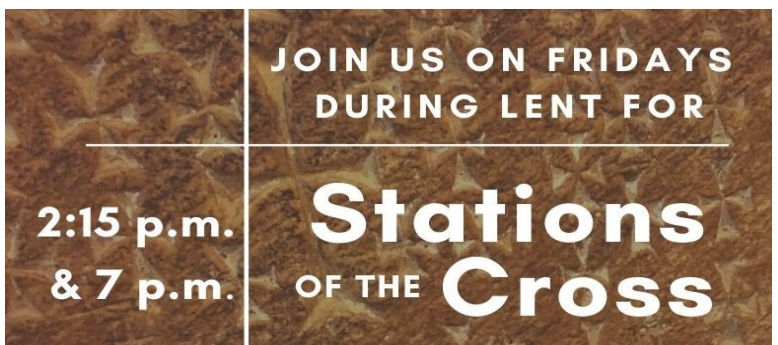

Epidemics and the Catholic Faith

Despite so much media attention on the COVID-19 Coronavirus, there are actually very few cases in the United States. The vast majority of cases are mild, and fatalities are mostly restricted to vulnerable populations of the elderly. Regardless, anxiety is everywhere. Most people alive today have never had first-hand experience of an epidemic and they don't know what to think or how to act. People are suspicious of interpersonal contact, stockpiling supplies, and some are already isolating at home. Federal, state and local governments brace for the worst even if it doesn't come.

The Catholic Church is 2,000 years old and she has seen her share of epidemics

Assumption Parish was around during the 1918 epidemic known as the Spanish Flu. Globally, it is estimated that almost one third of the earth's population contracted the Spanish Flu and at least 50 million people died from it. The first local case appeared at Jefferson Barracks on October 1, and despite quarantine measures, within a week, St. Louis City had over 900 cases of the flu. Before it was over in early 1919, at least 31,500 St. Louisans developed the flu and 1,703 died. It also spread among the residents of rural Mattese, Missouri. Our parish records show a spike in funerals in November 1918 and again in January 1919. Especially hard-hit was the Wagner family who lost two sons in their early 20's to pneumonia which resulted from the flu. Assumption's pastor, Fr. Charles Eining, bravely went into the homes of influenza patients to hear their confessions and administer Last Rites. In those last hours of life, as a dying person lies in bed, their voice is weak, and a priest must get unusually close to hear their confession. Fr. Eining and priests around the world exhibited unusual courage in the face of a highly contagious disease because their zeal for souls was greater than their fear of death.

In fact, in Europe during the Middle Ages, the Black Death killed at least 30% of the population, but priests died at an even greater rate because they contracted the disease while conferring Last Rites to plague victims. So many priests died of the epidemic by the year 1348, people feared there would be no one left to hear their confessions when their time came. Responding to this fear, Pope Clement VI, who personally cared for the dying in Avignon, France where the papacy was located, granted a special remission of all sins to all plague victims wherever they were, provided they told their sins to someone, even a layperson.

A few centuries later during the Renaissance, entire convents of nuns died caring for those suffering from the Bubonic Plague. Nuns, like the Benedictines of Sainte-Croix Abbey in Poitiers, France, opened their monasteries to the care for the plague victims. Patients vomited frequently and had large open sores that easily infected the nuns who cleaned their wounds and changed their bedding. The nuns were aware that the plague spread by personal contact, but they opened their convent to the sick anyway and as a result they all died.

In 1873, Fr. Damian De Veuster was assigned to a leper colony at Molokai, Hawaii. He cared for the residents spiritually, emotionally, and physically. He was their priest, teacher, nurse, and friend. His goal was to treat each person with dignity no matter how deformed they were by disease. One day Fr. Damian realized he had the terrible disease. Undaunted, he continued to care for his flock until he died in 1889. He was canonized St. Damian of Molokai in 2009.

In modern times, between 1981 and 1995, over 300,000 people in the United States died from HIV and AIDS. In the first years of the epidemic, stigmas and fears surrounded AIDS patients, yet members of the Catholic laity were in the forefront of caring for them in group homes and hospices established by Catholic Charities. They are examples of how to show compassion while being attentive to modern infection-prevention protocols. (over)

Catholics selflessly care for Christ in those who suffer.

