What is Tenebrae? The name 'Tenebrae' means darkness or shadows and it is a Holy Week devotion dating back to the 7th or 8th Century A.D. It is characterized by successive extinguishing of candles as the service progresses. No service during the entire church year is more biblical: Every word of Tenebrae is taken verbatim from the scriptures. The purpose of the service, through prayer and music, is to recreate the emotional aspects of the passion story and the events leading up to Good Friday; it is left unfinished, because the story isn't over until Easter Sunday. Attending this powerfully moving service will set the tone, introduce the themes and adjust your heart and mind for the great events of the Passion and will help you prepare your heart for an even greater experience of Easter JOY.

Special Thank Your for the "Shelter the Homeless" Collection

Last year the collection for "Shelter the homeless' during the Lenten season was more successful than ever imagined. The Gathering Space was filled with linens, paper goods, toiletries and much more. We loaded up a large van and stuffed it so full that we worried enroute that the driver would be stopped for obstructed views. At ImmaCare the van was unloaded and a human chain passed all the supplies up to a vacant room. There were many comments about the generosity of the donors and the quality of the items given. Just like with the meals served, there is never anything delivered that could not be given to a neighbor. Yet, the give and take in this over 30 year relationship with ImmaCare has always been pretty even. They make St. Ann's a better parish.

This year we had the same van but there was no way everything was going to fit in. There were even more donated items and yet the quality remained the same. Ironically, we had promised to donate a lot of supplies to a women's shelter that is always in need. Although there are less women who are homeless in Hartford, their situations are full of dangers. We stuffed the van, again worried about obstructed views, and drove to the women's shelter where they were surprised to learn just how much was meant by "lots". Back to the church where there was still so much that the van was totally re-stuffed. This load was taken to ImmaCare where the shelter and many people who have been homeless and are now going into supported apartments are always in need of supplies. A tight budget can make paper goods a luxury.

On behalf of the staff and guests of these two places, thanks to everyone in this parish. Your kindness and generosity is overwhelming. If you donate food to the shelter meals, or leave items in the kitchen, or helped fill the Gathering Space with the Corporal Works collection, please know that every item is used and appreciated.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

Jesus warns us in the Gospel of Matthew, If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. 'It is an invitation to a way of life, and a plan that leads to holiness. But make no mistake, it is a warning as well. The cross is a sign of victory, but only in light of the Resurrection. Alone, it is a symbol of ultimate sacrifice: the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for a fallen world, and the sacrifice we are called to make to truly follow him.

The power of this symbol has been diminished in popular culture. It is often used in fashion and simple wall art and on bumper stickers and T-shirts, sometimes with Christian clichés and sometimes not. But the cross is something so much more. It is a reminder of the pain, suffering, and death of one who loved us so much that he would give his very life for us. It is our God on that cross. It is God who cries out in despair, feeling the ultimate depth of human emotion. And there lies the key for us in trying to live this life of carrying our crosses.

For those who suffer the death of a loved one, the Father lost his Son. For those who suffer the ravages of disease, his body was broken, beaten, and pierced. For those who feel they have no way out - whether due to prisons that are physical or prisons that are of the mind - he hung on a cross and cried out, Why? For those who feel alone and abandoned, he hung on a tree where no one could comfort him, not even his own mother. He has walked in all our shoes, and now we are called to walk in his. In the cross, we find solidarity with the human condition. In an empty tomb, we find our hope.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Palm Sunday is a strange day in our liturgical calendar. We begin by waving palms, but somewhere in the middle, we call for Jesus to be crucified. We celebrate today an equally paradoxical God, one who comes to save through suffering.

"I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!" Jesus, who so often in the Gospels tries to hide his true identity, speaks thunderously to the Pharisees who would still the rejoicing crowd. At the Last Supper, Jesus confirms the Messianic promise to his disciples, saying "I confer a kingdom on you, just as my Father has conferred one on me." Yet, before the night is over, Jesus has been betrayed.

We hear the tragedy unfold in Luke's Passion narrative. Jesus is abused by the council of elders, denied by Peter, whipped by Roman soldiers, and condemned to death by Pilate. But what else do we see? Jesus heals someone who came to arrest him, forgives his torturers, promises a repentant man paradise, and - by his loving endurance - converts a centurion at the foot of the cross. Jesus is both Redeemer of the World and Suffering Servant. In taking on the mantle of Messiah, Jesus does not only receive our praise and our accolades, but he bears our burdens and sins and does so with the deepest love. He may go about our salvation in a paradoxical way, but he is dearer to our own suffering hearts for it. This week, we remember that no sorrow of our own is beyond the reach of the compassion of God.

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK Live the Liturgy

Once hailed with blessings and hosannas as he approached the Mount of Olives, the same God is nailed to a cross amid cries for His crucifixion. What an ironic twist of fate. What an unjust end to this compassionate, simple, and loving life. Life's ironies and cruelties are dramatically witnessed today and throughout this Holy Week. The thread of God's love is woven through it all as it reveals God's transforming, redemptive, and salvific plan. It is all necessary: the hardship and the joy, the suffering and the glory, the disappointment and the inheritance. When life takes a turn for the worse, we often question where God is. Are we ready to walk through our lives as did Jesus, with a persistent trust that regardless how difficult our journey, all will work out in the end. "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."
