# Safety Procedures for Attending Mass During this Time at Assumption (5/16/2020)

- 1. The obligation to attend the Sunday Mass remains lifted indefinitely. Livestreamed Masses will continue at www.assumptionlive.com. Anyone who is ill or showing symptoms of the Coronavirus, who has been in contact with someone with COVID-19, who is vulnerable due to preconditions, or over 60 years of age are asked to remain at home and participate via livestream.
- 2. Based on Assumption's occupancy, only 125 people are permitted per Mass until further notice. In order to reserve a place for you and your family, please go to <a href="www.assumptionstl.org">www.assumptionstl.org</a> to sign up or please call 314-487-7970 during office hours, M-F 8:30 a.m.—4:30 p.m. If your preferred Mass is full, please consider one of our other Masses. Since there is no obligation to attend Sunday Mass, some parishioners may want to try a weekday Mass. Parishioners should sign-up for every Mass they wish to attend, even weekday Masses.
- 3. To maintain "physical distancing," masks are required for all children 2 and above and for all adults. We have a limited supply of masks for those who do not have their own. Individuals/families are asked to sit at least six feet from others and every other pew will be available for seating. Church doors will be propped open, holy water and hymnals have been removed, and hand sanitizer is available throughout the church. At our fuller Masses, an usher may instruct you where to sit. Following Masses, we ask that some parishioners remain behind to apply sanitizer to the pews and other surfaces for the next congregation.
- 4. Monitored baskets will be placed around the church for offertory envelopes and cash donations. Online giving is encouraged. Go to <a href="https://www.assumptionstl.org">www.assumptionstl.org</a> to sign up.
- 5. The Offertory Procession, Sign of Peace and Communion Under Both Kinds will be omitted.
- 6. Communicants are asked to approach the priest/deacon in a single file line leaving six feet from the person ahead of you. When you arrive at the priest/deacon, temporarily remove your mask, carefully receive Holy Communion in the hand and replace the mask after receiving. Making a Spiritual Communion remains a prudent option.

#### Re-Entry

The process for re-opening Assumption is going to be slow. Because a large number of our parishioners are classified as "vulnerable", it would be better safe than sorry.

#### Masses

As you know, Masses are public again, however, there is no obligation to attend. Certain precautions are being taken to protect those who come including wearing masks, leaving doors open, providing hand sanitizer throughout the church, sanitizing pews and other surfaces after Masses and omitting the parts of the Mass where physical contact is more likely to occur. Parishioners who receive Communion, should do so in the hand. If for some reason, that troubles your conscience, you should go to one of the priests and receive last. Of course, the safest form for Communion is to continue to make a Spiritual Communion. We ask parishioners to "space themselves" by being mindful of the six-feet rule and for signing-up for Masses online at <a href="https://www.assumptionstl.org">www.assumptionstl.org</a> so we can see when they are beginning to get full. Only 125 people are allowed in the church at this time.

#### **Rectory Office**

The rectory office is open during from 8:30 a.m.—4:30 p.m.

#### Early Learning Center and Summer Camp

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) has issued guidelines, but St. Louis County has been very slow in permitting Child Care. Our AELC and Summer Camp staff are preparing to open in June.

#### **Parish Meetings**

So far, the Archdiocese has only permitted Masses and other Liturgies under the conditions described above. Events, funeral luncheons, and coffee and doughnuts after Masses are not permitted yet. We are going to slowly open parish meetings – Youth Ministry will start first and then as the summer unfolds, groups will more populations classified as "vulnerable" will receive permissions to start meeting.

#### "Reconnect"

As we slowly re-enter parish life, I encourage you to wear the name tag we sent to your home. Not only does it help while we are all wearing face masks, but it helps us get to know each other and defeats the feelings of isolation we have all experienced.

# What You Can do if You are at Higher Risk of Severe Illness from COVID-19

# Are You at Higher Risk for Severe Illness?

Based on what we know now, those at high-risk for severe illness from COVID-19 are:

- People aged 65 years and older
- People who live in a nursing home or long-term care facility

People of all ages with underlying medical conditions, particularly if not well controlled, including:

- People with chronic lung disease or moderate to severe asthma
- People who have serious heart conditions
- People who are immunocompromised
  - Many conditions can cause a person to be immunocompromised, including cancer treatment, smoking, bone marrow or organ transplantation, immune deficiencies, poorly controlled HIV or AIDS, and prolonged use of corticosteroids and other immune weakening medications.
- People with severe obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 40 or higher)
- People with diabetes
- People with chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis
- People with liver disease

## Here's What You Can do to Help Protect Yourself



**Stay home** if possible.



Wash your hands often.



**Avoid close contact** (6 feet, which is about two arm lengths) with people who are sick.



**Clean and disinfect** frequently touched surfaces.



**Cover your mouth and nose** with a cloth face cover when around others.



Cover coughs and sneezes.

#### SCAMS TARGETING SENIORS

Unfortunately, there are shady people out to make a quick buck during this coronavirus pandemic. New scam artists seem to be popping up each day and some shady dealings are targeted specifically to older adults. Some examples to bring to your attention include:

- 1. Home Test Kits for COVID-19: Scammers are contacting older adults offering "coronavirus test kits" in an attempt to collect credit card or banking information.
- **2.** Fake COVID-19 Products and Services: Text and phone scams are falsely advertising products, such as fake drugs, vaccines and devices, that claim to prevent or cure COVID-19. At the time of this writing, there is no known cure or vaccine.
- 3. Impersonating a Government Agency: scammers contact elderly recipients to tell them that their benefits will be suspended or decreased due to COVID-19 unless they provide personal information or payment.
- 4. **Insurance Scams:** several scams are offering low-cost health and life insurance that are being presented as "free gifts."
- 5. **Stimulus-related Scams:** these scams ask consumers to provide bank account information so funds can be "released" or loan applications can be approved pertaining to the government stimulus monies paid to Americans.
- 6. **Charity and Donation Scams:** Preying on the good-nature of many older adults, scammers aim to collect money for fake COVID-19 relief agencies. Ask yourself, "Is this charity one with whom I'm already acquainted or have contributed to in the past?"
- 7. **Tech Support Scams:** With everyone now home-bound, use of electronics naturally has increased in order to feel connected to the outside

world. Scammers are using various communication and social platforms offering "technical support" services for electronic users. It may be a legitimate service, especially if the name or email address sounds familiar to you, or maybe not as these types of hoaxes are on the rise.

In general, be skeptical and follow your instincts, especially when it comes to the bombardment of information regarding COVID-19. Always keep in mind to:

- NEVER give your personal information to callers on the phone or in response to email messages you have received, especially if it is someone with whom you are not familiar. Personal information includes your street address, credit card numbers, driver's license, social security number, banking information, pharmaceutical prescriptions, or registration numbers for subscriptions.
- Only open email messages or answer phone calls that are from someone whose name you recognize.
- NEVER click on the link in a suspicious email or from an untrusted source.
- Do your research on the company when contracting with a service provider or making a charitable contribution to an unfamiliar agency.
- Make sure you fully understand the scope of the work before accepting any offer, make a deposit, or pay for services upfront.

If you or your senior loved one receives a suspicious text, call, or email related to COVID-19, or if you think they might be a victim of a COVID-19 hoax or fraudulent website, you should file a complaint with the Better Business Bureau and the Federal Trade Commission immediately. Also contact local law enforcement to make an official report. There is also a public service called BBB Scam Tracker (www.bbb.org/scamtracker) for reporting and reviewing known scams.
