WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question:

I'd like to pray each day, but I can't seem to find the time. Do you have any suggestions?

Answer:

There are a lot of different ways to incorporate prayer into your daily routine. Start small by setting aside 10 or 15 minutes at natural breaks in your day, like first thing in the morning, during your lunch hour or a child's nap time, or as the evening winds down just after you've brushed your teeth. Put your phone on do not disturb or in airplane mode and set a timer. That way, you won't be interrupted by others calling or texting - or by yourself checking the time! Pick a place to pray, and sit in the same spot every day. The routine of place can help with focus.

Start with something simple. Scripture is a great start. Pray a single psalm slowly and consider how it relates to your life. Look up the daily Mass Gospel reading on your phone and take the same approach. Take some time to pray for others. Tick off five intentions on your hand each day, or assign each day of the week to a specific person or area of need (i.e., on Mondays, remember the poor, on Tuesdays, pray for your parish, Wednesdays, your extended family). Remember to share honestly with God. Don't be afraid to speak to Him in your heart as you would a friend out loud. Love grows in real relationship. *-from LPi*

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Tickets booked, packing list double-checked, itinerary set - how do you know you're prepared for a trip? Being ready requires plenty of practical preparation. Do we give the same care to our spiritual preparedness? "Your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom," Jesus tells us. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus reminds us to have the right attitude for the gifts and callings he wants to give us!

Clear out your clutter! "Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." Jesus reminds the disciples that earthly standards of security and success will wear out in time. If our lives are structured around values that don't align with the kingdom of God, we'll miss opportunities to receive God. If we're so concerned with our child's success in sports that we miss Sunday Mass for their tournaments, we're missing out receiving the sacraments and building a consistent community of faith. If our quest for the promotion takes us away from family commitments, we won't be able to fully receive the love intended in our closest relationships.

Set faith-based priorities. "Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival." Our conflicting commitments can cause any routine to slip from time to time. All the more reason to make sure faith is a priority. Pray as a family before meals. Bring your children regularly to the sacrament of confession. Make room in the schedule for faith enrichment activities offered by your parish. Volunteer once a month. "At an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come." When will the call come to care for an ailing parent? To take on a new leadership position? God speaks to us through the circumstances of our lives. He calls each of us to greater love, sometimes in very concrete ways. This week, take some time to consider: Will you be ready?

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK Live the Liturgy

We are asked to be vigilant until our Master returns. Even though our faith tells us that Christ will come again and that our purpose and destiny is an eternal one, it is hard not to lose heart, grow weary, and become distracted. Remembering the stories of our faith and what God has done throughout history is one way of remaining fresh and focused. Celebrating, recalling, and making real and tangible again what God has done is what our community does liturgically each time we gather. As the author of Hebrews reminds us: Faith makes real what we hope for and is the evidence of things we cannot see. Let us take this time once again to remember and participate in what God has done and continues to do.

Apostle Legacy Exhibit at Sacred Heart Manor - Hamden, CT Sundays 2-4pm

The Apostle Legacy Exhibit is housed at Sacred Heart Manor, on the grounds of the Provincial House of the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in Hamden, Connecticut. The Exhibit is open to the public on Sundays from 2-4 p.m., and by appointment. This museum-quality exhibit gives opportunities for visitors to learn about the legacy of the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the United States and to learn about the life and faith journey of their founder, Blessed Clelia Merloni. Three rooms (The Mission Room, The Founder's Room, and the replica of the bedroom where Blessed Clelia died) allow visitors to engage the history of the Apostles in a variety of ways. Listening to audio recordings of the first missionary Sisters who travelled from Italy to the United States at the turn of the century, reading the Founder's letters to Pope Benedict XV requesting permission to return to the Congregation, watching short videos of the ways the Apostles currently live out the mission and charisma of their founder-these opportunities and many more make this exhibit a wonderful pilgrimage

The retired Sisters, who live at Sacred Heart Manor, serve as tour guides to walk and talk all visitors through a living history of the Congregation, specifically as the Sisters' lives of prayer, ministry, and community have evolved over the years. The Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus welcome anyone who would like to learn more about their legacy—and offer an invitation to join them in lives of love, service, and reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus!
