

Pastor's Column

The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly

Last week was a memorable week.

The Good

Last Sunday we concluded the SEEK22 Conference. SEEK is an annual conference presented by a ministry called FOCUS Federation of Catholic University Students. FOCUS is an international organization that trains "missionaries" to go to university campuses to call fallen away Catholic students back to the Faith or to accompany individuals who want to become Catholic. FOCUS Missionaries encourage "disciple-making" through a practice called "spiritual multiplication." Spiritual multiplication is the practice of developing deep spiritual relationships with a few people, helping them become true disciples of Jesus by living their Catholic faith, and then preparing them to develop meaningful relationships with others so they can multiply disciples themselves.

There were approximately 150 people including the staff that organized the weekend participating in SEEK22. Most were Assumption parishioners and staff, but we also welcomed some Carmelites of the Divine Heart of Jesus, parishioners from Good Shepherd in Hillsboro, and ABIDE – the South County young adult ministry. The weekend seemed like a great success and a lot of people are on fire to share the Good News of Jesus with others.

The Bad

On Monday a homeless man was dropped off on our campus looking for financial help at the rectory. We do not give out money so staff members try to listen to the person to see how we can help their situation. Often our St. Vincent de Paul Society can offer assistance, so they usually get involved. While most homeless ask for a few dollars, what they really need are mental health resourses, and unfortunately these are difficult to find in today's world. Within minutes of arrival the person became belligerent and began making serious threats. Usually threats from people seeking assistance are exaggerated, but because underlying mental health issues or intoxication amplify emotions, the threats point to the possibility of physical violence. So, this triggered a lockdown in school and in the moment, it was not possible to describe exactly what was going on and it made for a very tense and scary moment for the faculty and students. Other staff members quickly arrived for support and the police arrived quickly and the man was taken into custody. This kind of incident is an unfortunate possibility for anyone who helps the poorest of the poor, but we do it because it is intrinsic to our Catholic faith. When it happens, our goal is to keep everyone safe.

The Ugly

To everyone's surprise, the following day, we all awoke to news that a St. Louis County judge was treating this incident very seriously and considered some of the man's statements a terrorist threat. The judge placed the man's bail extremely high, meaning the court system would be forced to deal with the man's inappropriate behavior. We are very grateful that the police and judge did not just return a man in need of mental health care back onto the street. However, the judge's actions caught the attention of the local media. As we read the story, it made the incident seem very different than it unfolded. Unfortunately, local newsrooms are understaffed leaving someone to piece together stories from police reports and court records and put them in print or on the air. The details of the incident at Assumption were completely different from what was reported and unfortunately no one from the St. Louis Post Dispatch, KSDK, or any other outlet that reported on it bothered to reach out to us for a comment. This is inexcusable and lacked journalistic integrity or human compassion for the children involved. If someone had called, we would have been happy to explain the details of the story. In a case of bad timing, the Archdiocese Communication Office recently experienced a change of personnel, and the normally very proactive office did not come to our rescue as expected. So, Assumption administrators were occupied the entire day responding to unnecessarily frightened, shocked, or angry parents and parishioners each time the media fleshed out their story with inaccurate details.

Now, I know you skipped "The Good" news in the first paragraphs. Stop and read that because it will be the news of lasting importance.

All Things New" Reflection and Report

The day-to-day work of the Catholic Church is found in parishes. This is where the sacraments are conferred, relationships are built, catechesis takes place, and charity is exercised. The heart of the Church is really the local parish.

The parochial system (system of parishes with territorial boundaries) has been part of the Catholic Church since the time of the Apostles when they appointed overseers, elders, and servants (bishops, priests, and deacons) over little Christian communities in various towns. In larger cities a bishop divided up the neighborhoods and placed priests and deacons in each area to serve the Christians and the poor in that place. The parochial system is still in use today.

St. Louis parishes come with a lot of emotional attachments. Parishes reflect neighborhood pride. Parishes are a place of family occasions. Parishes are the patrimony of generations of donors. Many St. Louis parishes have schools. This adds a lot of other feelings, because growing up on a parish campus makes it feel like an extension of oneself. St. Louis has one other thing, CYC sports. We may have the most comprehensive youth sports program of any diocese. Most diocese have none. Because of this we have developed a strong sense of competition with our neighboring parishes. One long time difficulty in St. Louis is getting parishes to do things together successfully. This inability to work together is sometimes called "parochialism."

While we love our parishes, St. Louis Catholics often display opposition or suspicion toward "The Archdiocese." It used to be called under the euphemism "Lindell" referring to the former location of the Chancery on Lindell Boulevard. Now the Chancery, Curia and Archbishop's offices are in Shrewsbury in the closed Kenrick Seminary building known as the Rigali Center or Pastoral Center. It is not uncommon for a donor to say, "My donation isn't going to end up on Lindell, is it?" It is easy for "The Archdiocese" to be perceived as the enemy, but what is "The Archdiocese?" On one level it is an archbishop and the priests and laypeople who advise him. But the archdiocese is really us, all the parishes and other Catholic institutions working together to a common goal.

The Archdiocese of St. Louis strategic plan "All Things New" is asking very difficult questions – how can we care for all these campuses? How can we continue to have a sacramental, pastoral, and educational presence in all these parishes with fewer priests, declining and aging populations, and stretched financial resources? The more important questions – how can we reach out to others to invite them to deeper faith? How can we do a better job of handing the faith to the next generation? Without answering these questions, we will continue to see decline. But the hard reality is that it is unreasonable to believe that we are going to suddenly - after 50 years of decline - change our behavior and live in a way that attracts others to faith without serious self-reflection.

Yes, the *All Things New* strategic plan is an example of central planning by the archdiocese, but to be successful it will also will require all the parishes and parishioners participate as we refine our goals as Catholics and discern how we will achieve this goal despite formidable challenges. To this end, the archdiocese has been divided into 15 geographic planning groups to get parishes to work together on the strategic plan. These groups have common challenges and resources. Assumption is grouped with 14 other parishes on both sides of Highway 270. Presumably, we will evaluate how we can best address these challenges and be better stewards of our common resources to accomplish the mission of the Church more effectively.