In times past, popes, bishops and priests organized solemn liturgical processions to implore Divine Assistance to avert epidemics. Processions included holy water mixed with blessed salt that was sprinkled on the faithful and on their homes to protect against epidemics. The blessing reflects this intention: *“May everything that this water sprinkles in the homes and gatherings of the faithful be delivered from all that is unclean and hurtful; let no breath of contagion hover there, no taint of corruption.”* During the processions, the relics of certain saints, especially St. Sebastian, St. Roch, or local saints were carried to protect against epidemics. Laypeople in the processions often walked barefoot, wore sackcloth and marked their foreheads with ashes, like we do on Ash Wednesday, as signs of repentance. In 593 AD, Pope St. Gregory the Great ordered an image of the Blessed Mother to be carried in solemn procession to protect the people of Rome. The city was spared and today that same image is venerated in the Basilica of St. Mary Major as a lasting memory of the Virgin Mary’s protection in time of pestilence.

During the 1866 St. Louis Cholera Epidemic, one out of ten city residents died. Parishioners from St. Joseph’s at 11th and Biddle (today St. Joseph’s Shrine) were particularly hard hit. The Jesuit priests assigned there officiated at as many as ten to twenty Funeral Masses a day! At the height of the epidemic, the pastor, Fr. Joseph Weber S.J., invited remaining parishioners to invoke St. Joseph for protection. In return, they signed a pledge to build a grand monument to commemorate God’s mercy. Miraculously, not a person who signed the pledge died. Soon the epidemic throughout the city subsided. Today, the church’s beautiful main altar, known as the “Altar of Answered Prayers,” stands as a reminder of St. Joseph’s intercession and God’s mercy.

Catholics also pray for those who died of epidemics. In the Middle Ages, churches were erected and monasteries were founded to encourage constant prayers for those who died in epidemics. Throughout our history, Masses are offered and Rosaries prayed for the dead. In Lucerne, Switzerland public artwork painted after a 17th century epidemic show dancing skeletons to remind people to pray for the dead and to shun the vanities of the world in preparation for one’s own judgement.

Catholics entrust themselves and their loved ones to God during times of suffering.

In time of crisis, people often ask priests “why are we being punished?” The answer is always the same: sin. Suffering is the punishment of Original Sin.

Does God send specifically, epidemics to chastise humanity for sin? The Old Testament records several pestilences that God sent as punishments for sin. We know sinful actions affect us spiritually, but we forget sin can affect us physically too. We know that disordered living, while often pleasurable in the short-term, is a natural pathway to long-term suffering and even death. God does not have to intervene supernaturally to chastise us for sin, because the ill-effects of our own actions often return to punish us. The question for the Catholic is, do we believe God is able to use what appears to us like evil to bring about good? Can suffering make us better? Can suffering help us return to God? Of course, the answer is yes.

Suffering gives us the opportunity to put our lives into perspective. Mindful of our fragile existence, suffering can lead us to conversion from sin and help us return to Confession. Suffering brings perfection of the soul by learning humility, compassion, patience, perseverance, and generosity. Suffering is never meaningless; it can always be prayerfully offered for the redemption of others.

Catholics believe suffering can lead people to God.

We can learn from our past what the authentic Catholic response should be today, not just to epidemics, but to any illness and suffering. We should respond with courage, solidarity with the sick and demonstrate charity and compassion for those who suffer. Illness reminds us to seek God’s help in our daily life, do penance for past offences, amend our life, place our trust in God, and make a firm commitment to pray for the living and the dead.

In STEM classes, we use hands-on activities to teach students a variety of topics including science, technology, engineering and mathematics. This year we have continued to incorporate community resources to this engaging approach to learning.

Students in grades 1-5 learned about stormwater management, pollution, and water quality by using the Enviroscope watershed model provided by MSD Clean Water Education.

Students in grades 1-4 continue to learn about digital citizenship and safety with Interland, an adventure-packed online game sponsored by Google. This program includes classroom activities reinforce the fundamental lessons.

Students in grades 2-3 learned how to practice compassion and empathy, identify emotions and exercise growth mindset through Everfi's online Compassion Project.

Sixth grade students participated in the Energy Efficiency Kits Program sponsored by Ameren Missouri and Spire. In this program students learned about electricity, natural gas, and water. The sponsors provided student books, teacher materials, and an energy efficiency kit for each child free of charge. The student kits included a high-efficiency showerhead, bathroom and kitchen faucet aerators, a digital thermometer, a pipe wrap, a furnace filter whistle, and four LED light bulbs!

Students in grades 5-7 participated in the Future Goals Hockey Scholar program sponsored by the Saint Louis Blues. This program combines simulations and hands-on activities to learn about the Science and Math of Hockey.

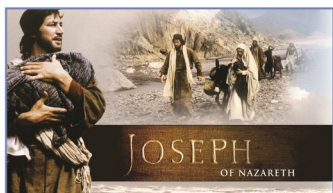
