Some people say that living together before marriage helps you be more certain that a couple will get along when they are married. It seems logical, but my and priest do not approve. Wouldn't marriages be better if couples lived together before they married?

It might seem logical but actually living together before marriage diminishes your chances of success. Several people have examined the success rate and found that couples who live together before marriage do not do as well as couples who don't. Why? People will attribute it to many things, but I would offer this. Love is essentially a choice. We choose to spend time together, to get to know one another, to share ourselves and our interests. Bonds of love and friendship are built and strengthened because of our choosing to separate and come together again. A good example of this is the life of priests. While priests are assigned together at the same parish, they might very well become good friends. They share the same mission, living space and concerns. But sometimes when one is transferred, they do not speak for months or even longer. Why? There was no choice. The relationship was built on things other than interpersonal relationship. Couples who live together can short circuit the process of developing the interpersonal and intimate bond that is the basis of a marriage and end up unknowingly building their relationship on common tasks, shared living space, and financial interdependence. Time, repetition, choice and love are all part of building a marital bond.

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## Defending Our Religious Liberty

During Fortnight for Freedom (June 21-July 4<sup>th</sup>), our liturgical calendar will celebrate a series of great martyrs who remained faithful in the face of persecution by political power – St. John Fisher and St. Thomas Moore, St. John the Baptist, SS Peter and Paul and the First Martyrs of the Church of Rome. Last month, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously vacated the decisions before it, remanding the cases to the lower courts with instructions to afford the parties the opportunity to work out an alternative approach to the mandate. Let us pray that the State courts prevail in support of religious freedom.

If you haven't done so already, please voice your opposition to the federal health care mandate by calling U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services Sylvia Mathews Burwell at 202-205-5445, and your elected state representatives. Let them know that the mandate is in violation of our First Amendment right to religious freedom.

## QUESTION OF THE WEEK ...

Give thanks for God's forgiveness. Whom do you need to forgive?

## 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

A lot was made in the last election about the two parties' differing appeals to women voters. Since the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment to the US Constitution, women have had the right to vote in every election. No candidate can afford to ignore more than half the population. Often the press will cite certain issues as being of particular concern to women (things like health care, violence, workplace equality, food security) as opposed to topics that the media would label as of more concern to men (defense, terrorism, banking and finance law). While legislators may find themselves attuned at one time to one part of the population, and then the other, in the end, they must respond to all of their constituents and be concerned with the common good.

The Gospel this weekend gives us an insight into the band of believers who followed Jesus in his ministry. Luke paints a portrait of a mixed group of followers. There were the Twelve, that is the apostles, but there were also a number of women, some of whom were influential people. We know from the letters of St. Paul that in the early church men and women worked together to build up the kingdom of God by spreading the message of Christ.

In forgiving the sinful woman in the Gospel, Jesus outlines a path to be taken in achieving the common good, a path of forgiveness and healing. These are not easy virtues to exercise in the political world, which is often a cutthroat, winner-take-all type of endeavor. As Christians, it is our duty to influence our legislators on the issues that will promote the common good of all rather than the personal good of some. As Luke's writings in his Gospel and in Acts of the Apostles points out, Christianity is a religion of community. In both our private and our public lives we profess our faith in Christ and we care for our neighbor.

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
