill his mission and the will of his Father. The first reading today is understood by the Church as pointing forward to Jesus. It's from the prophet Isaiah and refers to the character known as the Suffering Servant who suffers by the will of God. He will justify many people and bear their sins in order to bring salvation.

Just before today's Gospel passage Jesus has begun to talk with his disciples about the death he will suffer. The disciples react negatively, the intimation being that they will protect him. But the brothers James and John react with the hope that they might share in his status when all is fulfilled. Their passion for following Jesus leads them to ask that they might share in his leadership in the new kingdom, the new Jerusalem. Sitting at Jesus' right and left indicate that they would be his confidants and share in the glory that Jesus will have. However, they don't realize what is the path to these positions. "Can you drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" They respond positively expressing their zeal in following Jesus.

"Can you drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" Is this question that Jesus asks us a warning, or part of how things naturally go? For the disciples, those closest to Jesus and most committed to his mission, the reality is that they will share in the power of Jesus through the gift of his Holy Spirit after the resurrection, but that most of them will eventually suffer and die because of their faith.

In a sense the question is a warning to us. If we are serious about our faith, we will undoubtedly face difficulties, challenges and resistance. The way of life that Jesus preaches is different than how we usually experience society. His directives to love your neighbor, to give up your life so that others might live, are not what the world considers profitable, and even seem weakness. According to many in the world, it's just stupid! But for us who know Jesus, who are baptized into his death so that we might have life, is there another way of thinking about it?

In reality the generosity, thoughtfulness and self-giving of Jesus are at the foundation of God's creation in which we live. "God is love," the letter of John tells us. At its very nature, love is an outpouring of oneself so that with others we might be complete. Marriage is the clearest example of our sharing in God's nature. Spouses have reached a degree of intimacy that results in unity. (The two shall become one.) It is more than obvious that sometimes this brings suffering as differences try to separate us and tear at the roots of our relationships. If spouses are committed to living out their vows, they will seek to overcome these differences with honesty, generosity and selflessness for the good of the other, for the good of their marriage.

Spiritually, when we seriously commit ourselves to these relationships which express the very depths of our nature, we join ourselves to Jesus bringing about not only salvation, but more so the fulfillment of what creation is all about. United in love for one another we assist in bringing about God's initial desire in creation. Ultimately we are created for unity based in love. And by cooperating with God's desire we help creation achieve its goal. The end of the world is not intended to be destruction, but unity of all with, and in, God.

Heavy stuff, this is. We can't do it alone; we need each other and we need God. As we look forward to celebrating Jesus who is the King of the universe, let that be our strength and our hope as we strive in being fully human, fully loving. May God bless us and support us in our journey.
















Pastorela

Funeral Rites Part 4

Rite of Committal (Burial or Interment)

The Rite of Committal, the conclusion of the funeral rite, is the final act of the community of faith in caring for the body of its deceased member. It should normally be celebrated at the place of committal, that is, beside the open grave or place of internment. In committing the body to its resting place, the community expresses the hope that, with all those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith, the deceased awaits the glory of the resurrection. The Rite of Committal is an expression of the communion that exists between the Church on earth and the Church in heaven: the deceased passes with the farewell prayers of the community of believers into the welcoming company of those who need faith
