Doing for Others

Today's readings give us wonderful examples of hospitality. The first is from the story of Abraham in the book of Genesis. He and Sarah are in the midst of the desert, living in a tent near a large tree called a terebinth, which is the tree from which turpentine is made. This kind of tree is important in the Bible as a location where encounters with God can happen. Along come three strangers and Abraham takes generous care of feeding them and giving them a place to rest. In the desert, hospitality is quite important as places to find water are few and far between and one must rely on strangers in such a cruel environment. After the lavish meal prepared by Sarah, the three men reveal that they are messengers of God. They provide more proof of God's fulfilling his promise of a son when they inform Moses that they will return the following year, and Sarah will have given birth to a son. We are reminded of the following quote from the letter to the Hebrews in chapter 13:

Do not neglect hospitality,

for through it some have unknowingly entertained angels.

The second example of hospitality, of giving of oneself for the sake of others, is quite different. St. Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, tells the community that he rejoices in his suffering for the sake of the faithful in Colossus. This isn't the banquet that Abraham prepares in the first reading, but is it not also an example of caring for others? Paul has embraced suffering in his life that he might share the Gospel with others, and in this he brings them spiritual nourishment. Are we willing to be selfless, like Paul, so that others may come to know life? Sometimes it means going out of the way or being inconvenienced in order to help someone else. And sometimes it means embracing our own pain and suffering to join Christ's saving Passion.

Finally, the Gospel tells us that we need balance in our lives, as well. Sisters Mary and Martha have welcomed Jesus into their house. Martha is in the kitchen preparing a meal in hospitality, while Mary is sitting at the feet of Jesus listening to his teaching. Frustrated and perhaps jealous Martha tries to pull Jesus into her anger with her sister, that she should help with the preparations. Jesus verry simply responds that Mary's choice is the better one. Being present to Jesus and receiving him in our lives is the part that nourishes us spiritually in order to be hospitable.

I struggle with keeping a healthy balance in my life between action and contemplation. May we all have the necessary time in the presence of Jesus that enables us to be hospitable to others.

Safe Environment Training through Virtus

Per the Code of Conduct, the Archdiocese of San Antonio requires 3 trainings:

- Sexual Harassment Training: Sexual harassment training is required for clergy, candidates for ordination, employees, and adult volunteers. This training must be renewed every three years.
- Protecting God's Children: Protecting God's Children is required for clergy, candidates for ordination, employees, and adult volunteers who minister to children/youth. This training must be renewed every three years.
- Vulnerable Adults Training: Vulnerable adults training is required for clergy, candidates for ordination, employees, and adult volunteers who minister to adult vulnerable populations. This training must be renewed every three years.



OCIA

Want to become Catholic?

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) might be the place for you.

What is OCIA?

The OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) is a process that engages prospective converts to Catholicism who are beyond the age of reason (older than seven years, but often older than 18). It is designed specifically for those who are unbaptized, but often and legitimately used for those who are baptized (Catholic or non-Catholic), but un-catechized.

For example, some OCIA candidates were baptized Catholic, but were never raised in the Faith. Other candidates may be baptized non-Catholic Christian and never catechized as a Catholic. For those who have been baptized Catholic and raised in the Faith at home, through religious education, or Catholic schooling, a Confirmation program may be a more fitting program.

What does the process look like?

The OCIA program is organized and run by lay members of our parish and overseen by our pastor. The OCIA team members (those who run the program) and candidates (those wishing to become Catholic and/or fully initiated) typically meet on the parish grounds.

Weekly meetings will begin early September, and conclude shortly after Easter Sunday. Each meeting will involve a different lesson about the Catholic Faith. During the Season of Lent, in the few weeks before the Easter Vigil Mass, candidates undergo what are called "scrutinies." It's a scary word, but it simply involves the candidate making a progressively deeper commitment to the Faith that they are about to profess.

It does not involve any type of speech, but simply standing before the congregation at a Sunday Mass for a brief moment as the priest recites a few prayers on your behalf and asks you to affirm your decision with very simple responses.

How do I join?




The new Sacred Space Virtual Tour from El Camino de San Antonio Missions is narrated by KENS 5 anchor and reporter Alicia Neaves. The Tour pairs engaging commentary with on-screen images accessible via QR code on the pilgrim -passport stamp stand inside (or just outside) each church. Often called the "Queen of the Missions," Mission San José offers ornate stonework and a beautiful sacristy. Discover the legendary Rose Window – it is widely considered one of the finest examples of baroque architecture in North America. The sacristy features an ornately carved lavabo, where water flowed from a cherub's mouth into a bowl with a carved shell feature.
