

Was Mary really an "unwed mother"? As Matthew makes clear in today's Gospel, the answer is clearly no—Mary and Joseph were really "betrothed," she was his wife, and Joseph was really contemplating divorce. Marriage customs were such that the last stage of the marriage was that the betrothed came together to live as husband and wife. Christmastime is Near

In just a few days, our pews will be filled with visitors. Some of these visitors consider Assumption their home even though they rarely attend Holy Mass. Some of these visitors have been away from the Church for a long time. Some of these visitors are coming with their family and may not be Catholic.

We may not be the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis with a spectacular church but as clergy and laity, we try our best to provide beautiful and inspiring music, prepared liturgical ministers, and thoughtful homilies. One thing we can *all* do is provide a welcoming attitude to our visitors! A smile and warm greeting of "Merry Christmas!" goes a long way to help someone feel welcome. Please be kind by moving down the pew to make room for others. Please don't make people climb over you. A lot of people judge the whole parish based on the experience of entering a pew!

Our hope is that everyone who attends Holy Mass over Christmas feels welcome and is inspired to enter into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.

On Sunday, December 29th, the Feast of the Holy Family, everyone is welcome to join us in consecrating themselves to the Holy Family. This consecration is a way of entrusting you and your family to the powerful protection of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.

January 1st is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. It is a holy day of obligation. In addition to our regular Masses on December 31st at 4 and 6 p.m. and January 1st at 8 and 10 a.m., we have added a 6 p.m. Mass for New Years Revelers and travelers who needed a humane Mass time.

On Sunday, January 5th, the Church observes the Feast of Epiphany. At the end of Mass, the priests will bless chalk for you to take home and mark your house with an Epiphany Blessing.

RECLAIMING MY CATHOLIC FAITH

Reclaiming My Catholic Faith Christmas Edition

The Christmas Season has it's own vocabulary.

Incarnation – This word means "to be made flesh." Theologians in the Early Church used this word to describe the mystery of the Son of God, Jesus Christ, taking on humanity in every way except sin. Therefore, the Son of God set aside the glory of heaven to take on a human body along with the sufferings, sickness, temptations, and emotions associated with human nature. The eternal Son of God accepted the eventuality of human death. This bond between the divine and human was not temporary, but from the moment of the Incarnation, the Son of God was forever to adopt our humanity and its effects.

The Early Church marveled at this idea. They pondered it and celebrated it. They also thought through the ramifications of the God-made-man and how it is necessary for the total redemption of all humanity.

Nativity – This word means "to be arisen by birth." The Nativity of Our Lord is the infancy narrative found in Gospels of Luke and Matthew where we learn of Christ's birth in Bethlehem.

Luke's story of the Nativity includes the birth of Jesus and the Angelic proclamation to the Shepherds. Matthew's Gospel gives the Genealogy of Jesus and tells the story of the visit by the Magi.

Epiphany – This word means "manifestation." The Manifestation of Jesus Christ is actually a series of events where we come to recognize the divinity of Jesus.

The "Epiphany" originally included the birth of Jesus, the angelic proclamation to the shepherds, the adoration by the Magi, Christ's Presentation in the Temple, Finding in the Temple and even His Baptism in the Jordan and His First Miracle in Cana of Galilee. Each of these events revealed or manifested some divine attribute of Jesus.

But over the years, the Church split these events in Jesus' life giving each of them a special commemoration in the liturgical calendar and the adoration by the Magi has become known as "the Epiphany".

Magi – This word comes from the plural of Magus, meaning "Great Ones." The Magi have several identities; they are known as the Wise Men, or Astrologers from the East, or Three Kings. The Old Testament gives various prophecies of people from beyond Israel worshipping the God of Israel. The Magi is a fulfillment of this at Christ's birth. Their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh symbolize Christ's kingship, divinity and saving death.

Important Announcement Regarding "Protecting God's Children"

The Archdiocese of St. Louis has developed a new system for safe environment compliance called Prevent and Protect STL. Everyone ministering to minors and vulnerable adults in the Archdiocese are required to register in the new system. This includes all clergy, employees and volunteers who are currently in compliance and those new to service. All new registrants will need to attend a Protecting God's Children workshop. For those who have already attended a Protecting God's Children workshop, your previous training date will transfer to this new system. In addition, everyone will register for an updated background screening, view two online training modules on abuse reporting and the Code of Ethical Conduct, and agree to the updated Code of Ethical Conduct.
