ImmaCare Shelter Update and Meal Donation Schedule

ImmaCare shelter has continued to offer accessible shelter and housing services despite the many obstacles Covid put in it's way. While many times the men had to leave the shelter for isolated rooms because of major outbreaks, most of the time the shelter operation continued, although looking quite different as volunteers serving was now not allowed. Because of the generosity of this parish and the kindness of those who have cooked or donated for years, and the new people who heard about ImmaCare and offered whatever was needed, we were never in a position to not honor our commitment to bring a homecooked, nutritious meal monthly. Supplemented by needed supplies, our support was deeply appreciated by staff, guests, and those of us who promised then prayed - way in advance.

We are now starting another shelter season of honoring a commitment Father McCarthy made 35 years ago when this Hartford church basement shelter struggled to feed people and began calling the suburban churches and he responded "Yes-St. Ann will help". We will not serve but will deliver plentiful, nutritious and delicious meals. With less men because of Covid restrictions, we will also bring much needed food and supplies, much of what will go on the Outreach Van to be distributed to those who for so many reasons, choose to stay outdoors until the weather is life-threatening. We have also begun delivering much needed supplies to the Prudence Crandall Center which is a shelter for women and children who are survivors of domestic violence. Their needs are many and they have been appreciative of the support St. Ann's offered over the past year.

We will be going the 3rd Thursday of every month beginning with Oct. 20 and continuing at least through May.

If you have already contacted us, I will be emailing you and it will be so good to be back in touch. If you want to be added to the list and are willing to cook or donate a needed item (ie. coffee, water, juice boxes, or a surprise "item of the month!" - just let me know! Our thanks in advance for all you have done in the past, and all that can be done this year.

The Holy Eucharist DID YOU KNOW?

This week's theme: Prayer and Faith in the Holy Eucharist Jesus exhorts us in the Gospel this week not to lose Faith and to continue to pray always. (Luke 18:1-8). Our Lord closes this parable of the widow and the unjust judge with the words, "And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on earth?" Such a sad statement!

<u>Reflection:</u> We know that the Pew Pole has documented that only 30% of Catholics believe in the true Presence of Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament. Some do not understand that the Mass is the most intense encounter between us and Our Lord that is possible this side of heaven. Some have never developed a personal relationship with Christ. To do this, prayer is needed. How important is prayer to you? St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta said, "Love to pray. Prayer enlarges the heart until it is capable of containing God's gift of Himself."

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INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK Live the Liturgy

Does God finally answer our persistent prayers to stop us from bothering Him? The thought that persistent prayer can be disturbing or upsetting to God does not ring true with the images of God as compassionate, understanding, merciful, and loving that our tradition conveys. Yet, Jesus tells his disciples to "pray always without becoming weary." Maybe the type of prayer necessary to endure the trials of discipleship and the challenges and criticisms of Christian teaching goes beyond words. We need to tend to the realities of human life. The persistent prayer of which Jesus speaks is the prayer of the heart. This contemplative, silent, loving prayer gives us the vision to see God in all things, especially in each human soul. Desiring God alone and not only what we want God to do for us places this love relationship foremost in our minds, hearts, and souls. As we breathe in and exhale out, the Divine Life flows. This alone can provide the strength of endurance to confront anything contrary to the truth of faith. ©LPi

GOSPEL MEDITATION Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Brendan wouldn't stop. He continued nagging his mom to let him have a little more time with his phone. He knew the rules but wanted to finish a game and text a few more friends. He begged, had a temper tantrum, pleaded, screamed, pouted, and used every means he could think of to get Mom to change her mind. Mom had a busy day and was tired. At first, she held her ground. Then, her son's persistence got the best of her, and she caved. "Brendan, you can have 30 more minutes and no more!" she retorted. Brendan's determination paid off. He won.

Is this how it works with God too? If we want something enough and feel it is our due, does our persistence allow us to eventually get our way? Judging God by human standards, it would seem so. But is this the way God works? It gets a bit confusing when Jesus tells his disciples to "pray always without becoming weary" and then further tells them how God will "secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night." If we catch God at the right time, when he's having a weak moment, then our tenacity ought to pay off. What we want, we will get. Really? Sadly, the way many approach prayer suggests that this is precisely how it goes.

Good parents set boundaries and offer proper discipline. They learn the art of being steadfast when presented with determined minds and wills. They know what is best and, at times, have to say "no." God is always there with His full attention and unconditional love showering itself upon us. God also knows what is best. And, as with any good parent, the one constant that is always available and never withheld is love. We can be as persistent and determined as we want if what we are seeking is God's love. We are never a bother and requests for God's love are never denied. This is the prayer of the heart. Desiring God alone and not only what we want God to do for us places this love relationship foremost in our minds, hearts, and souls. God is never bothered by this prayer. As we breathe in and exhale out, the Divine Life freely flows.
